Expert Meeting on Best Practice in the Creation of Quality Assurance Systems for Enhancing Competitiveness of Small and Medium-sized Enterprises

Geneva, 25-26 October 2001

INFORMATION NOTICE No. 2

1. This Information Notice contains details concerning the organization of, and participation in, the Expert Meeting on Best Practice in the Creation of Quality Assurance Systems for Enhancing Competitiveness of Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (SMEs) to be held in Geneva on 25-26 October 2001 at the Palais des Nations. The Expert Meeting will be organized by the Coordinating Unit for Operational Activities in cooperation with the Working Party on Technical Harmonization and Standardization Policies (WP.6) and the Working Party on Industry and Enterprise Development (WP.8).

Scope and purpose of the Expert Meeting

2. On the current world market, both manufacturers and consumers require both guarantees for the quality of products and services. Now it is no longer sufficient to provide products and services that conform with certain standards, but all manufacturers and service organizations need to demonstrate their capability to provide a continuous quality of their products and services. This is why all businesses and public organizations need to set up quality systems enabling them to guarantee that required quality is obtained at appropriate cost, taking into consideration ecological concerns. Secondly, customers including public authorities - e.g. in the field of healthcare - need to know whether the quality systems of manufacturers and service companies provide the necessary assurance concerning the quality of products and services.

3. The economic globalization has a dual impact on SMEs. For some, it provides new opportunities for expansion and growth through increased international marketing possibilities. These are able to adapt and become internationally competitive. For the majority, however, globalization is an inward process that brings competitive challenges and threats. For those SMEs globalization brings risks due to which they are unlikely to survive in their present form without improving quality, competitiveness and management practices.

4. The Expert Meeting on Best Practice in the Creation of Quality Assurance Systems for Enhancing the Competitiveness of SMEs will be organized by the UNECE and is the fourth in a series of such meetings following the success of the Expert Meeting on Best Practice in Financing SMEs held on 14-15 May 1998, the Expert Meeting in Business Incubation on 3-4 June 1999 and the Best Practice in Business Advisory, Counselling and Information Services on 2-4 November 2000 in Geneva. All these Expert Meetings have concluded that such meetings are very useful and important for the exchange of best practices in supporting SMEs and should be carried out on a regular basis.

5. The Working Party on Technical Harmonization and Standardization Policies (WP.6) at its tenth session in November 2000, expressed its interest in receiving more information on practical problems faced by private operators in the ECE region related to the implementation and use of quality and environmental management standards. Such information might help governmental bodies responsible for standardization policies to introduce best international practices which will allow to create more awareness and wider dissemination of ISO 9000 and ISO 14000 standards.

6. Quality management, quality assurance and quality control, accreditation and certification, quality marks and labels, standardisation, metrology, etc. are often considered as technical barriers for trade, especially as regards international competitiveness and globalization.

7. Quality represents a new strategic philosophy of enterprise management, based on an overall commitment of the management and employees towards customers' satisfaction and continuous improvement of products, production and services. Quality is an integral part of international competitiveness. The certification of quality systems constitutes for enterprises, in particular for SMEs, an important way of assuring that they fulfil the requirements in the newly born market economies, as well as within the framework of the internal market of the European Union and other advanced markets.

8. The use of ISO 9001:2000, ISO 9004:2000 and ISO 14000 standards by enterprises can be regarded as a first step towards the improvement of business performance and in assisting enterprises to move towards total quality management (TQM).

9. Governments are responsible for the development of national quality policies and support systems providing assistance to all enterprises to understand the principles of quality and develop quality consciousness in business behaviour leading to the satisfaction of their customers, thus assuring the survival and development of companies within the conditions of market economies. Nationwide and regional Quality Award Systems could recognize and encourage the achievement of excellent enterprises with quality management as a way to develop the best strategies to improve their competitiveness.

10. The Expert Meeting will allow government representatives in the field of entrepreneurship and SME policy, standardization and quality, entrepreneurs, SME business support institutions, quality consultants and auditing organizations as well as academicians dealing with standardization, quality control and assurance systems, for strengthening and increasing the competitiveness of enterprises both in advanced market economies and in emerging and transition economies to learn about the latest orientations in quality assurance systems world-wide, including the countries of the European Union, United States of America, advanced emerging and transition economies, and also to share experiences and establish new contacts with officials, experts and colleagues in other countries.

