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## A PROGRAMME OF STUDIES ON THE CANNABIS PLANT AND ITS PRODUCTS

Survey of the Situation in Angola

#### Introductory Note

This survey of the cannabis situation in Angola is one of the series of country surveys which are being compiled by the Secretariat, with the co-operation of the Governments concerned, in pursuance of the programme of studies on the cannabis plant and its products adopted by the Commission at its eighth session.

This decision was embodied in paragraph 183 of the Commission's report (E/2423 - E/CN.7/262) of which the Economic and Social Council took note in resolution 505 A (XVI) of 28 July 1953.

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## A PROGRAMME OF STUDIES ON THE CANNABIS PLANT<sup>(1)</sup> AND ITS PRODUCTS

#### Survey of the Situation in Angola

This terminology was approved by the Commission on 22 April 1954, although it reserved the right to make further changes during its consideration of the draft Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs.

- A. THE CANNABIS PLANT: ITS CULTIVATION AND WILD CROWTH (2)
  - I. Agricultural Considerations: The cannabis plant grows in Angola during the rainy season, i.e. between November and May. (11, p.1).
  - II. <u>Licit Cultivation</u>: There is no legitimate cultivation in Angola. (2, 2(a), 2(b), Chapter V). In 1952, a European firm requested authorizations to cultivate the cannabis plant, but this request was rejected. (12).

### III. Illicit Cultivation:

- (a) Location and Extent of Areas Illicitly Cultivated: Illicit cultivation in Angola is limited to occasional plants carefully hidden from the local authorities. (2, p.2; 12)
- (b) Purpose or Purposes of Illicit Cultivation: No information.
- (c) Methods Used to Conceal Cultivation: No information.
- (d) Administrative Methods Employed to Suppress and Detect
  Severe fines are levied on all
  persons found in possession of cannabis plants. (12).
- (e) <u>Information about Known Cultivators: Number, Age-Level</u>

  <u>Distribution, Sex, Economic and Social Level:</u> No information.
- IV. <u>Wild Growth</u>: The cannabis plant grows wild in certain parts of the Province, (2, 2(a), 2(b), Chapter IX), and the authorities particularly the administrative authorities exercise strict control over the use of the plant by the natives. (11, p.1).
- B. THE PRODUCTION OF HEMP FIBRE AND HEMP SEED FROM THE CANNABIS PIANT

  Present Situation: No authorizations have been issued for the production of hemp fibre or hemp seed. (11, p.1)
- C. THE LEGAL PRODUCTION OF CANNABIS, CANNABIS RESIN AND PREPARATIONS CONTAINING THEM AND THE PURPOSES FOR WHICH THEY ARE USED

<u>Present Situation</u>: The production of cannabis, cannabis resin and preparations containing them is forbidden except under a special licence granted by the Government on the advice of the Directorate of Public Health or the Council of Public Health. (1, 73). No such licences have been issued. (12, p.2).

<sup>(2)</sup> The cannabis plant and cannabis are known locally as "liamba" or "riamba". (2, p.2)

- D. INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN THE CANNABIS PLANT AND ITS PRODUCTS AND PREPARATIONS CONTAINING CANNABIS
  - I. Exports: No cannabis and probably no cannabis resin, cannabis extract and tincture or preparations containing any of them were exported during the years 1947-54. (3, p.39; 4, p.20; 5, p.20; 6, p.19; 7, p.20; 8, p.23; 9, p.25; 10, p.25; 11, p.2). In 1952-54 there were no exports of any narcotic drugs. (2, 2(a), 2(b), Chapter III).
  - II. Imports: Cannabis extract, in bulk and in liquid form is imported for medicinal purposes; there were no imports during the years 1950-1952, and in 1953, 35 grammes of soft cannabis extract were imported from Belgium (10 grammes) and from the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (25 grammes). A kilogramme was imported in 1954. (2, pp.2-3; 3, p.39; 4, p.20; 5, p.20; 6, p.19; 7, p.20; 8, p.20; 9, p.25; 10, p.25; 11, p.2)
- E. THE MANUFACTURE OF CANNABLS EXTRACT AND TINCTURE AND OF PREPARATIONS

