2000/... Question of Western Sahara

The Commission on Human Rights,

Having considered in depth the question of Western Sahara,

<u>Reaffirming</u> the inalienable right of all peoples to self-determination and independence,

in accordance with the principles set forth in the Charter of the United Nations and in

General Assembly resolution 1514 (XV) of 14 December 1960, containing the Declaration on

the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples,

Recalling General Assembly resolution 53/64 of 3 December 1998,

Also recalling its resolution 1999/4 of 23 April 1999,

<u>Recalling further</u> the agreement in principle given on 30 August 1988 by the Kingdom of Morocco and the Frente Popular para la Liberación de Saguia el-Hamra y de Río de Oro to the proposals of the Secretary-General of the United Nations and the Chairman of the Assembly of Heads of State and Government of the Organization of African Unity in the context of their joint mission of good offices,

<u>Recalling</u> Security Council resolutions 658 (1990) of 27 June 1990 and 690 (1991) of 29 April 1991 by which the Council approved a settlement plan for Western Sahara,

<u>Recalling also</u> all the Security Council, General Assembly and Commission on Human Rights resolutions relating to the question of Western Sahara,

<u>Reaffirming</u> the responsibility of the United Nations towards the people of Western Sahara, as provided for in the settlement plan,

<u>Noting with satisfaction</u> the entry into force of the ceasefire in accordance with the proposal of the Secretary-General, and stressing the importance it attaches to the maintenance of the ceasefire as an integral part of the settlement plan,

<u>Also noting with satisfaction</u> the agreements reached by the two parties during their private direct talks and stressing the importance it attaches to a full, fair and faithful implementation of the settlement plan and the agreements aimed at its implementation,

<u>Further noting with satisfaction</u> the progress made in the implementation of the settlement plan since December 1997,

<u>Taking note</u> of Security Council resolutions 1131 (1997) of 29 September 1997, 1198 (1998) of 18 September 1998, 1204 (1998) of 30 October 1998, 1215 (1998) of 17 December 1998, 1224 (1999) of 28 January 1999, 1228 (1999) of 11 February 1999, 1232 (1999) of 30 March 1999, 1235 (1999) of 30 April 1999, 1238 (1999) of 14 May 1999 and 1263 (1999) of 13 September 1999,

<u>Welcoming</u> the acceptance by the two parties of the detailed modalities for the implementation of the Secretary-General's package of measures relating to the identification of voters, the appeals process and the revised implementation timetable,

<u>Recalling</u> that the General Assembly has examined the relevant chapter of the report of the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples (A/54/23 (Part II), chap. IX),

<u>Recalling also</u> that the General Assembly has examined the report of the Secretary-General (A/54/337),

1. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Secretary-General (A/54/337);

2. <u>Again notes with satisfaction</u> the agreements reached between the Kingdom of Morocco and the Frente Popular para la Liberación de Saguia el-Hamra y de Río de Oro for the implementation of the settlement plan during their private and direct talks under the auspices of Mr. James Baker III, the Personal Envoy of the Secretary-General, and urges the parties to implement those agreements fully and in good faith;

3. <u>Commends</u> the Secretary-General and his Personal Envoy for their efforts in reaching these agreements as well as the two parties for the cooperation they have shown, and urges them to continue this cooperation in order to facilitate the speedy implementation of the settlement plan;

4. <u>Urges</u> the two parties to continue their cooperation with the Secretary-General and his Personal Envoy, as well as with his Special Representative, and to refrain from undertaking anything that would undermine the implementation of the settlement plan and the agreements reached for its implementation;

5. <u>Notes with satisfaction</u> the progress achieved in connection with the implementation of the settlement plan, and in this respect calls upon the two parties to cooperate fully with the Secretary-General, his Personal Envoy and his Special Representative in implementing the various phases of the settlement plan;

6. <u>Urges</u> the two parties to implement faithfully and loyally the Secretary-General's package of measures relating to the identification of voters, the appeals process and the revised implementation timetable;

7. <u>Reaffirms</u> the responsibility of the United Nations towards the people of Western Sahara, as provided for in the settlement plan;

8. <u>Reiterates its support</u> for further efforts of the Secretary-General for the organization and the supervision by the United Nations, in cooperation with the Organization of African Unity, of a referendum for self-determination of the people of Western Sahara that is impartial and free of all constraints, in conformity with Security Council resolutions 658 (1990) and 690 (1991), by which the Council approved the settlement plan for Western Sahara;

9. <u>Takes note</u> of Security Council resolutions 1131 (1997) of 29 September 1997, 1238 (1999) of 14 May 1999 and 1263 (1999) of 13 September 1999;

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10. <u>Notes</u> that the General Assembly has requested the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples to continue to consider the situation in Western Sahara, bearing in mind the positive ongoing implementation of the settlement plan, and to report thereon to the Assembly at its fifty-fifth session;

11. <u>Also notes</u> that the General Assembly has invited the Secretary-General to submit to it, at its fifty-fifth session, a report on the implementation of the present resolution.

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
