Period of extensions: 1 January 2003 to 31 December 2003

Summary

Using the streamlined format introduced at the first regular session 2002 of the Executive Board, the present note contains information on the second one-year extensions of the first country cooperation frameworks (CCFs) for the Central African Republic and Thailand. The Governments concerned requested the extensions.

In accordance with established procedures, the Administrator approves the first one-year extension of CCFs while the second-year or two-year extensions are submitted to the Board for its approval. The attached table summarizes the reasons given for the CCF extensions.

The Executive Board may wish to approve the second extensions of the CCFs for the Central African Republic and Thailand for a period of one year, from 1 January 2003 to 31 December 2003.
