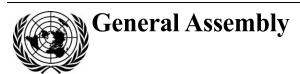


Forty-third report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions on the proposed programme budget for 2025

I. Introduction

1. The Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions has considered an advance version of the report of the Secretary-General on the revised estimates resulting from resolutions and decisions adopted by the Human Rights Council at its fifty-fifth, fifty-sixth and fifty-seventh regular sessions (A/79/575). During its consideration of the report, the Advisory Committee received additional information and clarification, concluding with written responses dated 11 December 2024.

II. Background

2. The first report of the Advisory Committee on the proposed programme budget for 2024 contains background information on the consolidation of resources and reporting of the resources arising from Human Rights Council resolutions and decisions (A/78/7, paras. VI.42–VI.48). In its first report on the proposed programme budget for 2025, the Committee noted that it was informed that the proposal represented the second phase of a two-year proposal, which had been endorsed by the General Assembly in its resolution 78/252. In preparation for the proposed budget for 2025, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) had conducted two related exercises: an organizational review and a spending review. The initial round of redeployments from the spending review had





- amounted to \$400,000 and the Office envisioned continuing with spending reviews in future years (A/79/7, para. VI.4).
- 3. The Advisory Committee noted that the 2025 proposed budget of \$228,242,800, compared with the proposed budget for the biennium 2018–2019 of \$198,499,100, represented an increase of \$128,993,250, or 130.0 per cent, on an annual basis. The Committee also noted that the fascicle provided a comparison between the 2025 proposed budget and the combined 2024 proposed programme budget and revised estimates, reflecting an increase of \$35,720,400, or 18.6 per cent (ibid., paras. VI.6 and VI.8).
- 4. The Advisory Committee noted the trend of increases in the proposed programme budget for OHCHR, and while affirming the importance of mandate implementation, it considered that this should be achieved in an efficient manner, and the consolidation of resources and the establishment of a core capacity should have resulted in efficiencies. The Committee was also of the view that the high number of vacancies in OHCHR and the trend of underexpenditure did not support continual proposed increases to the budget of this magnitude. The Committee trusted that OHCHR would conduct an in-depth review of existing mandated activities and capacities, as well as a detailed analysis of expenditure patterns, analyse workload requirements, seek efficiencies while avoiding duplication of efforts, and ensure greater clarity and transparency in the presentation of future budget submissions (ibid., para. VI.9).
- OHCHR subsequently submitted 11 requests for the concurrence of the Advisory Committee to enter into commitments during 2024 totalling \$21,617,100, or a net commitment authority of \$16,713,900, under section 24, relating to resolutions of the fifty-fifth session of the Human Rights Council that required additional activities in 2024, for which the resources were not included in the programme budget for 2024. The Committee considered that the requests could have reflected more efficiencies gained, and trusted that consolidation would have an impact on reducing the need for future requests for commitment authority. The Committee also considered that, where multiple mandates related to the same country/ location, OHCHR should seek greater synergies within its staffing component in order to implement mandates efficiently. OHCHR should also review the possibility for certain functions, such as administrative, human rights and technical assistance/ capacity-building functions, to be performed by existing capacity in OHCHR, to avoid the replication of staffing requests for every individual mandate. The Committee further considered that OHCHR should seek increased cooperation with other United Nations entities working on the same country/location. The Committee provided its concurrence to enter into commitments in an amount not to exceed \$3,899,400 for the period from October to December 2024 under certain resolutions.

Budget performance

6. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was provided with table 1, which shows information on the appropriation and expenditure for 2023 and 2024 (as at 31 October) under section 24 of the programme budget. The Advisory Committee trusts that the most up-to-date information on the budget performance for 2024 will be provided to the General Assembly during its consideration of the present report.