  CONTAINING THEM; THE EXTENT OF THEIR USE; AND THEIR ROLE IN PRESENT—

  DAY MEDICINE
  - I. The Manufacture of Cannabis Extract and Tineture and of Preparations

    Containing them: No extract or tineture of cannabis is manufactured in Angola, since the plant is not imported. (11, p.2)
  - II. The Consumption of Cannabis Extract and Tincture and of Preparations

    Containing them and the Stocks Maintained:

    The following table indicates the quantities of cannabis (3)

    imported, kept in stock, consumed and exported:
- (3) Paragraph 5 of the Explanatory Note to Table XII (10) reads in part as follows:
  - "5. The scope of the information requested under the convention /i.e. the International Opium Convention signed at Geneva on 19 February 1925/ varies from substance to substance:

As far as cannabis, its resin and preparations are concerned, only the imports, exports and confiscations effected on account of illicit exports and imports are to be reported to the Board /i.e., the Permanent Central Opium Board/. The statistics relating to the galenical preparations of cannabis are more complete but do not include manufacture. Thus it is not possible to strike a balance. The figures ... /relating to consumption and stocks/ ... refer only to galenical preparations."

## III. The Role of Cannabis Extract and Tincture in Present-Day Medicine: Soft and fluid extracts and tinctures are used only in galenical preparations when prescribed by a doctor (11, p.2)

- (a) <u>Internal Use</u>: They are used internally as a sedative in combination with other substances (11, p.3)
- (b) External Use: There is little external use. (11, p.3)
- (c) <u>Lay Opinions on the Medical Use of Cannabis:</u>
  No definite views (<u>11</u>, p.3)
- (d) Uses in Veterinary Medicine: No information.

- THE NON-MEDICAL USE OF CANNABIS, CANNABIS RESIN, AND PREPARATIONS
  CONTAINING THEM: LEGAL CONSUMPTION AND ARRANGEMENTS PROVIDING FOR IT

  The non-medical use of cannabis and its preparations is illegal
  in Angola. (11, p.3)
- G. THE NON-MEDICAL USE OF CANNABIS, CANNABIS RESIN AND PREPARATIONS CONTAINING THEM: ILLICIT TRAFFIC AND CONSUMPTION
  - I. Origin of the Illicit Traffic
    - (a) Within the Territor of Angola: See Part A, III, (a) above.
    - (b) Belgian Congo: ) The authorities in Angola have
    - (c) Northern Rhodesia: ) no knowledge of any illicit traffic between that territory
    - (d) South-west Africa: ) and its neighbours. (11, p.3)
  - II. Nature of Cannabis Used Illicitly and Methods of Consumption:
    No information.
  - III. Quantities of Cannabis Seized in the Illicit Traffic and Location of Seizuresi
    - (a) Quantities seized: Two packages containing 44 grammes of cannabis were seized at Lobito in 1952. (2, p.2) This seizure may be regarded as an isolated case. (12, p.3).
    - (b) <u>Disposal of Contraband</u>: The foregoing cannabis was destroyed. (2, p.2).
  - IV. Number of Persons Prosecuted for Cannabis Offences: In 1952, a single individual was prosecuted in the case mentioned under III. above. (11, p.3).
  - V. <u>Information about Persons Consuming Cannabis</u>: Does not apply. (11, p.3).
  - VI. The Illicit Trafficker and the Methods Used by him: Does not apply. (11, p.3).
  - VII. Judicial Proceedings, Convictions and Sentences:
    - (a) <u>Judicial Proceedings</u>: Prosecutions are undertaken in accordance with paragraph 1 of article 90 of Legislative Order No. 1,193 of 28 August 1940. (2, Chapter V).
    - (b) Convictions: No information.
    - (c) Sentences:
      - 1. Statutory Provisions: See Part H, Section X(a), below.
      - 2. Current Practice: No information.

- VIII. Administrative Measures Employed to Suppress or Detect the

  Illicit Traffic and Illicit Consumption: The consumption and
  use of narcotic drugs is supervised by the inspectors of the
  Pharmacy Control Service or by the administrative authorities
  in places where the Service does not exist. (2, p.2)
