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Summary statement by the Secretary-General on matters of which the Security Council is seized and on the stage reached in their consideration

Addendum

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General is submitting the following summary statement.

The Security Council adopted the draft report without a vote, and the decision was reflected in a note by the President of the Council (S/2001/876).

Briefing by His Excellency Mr. Nebojša Čovič, Deputy Prime Minister of Serbia, Federal Republic of Yugoslavia

The Security Council met to consider the item at its 4373rd meeting, held in private on 17 September 2001 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

At the close of the meeting, in accordance with rule 55 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the following communiqué was issued through the Secretary-General in place of a verbatim record:

The Security Council proceeded to vote on draft resolution S/2001/874, as orally revised in its provisional form, and adopted it unanimously as resolution 1370 (2001) (for the text, see S/RES/1370 (2001); to be issued in *Official Records of the Security Council, Fifty-sixth Year, Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council*, 2001).

In accordance with the understanding reached in the Council's prior consultations, the President, with the consent of the Council, extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure to Wolfgang Petritsch, High Representative for the implementation of the Peace Agreement on Bosnia and Herzegovina, and to Jacques Paul Klein, Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Coordinator of United Nations Operations in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

In accordance with the understanding reached in the Council's prior consultations, the President, with the consent of the Council, extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure to General Lamine Cissé, Representative of the Secretary-General and Head of the United Nations Peace-building Support Office in the Central African Republic, and to Robert Calderisi, Country Director of the World Bank.

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