III. Financial implications resulting from the resolutions and decisions adopted by the Human Rights Council

A. Overall resource requirements

7. During its three regular sessions of 2024, the Human Rights Council adopted 71 resolutions and three decisions, of which 62 resolutions and three decisions give rise to additional resource requirements for the proposed programme budget for 2025, comprising \$33,803,100 for 2024 and \$82,953,100 for 2025, of which an estimated \$10,833,600 relates to mandates of a perennial nature and has already been included in the programme budget for 2024 and the proposed programme budget for 2025. Furthermore, requirements amounting to \$52,921,500 have also been included in the proposed programme budget for 2025 owing to the fact that they are of a renewable nature. The remaining requirements for 2025, amounting to \$19,198,000, are additional, and it is requested in the report that the General Assembly approve additional appropriations of this amount for 2025 (A/79/575, paras. 3–5). The

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additional requirements of \$19,198,000 comprise \$1,882,500 under section 2, General Assembly and Economic and Social Council affairs and conference management, \$140,400 under section 16, International drug control, crime and terrorism prevention and criminal justice, \$16,418,200 under section 24, Human rights, \$648,800 under section 28, Global communications, and \$108,100 under section 29E, Administration, Geneva. The Advisory Committee notes that annex I.A to the report of the Secretary-General provides the summary of requirements for 2025 by budget section (see annex I to the present report). Upon enquiry, the Committee was provided with the total new post and non-post requirements for the mandates from the fifty-fifth, fifty-sixth and fifty-seventh sessions (see annex II to the present report), and a revised table B of annex I to the report of the Secretary-General, including the amounts in respect of which the Committee provided its concurrence to enter into commitments (see annex III to the present report).

- 8. The total requirements for 2024 of \$33,803,100 include full-year estimates of \$10,844,200 for mandates of a perennial nature, which were already included in the programme budget for 2024, and \$22,958,900 for new mandates for 2024. Of the requirements of \$22,958,900 for new mandates, the Secretary-General proposes to accommodate \$6,245,000 within the existing appropriation and, therefore, has sought concurrence from the Advisory Committee for the remaining amount of \$16,713,900 (A/79/575, para. 6).
- 9. With respect to the annual budget increases under section 24, the Advisory Committee was provided with tables 2 and 3, which show the growth of the OHCHR budget over the past five years.

- 10. The Advisory Committee notes the trend of increases in the OHCHR budget and reiterates that mandate implementation should be achieved in an efficient manner, and that the consolidation of resources and the establishment of a core capacity should have resulted in more efficiencies (A/79/7, para. VI.9).
- 11. With respect to absorption, the Advisory Committee was informed upon enquiry that the lack of available cash due to the liquidity situation in 2024 required the United Nations to take measures to preserve its available cash resources. In this context, OHCHR was not able to absorb any new requirements. In 2024, OHCHR received 90 per cent of its allotment for posts and 83 per cent of its allotment for non-post resources. Within this constraint, OHCHR had to postpone the implementation of certain activities mandated by the Human Rights Council through its decision adopted on 3 April 2024. On the accommodation of \$6,245,000 within the existing appropriation, the Committee was informed that the deteriorating liquidity situation of the regular budget had led to the Secretariat introducing mitigation measures, including the imposition of prioritization in recruitment in 2024, leading to some posts and positions ready for recruitment not being filled. This prioritization in recruitment also had a corresponding effect on the level of expenditure for non-post resources. This should be considered as an abnormal temporary situation for 2024, and OHCHR would not be able to absorb the same level of resources in 2025. The Advisory Committee recalls that, in previous reports on the revised estimates, the absorption of some of the requirements was included (for 2024, see A/79/575, para. 6; for 2023, see A/78/7/Add.39, para. 13; for 2022, see A/77/7/Add.27, para. 8). While noting the liquidity situation, the Committee, taking into consideration the overall budget of OHCHR and the pattern of expenditure, is

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of the view that more efforts could have been made to absorb some of the proposed requirements (see also paras. 12, 26, 27 and 29 below).

