

I wish to acknowledge receipt of your letter reference S/AC.39/2001/OC.62 dated 10 September 2001, in response to my letter dated 11 June 2001. I have noted carefully the contents of your response on behalf of the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1343 (2001).

I was disappointed that your response did not address the essential concern of the Government of Liberia with respect to the criteria used by the Security Council in compiling its list of persons affected by said resolution. You will agree with me that the Security Council must at the minimum exercise transparency and equity in its decision-making, particularly as it has implications for the fundamental human rights of our citizens.

Further, I must observe that the response from the Committee does not give the Government or the people whose names are on the list, and who believe in justice, the minimal level of comfort or confidence, in the reversal of the normally accepted concept of innocence until proven guilty.

Nevertheless, I am pleased to note the reaffirmation of the Committee's willingness to continue its policy of constructive engagement with the Government of the Republic of Liberia. It is our hope and anticipation that our engagement can ensue in the spirit of transparency and equity.

May I once again request that your Committee apprise the Liberian Government of the criteria used in compiling the list of persons affected by paragraph 7 of resolution 1343 (2001).
