MILITARY SITUATION IN PALESTINE

The Acting United States Representative at the Seat of the United Nations presents his compliments to the Secretary-General of the United Nations and has the honor to transmit the following message from the Chairman of the Palestine Truce Commission for the attention of the President of the Security Council. This message has been received by the United States Department of State on relay from Jerusalem under date of 14 July.

"Progress of Jews in Western Palestine steady and regular. Alleged capture of Ramle on Jerusalem-Tel Aviv road would consolidate seizure of Lydda airdrome and town Dascramre.

"Jews victoriously fighting Iraqi troops near Tel Aviv have retaken
Ras El Ein pumping station the beginning of water pipeline feeding
Jerusalem from coast. It was this station Arabs refused to restart during
truce period, thus committing a serious breach of June 9th agreement.

"In Jerusalem situation on whole calm and quiet. We fear however between today noon and tomorrow night, the possible beginning of the Jerusalem truce period, a powerful attack of Jewish force on Old City.

"Having remained faithful in general to resolutions November 29 concerning international character of city Jews have been especially incensed by eventuality of control of town being haided over to Arabs.

"Trust have therefore made up their minds to attempt to seize the rest of town before truce period comes into force in order to appear at peace negotiations with major trump card in hand.

"This confirms the end of my message of Monday last, stressing that unless Sacurity Council sound inmediately and vigorously, the international character of Jarusalem appeared to my colleagues and I to be dengerously threatened.

"On other hand, one of my American collengues assistants having crossed the lines into Old City yesterday, said that he found life there almost normal, damage by mortar shells negligible and Arab troops in occupation, calm and confident."