- 12. The Advisory Committee was also informed upon enquiry that, while the Secretariat does examine the possibility of absorption of new and expanded mandates, it must respect regulation 5.1 of the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations and ensure that the resources are utilized for the intended purposes. Pursuant to regulation 5.1, the appropriations voted by the General Assembly shall constitute an authorization to the Secretary-General to incur commitments and make payments for the purposes for which the appropriations were voted and up to the amounts so voted. The Advisory Committee notes that regulation 5.1 of the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations does not preclude the utilization of the resources of OHCHR in support of the mandates of the Human Rights Council, given that the appropriation is approved by the General Assembly at the section level as a whole. The Committee recommends that the Assembly request the Secretary-General to make every effort to maximize the use of the core administrative, logistical and financial capacity in order to minimize the number of requests for programme support posts per individual mandates.
- 13. With regard to maximizing efficiency and internal synergy of collaborative work when implementing mandates with similar subject matters or themes, the Advisory Committee was informed upon enquiry that these efforts were anchored in the Secretary-General's programme plans and guided by the OHCHR management plan, which brings together various subprogrammes to achieve office-wide thematic results. To further enhance collaborative efforts, OHCHR established several inter-office task forces and working groups that bring together substantive staff with specialized expertise in teams across sections at the Geneva headquarters and in the field. For instance, the dedicated inter-office task force on climate change supports OHCHR participation in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change process. On the issue of digital rights and cyberspace and human rights, OHCHR work across multiple units that focus on various angles of this mandate includes the Office of the Director, Thematic Engagement, Special Procedures and Right to Development Division, the Rule of Law and Democracy Section, the Civic Space Unit, the B-Tech team and the Business and Human Rights Section, as well as regional offices in Brussels and New York. OHCHR coordinates closely with other specialized units depending on the specific focus of the mandate. These include the Indigenous Peoples and Minorities Section, the Children and Youth Rights Unit, the Women's Human Rights and Gender Section, and the Information Management and Technology Services. The Advisory Committee recalls that it previously underscored the importance of cost-effectiveness and a culture of efficiency (A/79/7, para. 63) and reiterates that OHCHR should seek greater synergies and complementarity, based on workload analysis, within its staffing component in order to implement mandates more efficiently and avoid the replication of staffing requests for individual mandates.
- 14. As for efficiencies resulting from the core capacity post proposal, the Advisory Committee was informed upon enquiry that, for thematic mandates, the revised estimates for 2025 reflected a total reduction of \$436,900 to offset the cost of the core capacity posts proposed for establishment in the proposed programme budget for 2025. The Advisory Committee trusts that a more detailed analysis and refinement on the use of the core capacity will be provided in the next programme budget submission, which should demonstrate a clear impact on reducing the proposed requirements.

B. Proposed new posts

15. Annex IV to the report of the Secretary-General provides a list of the proposed 25 new posts to be established, effective 1 January 2025, under section 24, Human rights, and section 28, Global communications. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was provided with table 4.

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Resolution 55/28: Human rights situation in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and the obligation to ensure accountability and justice

16. It is proposed that two posts of Human Rights Officer (P-3) be established under section 24, Human rights. In paragraph 62 of his report, the Secretary-General indicates that one post would be based in Gaza to document cases and draft substantive analysis of human rights and international humanitarian law issues, and the other post would be based in the West Bank to gather information, document cases and conduct substantive research and analysis of human rights. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that there were currently 26 posts in the secretariat to the Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and Israel (7 vacant) and 26 posts in the secretariat to the country office for the Occupied Palestinian Territory (2 vacant). The Committee was also informed that the existing team was unable to cover the unprecedented scale of violations in Gaza and the West Bank, for public reporting purposes. Additional resources were needed to allow the country office in the Occupied Palestinian Territory to meet the request and strengthen the documentation and pursuit of accountability in the context of the current situation.

Resolution 55/29: Rights of the child: realizing the rights of the child and inclusive social protection

17. The Secretary-General proposes the establishment of three posts of Human Rights Officer (P-3) under section 24, Human rights. In paragraph 65 of his report, the Secretary-General indicates that the posts would be based in Geneva to expand the capacities of OHCHR to advance child rights mainstreaming and to provide advice and technical assistance to States, upon their request, on issues concerning the implementation of the human rights of children. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that the current team working on the rights of the child was composed of one regular budget funded P-3 post and one P-4 funded from extrabudgetary resources. Additional staffing capacities include four National Professional Officers and one United Nations Volunteer located in country offices, which are funded through earmarked voluntary contributions for one year. Taking into consideration the existing capacity, the Advisory Committee recommends against the establishment of one P-3 Human Rights Officer post.