11. • How do the Governments of the European Union, the accession countries, North America and the Commonwealth of Independent States work out promotion policies towards excellence?

• Why is the use of quality management a major tool to increase competitiveness of enterprises? What are social aspects of quality?

• What initiatives exist and what actions are envisaged in the UNECE member States concerning quality in small and medium-sized enterprises?

• What kind of legal and financial framework is necessary for the creation of an environment in which SMEs can best pursue their activities?

• What is the role of quality in various countries of the ECE region and how can they cooperate in order to develop mutual recognition systems among the member States?

• What is the Excellent Quality Model in Europe?

• How to motivate SMEs to take responsibility for and commit themselves to the development of human capital as well as to the creation of well-being in the modern society?

The Expert Meeting on Best Practice in the Creation of Quality Assurance System to Enhance the Competitiveness of SMEs will respond to these and other questions.

- 12. The aims of the Meeting are the following:
- (i) to exchange experience in UNECE member States on the various ways and approaches towards quality and quality management, especially for SMEs;
- (ii) to learn how to develop national supportive quality policies, initiatives/programmes and actions to increase the quality consciousness of SMEs in order to enhance their competitiveness;
- (iii) to understand the role of the creation of quality award schemes to raise awareness about quality; and
- (iv) to exchange experiences of SMEs in quality systems.

<u>Venue</u>

13. The Expert Meeting will take place at the Palais des Nations in Geneva, Switzerland, on 25-26 October 2001.

14. The UNECE organizes the <u>First UNECE Forum of Women-Entrepreneurs</u> aiming at assisting member States in eliminating barriers to the development of women-headed businesses. For details of the aims and programme, please see UNECE document OPA/AC.21/1 dated 3 August 2001.

15. The UNECE in cooperation with the Governments of Poland and the Republic of Belarus, the Permanent Missions of Poland and Belarus to the United Nations Office at Geneva, is organizing a Forum on Best Practice in the Development of Entrepreneurship and SMEs in Countries in Transition: The Polish Experience on Tuesday, 23 October 2001, and a Forum on Best Practice in the Development of Entrepreneurship and SMEs in Countries in Transition: The Polish Experience on Tuesday, 23 October 2001, and a Forum on Best Practice in the Development of Entrepreneurship and SMEs in Countries in Transition: The Belarusian Experience on Wednesday, 24 October 2001, also at the Palais des Nations.

16. The main objective of these Forums is to discuss the transition experiences of Belarus and Poland in the field of SME development with a special focus on national policies, promoting support infrastructure, financial issues, business incubation and science parks, and others. High-level government and business officers from Belarus and Poland will make presentations on the topics and international experts from the European Commission and associated accession countries will comment.

Following event

17. The <u>eleventh session of the Working Party on Technical Harmonization and Standardization</u> <u>Policies</u> (WP.6) will be organized after the Expert Meeting on 29-31 October 2001 also at the Palais des Nations. 18. Participation in the Expert Meeting is open to all interested persons from the UNECE member States, and, under the relevant articles of the terms of reference of the Commission, to representatives of other member States of the United Nations as well as to representatives of specialized agencies, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations (NGOs). Representatives of government authorities (SME national focal points, standardization and accreditation bodies), entrepreneurs, representatives of SMEs, quality consultants and auditing firms, universities, and independent experts may also participate at their own expense.

19. Participants should cover cost of travel and hotel accommodation, etc. at their own expenses. There is no registration fee for this event. Documentation and other material are provided at no cost by the United Nations.

20. All participants should be in possession of valid passports or national identity cards, with, if necessary, entry visas which may be obtained from the diplomatic representation of Switzerland in the participants' home countries.

Proceedings, documentation and registration

21. The Expert Meeting will be held in English, French and Russian. The discussion will be lead by a Chairman who will introduce the themes, animate the discussion and summarize the deliberations on each theme.

22. The Expert Meeting will create an ad hoc group of experts whose task will be the elaboration of conclusions and recommendations. As one of the follow-ups to the meeting, the results of the discussions will be presented to the session of an UNECE inter-governmental group of experts representing national standards-setting bodies, regional and international standardization organizations.
