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Summary statement by the Secretary-General on matters of which the Security Council is seized and on the stage reached in their consideration

Addendum

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General is submitting the following summary statement.

During the week ending 3 November 2001, the Security Council took action on the following items:

Briefing by Judge Gilbert Guillaume, President of the International Court of Justice (see S/2000/40/Add.43)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 4398th (private) meeting, held on 29 October 2001 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

At the close of the meeting, in accordance with rule 55 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the following communiqué was issued through the Secretary-General in place of a verbatim record:

“At its 4398th meeting, held in private on 29 October 2001, the Security Council considered the item entitled ‘Briefing by Judge Gilbert Guillaume, President of the International Court of Justice’.

“In accordance with the understanding reached in the Council’s prior consultations, and in the absence of objection, the President extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council’s provisional rules of procedure to Judge Gilbert Guillaume, President of the International Court of Justice, to brief the Council.



“The members of the Council heard an informative briefing by Judge Guillaume.”

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 4399th meeting, held on 29 October 2001 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

The President drew attention to a draft resolution (S/2001/1016), which had been prepared in the course of the Council’s prior consultations.

The Security Council proceeded to vote on draft resolution S/2001/1016 and adopted it unanimously as resolution 1375 (2001) (for the text, see S/RES/1375 (2001); to be issued in *Official Records of the Security Council, Fifty-sixth Year, Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council, 2001*).

The situation in Georgia (see S/23370/Add.40; S/25070/Add.4, 26, 27, 31, 34, 37, 42, 44, 45 and 51; S/1994/20/Add.4, 8, 9, 11, 13, 25, 28 and 47; S/1995/40/Add.1, 10, 18 and 32; S/1996/15/Add.1, 16, 27 and 42; S/1997/40/Add.4, 18, 30 and 44; S/1998/44/Add.4, 21, 30 and 47; S/1999/25/Add.3, 17, 29 and 44; S/2000/40/Add.4, 18, 29 and 45; and S/2001/15/Add.5, 12, 17 and 31)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 4400th (private) meeting, held on 30 October 2001, in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

At the close of the meeting, in accordance with rule 55 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the following communiqué was issued through the Secretary-General in place of a verbatim record:

“At its 4400th meeting, held in private on 30 October 2001, the Security Council considered the item entitled ‘The situation in Georgia’.

“In accordance with the relevant provisions of the Charter and rule 37 of the Council’s provisional rules of procedure, the President invited the Minister of Special Affairs of Georgia and the representative of Belgium.

“In accordance with the understanding reached in the Council’s prior consultations, the President, with the consent of the Council, extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council’s provisional rules of procedure to Dieter Boden, Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Head of the United Nations Observer Mission in Georgia.

“The Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Head of the United Nations Observer Mission in Georgia briefed the Council.

“The members of the Council, the Minister of Special Affairs of Georgia, the Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Head of the United Nations Observer Mission in Georgia, and the representative of Belgium had a constructive discussion.”

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 4401st meeting, held on 31 October 2001 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations, having before it the report of the Secretary-General on the situation in Somalia (S/2001/963).

The President stated that, following consultations of the Council, he had been authorized to make a statement on behalf of the Council and read out the text of that statement (for the text, see S/PRST/2001/30; to be issued in *Official Records of the Security Council, Fifty-sixth Year, Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council, 2001*).

Women and peace and security (see S/2000/40/Add.42 and 43)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 4402nd meeting, held on 31 October 2001 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

The President stated that, following consultations of the Council, he had been authorized to make a statement on behalf of the Council and read out the text of that statement (for the text, see S/PRST/2001/31; to be issued in *Official Records of the Security Council, Fifty-sixth Year, Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council, 2001*).

The situation in East Timor (see S/11593/Add.50 and 51; S/11935/Add.15 and 16; S/1999/25/Add.17, 22, 25, 30, 33-36, 42 and 50; S/2000/40/Add.4, 11, 16, 20, 25, 29, 30, 34, 35, 37, 38, 40, 46, 47 and 48; and S/2001/15/Add.4, 5, 14, 20, 31, 34 and 37; *see also* S/2001/15/Add.43)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 4403rd and 4404th meetings, held on 31 October 2001 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations, having before it the report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Transitional Administration in East Timor (S/2001/983 and Corr.1). There was one suspension and one resumption of the 4403rd meeting.

At the 4403rd meeting, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, Fiji, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, Mozambique, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines, Portugal, the Republic of Korea and Thailand, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

In accordance with the understanding reached in the Council's prior consultations, the President, with the consent of the Council, extended invitations under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure to Sergio Vieira de Mello, Special Representative and Transitional Administrator for East Timor, Mari Alkatiri, Chief Minister of the Second Transitional Government of East Timor, Mats Karlsson, Vice President for External Affairs and United Nations Affairs of the World Bank and Zephirin Diabre, Associate Administrator of the United Nations Development Programme.

At the 4404th meeting, the President stated that, following consultations of the Council, he had been authorized to make a statement on behalf of the Council and read out the text of that statement (for the text, see S/PRST/2001/32; to be issued in *Official Records of the Security Council, Fifty-sixth Year, Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council, 2001*).