Resolution 56/13: Mandate of the International Independent Expert Mechanism to Advance Racial Justice and Equality in Law Enforcement

18. It is proposed that one post of Programme Assistant (General Service (Other level)) be established under section 24, Human rights. In paragraph 106 of his report, the Secretary-General indicates that the post would be based in Geneva to provide secretarial, administrative and logistical support to the implementation of the mandate of the Expert Mechanism. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that existing resources comprised one Human Rights Officer (P-4) and two Human Rights Officers (P-3). Taking into consideration the establishment of a core capacity for administrative support functions, the Advisory Committee recommends against the establishment of the Programme Assistant (General Service (Other level)) post.

Decision 56/115: Strengthening documentation within the Human Rights Council: webcasts

19. The Secretary-General proposes the establishment of one post of Associate Public Information Officer (P-2) and five posts of Public Information Assistant (General Service (Other level)) under section 28, Global communications. In

paragraph 126 of his report, the Secretary-General indicates that the P-2 post in Geneva would be responsible for coordinating and managing the webcasting, in all six official languages of the United Nations, of all formal and public meetings of the Human Rights Council during its sessions and in the intersessional period and those of its subsidiary bodies and mechanisms. The five General Service (Other level) posts would manage the webcast coverage of mandated meetings in the other five official languages of the United Nations and be responsible for providing technical hosting and webcasting of the United Nations of all formal and public meetings of the Council during its sessions and in the intersessional period and those of its subsidiary bodies and mechanisms. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that the expanded mandate would entail the webcast of between 200 and 300 additional threehour meetings and the development of multilingual, searchable data in all six official languages of the United Nations. This expanded mandate gives rise to the need for extra resources: the creation of six new posts (1 P-2, 5 General Service (Other level) posts, 1 per language in addition to the existing English General Service (Other level) post) to manage the multilingual webcast. The Advisory Committee is not convinced that one General Service (Other level) post is required for each official language and is of the view that more consideration should have been given to utilizing existing capacity, cooperating with the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management and optimizing technological tools, while ensuring the coverage in all six official languages. The Committee therefore recommends against the establishment of two Public Information Assistant (General Service (Other level)) posts.

Resolution 57/19: The right to development

20. Six posts of Human Rights Officer (P-4) and one post of Programme Management Assistant (General Service (Other level)) are proposed for establishment under section 24, Human rights. In paragraph 163 of his report, the Secretary-General indicates that five P-4 posts, to be based in five different regions (location to be determined), would reinforce the work of OHCHR on the promotion of the right to development at the regional level, including to build and scale up the capacity of the Office to provide support to Member States and other stakeholders in the promotion and protection and the realization of the right to development at the regional level. The remaining P-4 post in Geneva would provide dedicated substantive support to the human rights officers operating at the regional level, to ensure liaison and institutional representation with relevant substantive entities of OHCHR, human rights mechanisms, development actors and other relevant stakeholders and partners at the global level. The General Service (Other level) post in Geneva would provide the administrative, financial and logistical support to the work of the human rights officers.

21. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that the current capacities of the Office funded from the regular budget leading the engagement on the right to development were located in Geneva and worked at the global level to support the Secretary-General's or the High Commissioner's mandate on the right to development, as follows: Chief, Right to Development Section (1 P-5); Secretary of the Working Group on the Right to Development (1 P-4); Secretary of the Social Forum of the Human Rights Council (1 P-4); mainstreaming of the right to development in trade and investment (1 P-4); support to research and analysis (1 P-2); administrative and programme support (1 General Service (Other level)); Secretary of the Expert Mechanism on the Right to Development (1 P-4); support to research, analysis, thematic studies and country study visits by the members of the Expert Mechanism (1 P-3 and 1 P-2); and administrative and programme support to the Expert Mechanism (1 General Service (Other level)). Taking into account the existing capacity, the Advisory Committee recommends against the

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establishment of two Human Rights Officer (P-4) posts. Taking into consideration the establishment of a core capacity for administrative support functions, the Committee recommends against the establishment of the Programme Management Assistant (General Service (Other level)) post.

