I. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF AUDITORS

Introduction

1. As required by paragraph 22 of the statute of the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), the Board of Auditors has audited the accounts of the voluntary funds administered by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees for the year ended 31 December 1982.
2. The examination was conducted in accordance with article XII of the Financial Regulations of the United Nations and the annex thereto and with the common auditing standards adopted by the Panel of External Auditors of the United Nations, the specialized agencies and the International Atomic Energy Agency. The examination was conducted at UNHCR headquarters at Geneva and at the UNHCR field offices in the United Republic of Cameroon, Pakistan, Somalia and the Sudan.
3. During the year under review, the Board of Auditors continued its normal practice of reporting the results of specific audits and issuing management letters containing detailed audit observations to the Administration. This practice once again helped in maintaining a continuous dialogue with the Administration and is consistent with the Board's approach of applying systems-based auditing to all the organizations in the United Nations system for which the Board has audit responsibility.
4. The Board of Auditors has noted with appreciation the expeditious manner in which the Administration has dealt with the matters brought to its attention and the continued efforts being made to improve the financial management and control system of UNHCR. Our recommendations are intended to assist the Administration in considering and implementing further improvements. The following are considered the most significant matters arising from our 1982 audit examination. We have discussed these matters with the Administration whose responses are referred to as appropriate.

Summary of findings

5. Our audit revealed that budget monitoring of field offices needs to be strengthened.
6. We also noted delays in monthly accounts submissions by field offices and occasional non-compliance with the relevant rules and instructions in making payments in the field offices. Our review of the cash management system at some field offices disclosed that sometimes cash holdings exceeded the imprest level, while in one field office insufficient cash holdings led to overdrafts. Furthermore, we observed the responsibility for the administration, control and timely collection of loans to refugees has not been clearly defined.
7. We further noted that, in the absence of a system of procurement planning, instances of significant surpluses of stock had arisen, some of which had been damaged, whereas in respect of other surpluses high storage costs were incurred. We also found that, in certain cases, UNHCR had to incur losses for short supply by the contractors, penalty clauses were not incorporated in the contracts, and UNHCR officials in the field were not associated in all cases with the procurement and distribution process. Moreover, in some cases, claims for damages of UNHCR goods while in transit had not been recovered from insurers.

8. We observed, during our review of the status of project implementation, that some cases of project expenditures were not being adequately controlled in relation to the allotments, that there were delays in project implementation and that inadequate feasibility studies and insufficient project budgets caused cost overruns. In some cases, non-expendable property of projects was damaged and lost because of the absence of adequate control. Moreover, monitoring of some project activities was unsatisfactory due to non-submission of periodic statements and reports by the implementing agencies/departments.

Budgetary control

Allotment control

9. We noted during our review of the administrative budget of the field offices that, in a number of cases, the allotments were exceeded or expenditures made without allotment and significant balances of unspent allotments had been maintained.

10. We recommended that, in order for the budget to be an effective tool for financial management, a more adequate process of administrative budget monitoring and revisions should be established and that the budget should be prepared on a more realistic basis.

11. While agreeing with our recommendation, the Administration stated that sometimes unforeseen circumstances lead to deviations from the budget.

Accounting control

Monthly accounts of field offices

12. Our audit of the accounting control system revealed that occasionally submission of monthly accounts by some field offices to headquarters was not timely and regular and that the accounting information lacked adequate documentation. Moreover, on occasion, payments were made by field offices without authorization and payments of overtime were allowed in excess of maximum authorized hours in a month.

13. We recommended that field offices should be reminded to follow strictly the instruction with regard to submission of accounts in an appropriate manner with adequate documentation and that observance of relevant rules and instructions in making payments should be ensured.

14. The Administration agreed with our observation but pointed out that due to practical difficulties it might not always be possible for the field offices to forward their monthly accounts within the scheduled time. We were further informed that a general reminder to the field offices on the need to submit accounts promptly had been issued recently.

Status of loans to refugees

15. During our review of the status of loans to refugees, we noted that as at 31 December 1982 an amount of approximately \$US 19 million was loaned out to

refugees, the major part of which was loaned in the late 1950s or throughout the 1960s. As at 31 December 1982, the outstanding loans recoverable amounted to about \$US 7.7 million. In accordance with the policy laid down by the Executive Committee, loans to refugees for housing or small business have been given free of interest in some cases, or with minimal interest of up to 2 per cent per annum, repayable over a period of up to 50 years.

16. Our review disclosed that responsibility for the administration, control and timely collection of loans has been vested with governmental and non-governmental agencies and there is no periodic control mechanism at headquarters to ensure whether they fulfil their responsibilities.

