DRAFT FINAL ACT OF THE SEVENTH UNITED NATIONS
TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE CONFERENCE

Note by the Secretary-General. For the convenience of delegations, the Secretary-General presents the following draft Final Act of the Conference.

1. At the request of the Negotiating Committee for Extra-Budgetary Funds, the Secretary-General, by a letter to the permanent delegations of Member States and to the representatives of non-Member States, dated 3 August 1956, convened the Seventh United Nations Technical Assistance Conference, at which Governments were asked to announce their contributions to the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance for the Seventh financial period, 1 January - 31 December 1957.
2. The Seventh United Nations Technical Assistance Conference met at Headquarters on 17 October 1956. The Governments of the following States were represented at the Conference by delegations:

3. The Conference also took account of the fact that several Governments were not in a position to announce contributions during the Conference but that they contemplate submitting statements of the amounts of their contributions after

the end of the Conference. The Conference requested the Secretary-General to communicate to the Governments invited to the Conference the additional amounts announced by Governments notified to him after the close of the Conference.