Resolution 57/28: Biodiversity and human rights

22. It is proposed that six posts of Human Rights Officer (1 P-4 and 5 P-3) be established under section 24, Human rights. In paragraph 185 of his report, the Secretary-General indicates that the P-4 post based in Geneva would support the coordination and implementation of work and initiatives on the promotion and protection of human rights in the context of biodiversity loss and interconnected forms of environmental degradation, through technical advice, capacity-building and substantive analysis. The five P-3 posts at the regional level (locations to be determined) would provide increased support and ongoing technical advice, including capacity-building through meetings, workshops and consultations at the regional and local levels. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that, while the Office had no dedicated regular budget-funded staff capacity for work on biodiversity, it had two funded mandates related to the environment that included general temporary assistance resources, as well as existing staff capacity on human rights and the environment funded by voluntary contributions. The Advisory Committee is not fully convinced of the need for five Human Rights Officers (P-3) at the regional level, noting in particular that the locations have yet to be determined, and reiterates that OHCHR should seek greater synergies within its staffing component in order to implement mandates efficiently. The Committee therefore recommends against the establishment of two Human Rights Officer (P-3) posts.

C. Vacancy rates and vacant posts

23. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that, as of October 2024, the vacancy rate for posts stood at 21.1 per cent. For 2024, OHCHR received only 92 per cent of its allotment of the appropriation for posts owing to the measures to mitigate the liquidity situation. Those circumstances had led to an increased vacancy rate, which had an impact on mandate delivery and was not reflective of the actual needs of OHCHR to deliver on its programme plan. The Committee was provided with a list of vacant posts in OHCHR as at 24 November 2024. The Advisory Committee notes the high number of vacancies in OHCHR and trusts that updated information on vacant posts and positions will be provided to the General Assembly during its consideration of the present report.

D. Non-post resources

24. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee received table 5, which shows expenditure for 2024 for sections 24, 28 and 29E of the programme budget.

25. The Advisory Committee requested expenditure and appropriation information on the implementation of mandates for relevant sections of the programme budget, but was informed again that the Secretariat did not have a system or process in place to comprehensively track expenditure linked to individual mandates. A pilot project to support the tracking of direct costs by mandate for the revised estimates report was being considered for OHCHR from 2025. The Advisory Committee reiterates its concern that the Secretariat has not established a system to track the expenditures related to the mandates proposed in the context of the revised estimates reports and those related to the proposed programme budget (A/79/7, para. VI.11). The Committee notes the pilot project being considered for OHCHR, encourages its implementation as soon as possible and trusts that the next programme budget submission will include updated information on the pilot project and an expenditure tracking system.

Section 2, General Assembly and Economic and Social Council affairs and conference management

26. A provision of \$1,882,500 is requested for 2025 for section 2, General Assembly and Economic and Social Council affairs and conference management, for non-post costs. Noting the expenditure pattern of the section (see A/79/7), the Advisory Committee recommends a 50 per cent reduction, or \$941,300, to the proposed requirements. The Committee is of the view that the reduced amount can be absorbed.

Section 16, International drug control, crime and terrorism prevention and criminal justice

27. Proposed requirements amount to \$140,400 under section 16, International drug control, crime and terrorism prevention and criminal justice, for other staff costs (general temporary assistance), travel of staff and contractual services. Noting the amount proposed vis-à-vis the overall budget of the section, as well as the expenditure pattern of the section (see A/79/7), the Advisory Committee is of the view that the amount can be absorbed and recommends against the proposed requirements of \$140,400.

Section 24, Human rights

28. The proposed non-post resources for section 24, Human rights, amount to \$14,264,700. Taking into account the recent expenditure trends, the Advisory Committee recommends reductions under consultants (10 per cent, or \$85,000), travel of staff (15 per cent, or \$110,700), general operating expenses (20 per cent, or \$52,800) and grants and contributions (35 per cent, or \$778,800) to the proposed resources under the revised estimates.