17. We recommended that the branch and field offices should be asked to follow-up with agencies on the timely collection of loans and to submit semi-annual reports to headquarters. We also recommended that periodic review procedures should be established at headquarters in order to monitor closely the collection of loans.

18. The Administration agreed with our observations and stated that, in future, if it detects any undue delay in the repayment schedules of the loans, it would request said offices to take appropriate action for recovery.

Cash management

19. Our audit disclosed that in one field office cash holdings were in excess of the imprest level, while in another field office overdrafts were raised in local currency as well as under a \$US bank account to meet unforeseen circumstances. We also noted that the follow-up procedures for settlement of outstanding cheques and closure of inoperative bank accounts were inadequate.

20. We recommended and the Administration agreed that some reinforcement is required of the procedures for monitoring cash replenishments to field offices. We also recommended that closer follow-up of outstanding cheques should be made, and steps were taken to increase this control, and that inoperative bank accounts should be closed.

Procurement

Procurement planning

21. Our examination of some project activities indicated that there is need for improvement in the planning of procurement. The field offices we visited were at times left with substantial surpluses of supplies which, on occasion, were damaged due to long storage. In most of these cases, either headquarters could not take expeditious action for alternative use of the surpluses on receipt of information from field offices, or the field offices did not inform headquarters in time of the available surpluses.

22. We further noted that in some cases goods were procured long before finalization of the arrangement for their use and, as a result, significant quantities of those goods were damaged due to improper storage facilities. Additionally, in other cases, substantial storage costs had to be incurred.

23. We recommended that appropriate reporting procedures should be established to ensure better co-ordination between headquarters and field offices, so that headquarters can make proper decisions on available surpluses or on future procurement. We also recommended that procurement should be made only after final arrangements have been completed for the use of goods.

24. The Administration stated that it would instruct the field offices to maintain necessary controls of available surpluses at the programme level and to provide headquarters with appropriate information on their utilization. It also stated that it would further rationalize the timing of procurement activities.

Delivery terms and penalty clauses

25. We noted that, in a few cases, contractual quantities were not supplied and the delivery of goods was not completed within the time specified in the contract.

26. We recommended that, in the future, a penalty/liquidated damages clause should be incorporated in all contracts.

27. We have been informed by the Administration that, since early 1983, standard penalty clauses are included in the printed contract form in use by UNHCR.

28. We also noted that, in one case, the financial interest of UNHCR was not protected due to the lack of involvement of a branch office at the time of the opening of bids, awarding of contracts and the distribution process. As an example, we noted in our audit that in a sub-contract for the supply of fresh meat for the refugees in one country, the implementing agency forwarded to the UNHCR branch office meat dealers' invoices equivalent to \$959,874 for a total of 721,201 kg of fresh meat. It was further observed that, instead of supplying edible meat ready for cooking, the contractors supplied live animals and that after the animals were slaughtered no weighing took place of the meat prepared for distribution among the refugees.

29. According to the expert of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations based in that country, about 47 per cent of the weight of an average animal is edible after slaughter. We also noted from the records that the animals supplied were either of average size or below average size and that the price paid for these animals was almost double than that of the prevailing market price as determined by the FAO expert.

30. In our opinion, the refugees were provided with less fresh meat (almost half) than the estimated quantity. This is based on the fact that the claim for 721,201 kg of fresh meat was for the whole animals and not for the edible, ready-for-cooking portion of the meat. We therefore believe that not more than about 340,000 kg of edible meat was supplied and that UNHCR should have been billed for this quantity only, thus making the payment due about \$480,000. On the other hand, if we take the standard market price as determined by the FAO expert, the price would be \$420,000 for the animals supplied.

31. In view of the foregoing, it is our opinion that the implementing agency may have inflated the price charged for whole animals to the tune of approximately \$450,000 and that refugees may not have received the full weight of the daily ration foreseen in the agreement. That situation was made possible by the fact that the agreement about methods of procurement was not specific and that there was a lack of proper monitoring by the branch office of UNHCR.

32. We recommended that in order to protect the interests of the organization, UNHCR agreements should be more specific concerning methods of procurement and that implementing agencies should be required to facilitate monitoring by UNHCR in such cases. We also recommended that an investigation should be made to establish responsibility in the case referred to above.

33. The Administration informed us that because of the seriousness of the auditors' findings, it was referred to the UNHCR Audit Committee and that the Committee has recommended that a mission should go to that country to establish facts and responsibilities.

Loss of goods in transit

34. In one of the field offices visited, we noted substantial losses of goods in transit for which no evidence of lodging claims with the insurers was available. Also noted were two claims for damaged vehicles which were rejected by the insurers.