Section 29E, Administration, Geneva

29. An amount of \$108,100 is proposed under section 29E, Administration, Geneva, for non-post resources. Noting the amount proposed vis-à-vis the overall budget of the section as well as the expenditure pattern of the section (see table 5 above), the Advisory Committee is of the view that the amount can be absorbed and recommends against the proposed requirements of \$108,100.

E. General temporary assistance positions

- 30. The Advisory Committee previously noted that the absence of consolidated information on general temporary assistance positions included under dozens of resolutions in the report on the revised estimates did not facilitate the consideration of the proposed requirements by the Committee and the General Assembly, and it therefore trusted that a consolidated annex on the proposed posts and general temporary assistance positions, by resolution and decision, with functional titles, duration and numbers for the current and next financial periods would be included in future reports of the Secretary-General on the revised estimates regarding the Human Rights Council (A/78/7/Add.39, para. 26). The Advisory Committee notes that the report of the Secretary-General does not contain such consolidated information on general temporary assistance positions, as previously requested by the Committee and endorsed by the General Assembly in its resolution 78/253. The Committee reiterates its trust that, taking into consideration the large number of general temporary assistance positions in OHCHR and the need for clarity and transparency in the utilization of resources, future budget submissions will include detailed and coherent information about all positions, including those for 12 months or more and shorter-term positions, funded through other staff costs, by mandate, date of establishment, duration, level/title with incumbency status, if any, and office/component, together with detailed expenditure information (A/79/7, para. VI.37).
- 31. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was provided with table 6, which shows the number of additional general temporary assistance positions, as well as their duration, for which funding is requested for 2025. The Committee notes that of the 114 positions proposed for 2025, 49 are full-time.

- 33. Taking into consideration the establishment of a core capacity for administrative support functions, the Advisory Committee recommends against the two Administrative Assistant (General Service (Other level)) positions under Human Rights Council resolutions 55/27 and 57/20. In the light of the existing capacity within OHCHR which could cover the proposed human rights functions, the Committee further recommends that the four positions proposed for 12 months be established for 9 months instead.
- 34. The Committee was further provided with tables showing the general temporary assistance requirements for one-time mandates in the revised estimates report and details of posts and general temporary assistance positions related to the changes for the consolidated mandates (see annexes IV and V to the present report). With respect to the general temporary assistance requirements for one-time mandates related to Human Rights Council decision 55/115 and resolution 56/10, noting the extent of the requests, the Advisory Committee is of the view that more effort could be made to seek efficiencies and synergies, and therefore recommends a 20 per cent reduction, or \$377,900, to the proposed resources for both mandates under other staff costs (general temporary assistance).

IV. Other matters

A. Extrabudgetary resources

35. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was provided with tables 8 and 9, which show the available extrabudgetary resources, and allocation thereof, for OHCHR for the past 10 years. The Committee was also provided with a list of all the extrabudgetary-funded posts in OHCHR. The Advisory Committee trusts that future budget submissions will include detailed information on the extrabudgetary resources for OHCHR.

B. Cooperation with United Nations system entities

36. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that, in United Nations peace operations, OHCHR cooperated with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) on child protection work, such as the monitoring and reporting mechanism under Security Council resolution 1612 (2005), and work was divided on the basis of the added value of each entity. OHCHR also worked closely with the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN-Women) on issues related to sexual exploitation and abuse, and, whenever possible, UN-Women seconded staff for OHCHR teams. In United Nations country team settings, OHCHR was part of the implementation of the United Nations Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework, through which United Nations entities communicate, coordinate and cooperate to jointly plan and programme their activities, supporting national plans and counterparts. The joint planning under the Cooperation Framework ensured that OHCHR dedicated its resources in accordance with its comparative advantage and built on synergies to ensure cost-effectiveness and efficiency.