35. We recommended that steps should be taken to investigate the losses in transit, that claims should be lodged with the insurers and that the two claims rejected by the insurers should be pursued for early settlement.

Project activities

36. During our examination of the status of project implementation, we noted that in a few projects expenditures exceeded allotments, while in other projects they were either nil or insignificant. In addition, completed projects were not financially closed for a number of years.

37. On many occasions there were unusual delays in the commencement of project work, which resulted in frequent project revisions. In one project, significant cost overrun was due to a lack of appropriate feasibility studies and a lack of accuracy in estimating costs. For example, in a project for digging water wells in refugee camps in one country, which was being implemented by another United Nations organization, project targets could not be achieved and part of the project had to be abandoned after an expenditure of \$6.6 million against an estimate of \$4.8 million. The underlying reason for this poor performance was that a proper geohydrological survey had not been carried out prior to commencement of drilling operations.

38. We further observed that there was inadequate control over the non-expendable property of some projects which resulted in substantial losses.

39. Our review also disclosed that different periodic statements and reports on projects were not submitted by the executing departments/agencies as required under various provisions of project agreements. Often the voluntary and governmental implementing agencies failed to send their final reports in good time. In some cases, there was a lack of co-ordination between the UNHCR field offices and the executing departments.

40. The Administration agreed with our observations stating that problems in implementation can be attributed to a variety of local conditions and to factors which are sometimes beyond its control. It also mentioned that effective control and monitoring of project activities depends largely on the willingness and capability of the implementing partners to co-operate with each other.

41. We recommended that proper feasibility studies should be carried out at the planning stage and that all aspects of implementation should be adequately controlled and monitored as required by the various provisions of project agreements, in order to ensure achievement of project objectives and their timely completion.

Comments on matters dealt with in the 1981 report

42. The Administration has either provided a satisfactory explanation or taken appropriate action on matters raised in the 1981 report. 1/

IV. STATEMENT OF BASIC ACCOUNTING POLICIES APPLICABLE TO THE VOLUNTARY FUNDS ADMINISTERED BY THE UNITED NATIONS HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES

Basis of accounting

1. The UNHCR voluntary funds accounts are maintained in accordance with the Financial Rules for voluntary funds administered by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees as promulgated in 1974 and consolidated in document A/AC.96/503/Rev.2 dated 30 June 1981.
2. The accounts of the voluntary funds cover the calendar year. They are submitted to the United Nations Board of Auditors and the Executive Committee of the High Commissioner's Programme.
3. Funds at the disposal of the High Commissioner for purposes falling outside the annual programme are recorded as trust funds, reserves or special accounts as may be appropriate in accordance with the Financial Rules.
4. The writing off of losses of cash, property or the book value of accounts receivable, including the conversion of loans into grants, is governed by financial rule 10.6. A statement of all amounts written off is submitted to the Board of Auditors with the annual accounts.

Contributions and expenditures

5. Financial transactions are recorded in the accounts on an accrual basis. Thus, all firm pledges (except pledges announced in 1982 for the 1983 general programmes) are recorded as income in 1982 even if they concern programmes whose budgetary period extends into 1983, and therefore may only be obligated in 1983. Likewise, the term "expenditure" designates total obligations incurred up to 31 December 1982, whether liquidated or not. Agreements or letters of instruction signed prior to 31 December 1982 but for projects commencing in 1983 are not included in the 1982 expenditure.

Translation of currency

6. The accounts of UNHCR are maintained in United States dollars. Transactions in other currencies are translated into United States dollars at the United Nations operational rates of exchange prevailing at the time of the transaction. At the year-end cash, investments, unpaid pledges and current accounts receivable and payable in currencies other than United States dollars are translated at the applicable United Nations rates of exchange. Exchange differences are debited or credited to the General Fund.

Fixed assets

7. Non-expendable property, purchased out of the voluntary funds of UNHCR and the ownership of which remains vested in UNHCR, is charged as expenditure to the appropriate budget accounts in the year of acquisition; it is not included in the balance sheet but recorded in separate inventories. The book value of non-expendable property purchased from UNHCR voluntary funds is included in the financial accounts of the United Nations.

Investments

8. Short-term investments of monies not immediately required are made in accordance with financial rule 9.1 and a report on such investments is included in the annual accounts (schedule 9). Income from investments is credited to the General Fund as provided for in financial rule 9.3.

Notes on the accounts

Note 1. Statements I and II, schedules 1 to 9, are an integral part of the accounts.

Note 2. A contingent liability of \$100,000 existed at 31 December 1982 in respect of a guarantee issued in connection with salvage of a shipment of cereals.