37. The Advisory Committee was also informed that, for the investigative bodies, OHCHR had been able to get expert staff seconded by other United Nations entities, although there was a limit to what could be provided for free to the Office. Since 2010, UN-Women had seconded Gender Advisers and Child Rights Experts for the first year of mandate implementation. However, owing to the budget limitations of UN-Women, OHCHR was required to provide full funding for those positions from the second year onward. OHCHR had also attempted to have a similar arrangement for the secondment of Child Rights Experts with UNICEF and the Office of the

Special Representative of the Secretary-General for Children and Armed Conflict. However, those entities did not have sufficient staff or financial resources available for such secondments. It is indicated that no other United Nations entities have the human rights expertise to provide dedicated capacities to carry out the additional work and tasks that are expressly mandated by the Human Rights Council to OHCHR. Upon enquiry, the Committee received a list of seconded staff from 31 December 2020 to 31 December 2024.

38. The Advisory Committee trusts that OHCHR will continue to improve its cooperation and coordination with United Nations entities in the implementation of its mandates, in particular in field duty stations where United Nations peacekeeping and special political missions are in operation and include a human rights mandate and component, to achieve greater efficiencies (A/78/7/Add.39, para. 53). The Committee further trusts that OHCHR will routinely provide in future reports comprehensive information on staff seconded to other entities, including their funding sources, as well as comprehensive information on cooperation with other entities.

C. Equitable geographical representation

39. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that OHCHR had proposed the expansion of entry-level positions to attract a broader pool of diverse talent, and distributed job vacancies across various networks and might broaden this approach to include international media, as needed. OHCHR also provided leadership with timely analysis on candidates' geographical representation and sought to improve workforce planning with diversity dashboards in the Umoja enterprise resource planning system. As of November 2024, the Office's recruitment data showed that approximately 24.4 per cent of new appointments in the geographical posts came from unrepresented or underrepresented Member States.

40. The Advisory Committee was also provided with table 10, which shows the trend of geographical appointments from 2021 to 2023.

41. The Advisory Committee reiterates the need for continuous and intensified efforts to achieve equitable geographical representation, with a special focus on the equitable distribution of staff in the context of desirable ranges for unrepresented or underrepresented Member States among the staff, in line with Article 101, paragraph 3, of the Charter of the United Nations (A/79/513, para. 46).

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D. Timely submission of documentation

42. The Advisory Committee notes the late submission of the report of the Secretary-General and further notes that the last set of written responses from the Secretariat was submitted on 11 December 2024, when the Committee's session was scheduled to conclude on 13 December 2024. The Advisory Committee notes with concern the late submission of documentation, which had an impact on the Committee's consideration of the report and delayed the finalization of the Committee's report for the Fifth Committee of the General Assembly. The Committee trusts that more efforts will be made to ensure the timely submission of documentation in future. The Committee also recommends that the General Assembly request the Secretary-General to submit supplementary information together with future reports on the revised estimates resulting from resolutions and decisions adopted by the Human Rights Council, detailing the proposed posts, general temporary assistance positions and non-post resources requested, by resolution and by section of the programme budget, accompanied by comprehensive justifications.

V. Conclusion

- 43. The actions requested of the General Assembly are set out in paragraph 217 of the report of the Secretary-General (A/79/575). Subject to its recommendations and observations above, the Advisory Committee recommends that the General Assembly:
- (a) Approve additional appropriations, representing a charge against the contingency fund, in the amount of \$15,341,900 for the proposed programme budget for 2025, comprising:
 - (i) Section 2, General Assembly and Economic and Social Council affairs and conference management (\$941,200);
 - (ii) Section 24, Human rights (\$13,919,500);
 - (iii) Section 28, Global communications (\$481,200);
- (b) Approve the establishment, effective 1 January 2025, of 16 posts, including 12 posts under section 24, Human rights, and 4 posts under section 28, Global communications, of the proposed programme budget for 2025, to support the activities mandated by the Human Rights Council in its resolutions 55/28, 55/29, 56/13, 57/19 and 57/28 and its decision 56/115;
- (c) Approve an additional appropriation in the amount of \$1,430,400 under section 36, Staff assessment, of the proposed programme budget for 2025, to be offset by an equivalent increase of \$1,430,400 under income section 1, Income from staff assessment.
