REPORT OF THE AD HOC SUB-COMMITTEE ON NAMIBIA

Addendum

- 1. The report of the Ad Hoc Sub-Committee on Namibia was issued on 23 September 1971. The annex to that report contained the substantive parts of 38 replies received from States to the request for relevant information.
- 2. Since then, the Secretary-General has received two additional replies from States. The substantive parts of these additional replies are reproduced below:

INDIA

/Original: English/ 28 September 1971

India was the first country to take diplomatic and economic steps against the Government of South Africa on account of her policies of <u>apartheid</u>. Apart from the boycott of trade in 1946, the Government of India, in response to the General Assembly resolution of 1961, took further action in 1962 in accordance with its provisions as follows:

- (a) Although India had withdrawn her High Commissioner from South Africa in 1946, her Mission, in a truncated form, had existed till 1954, and thereafter there were contacts between the two Governments through the High Commissioners in London. In 1962, the diplomatic relations were broken off.
 - (b) The Indian ports were closed to all vessels flying South African flags.
 - (c) The Indian ships were prohibited from entering South Africa.

- (d) India's trade boycott of South Africa was first imposed in 1946. In 1953, the Mandated Territory of South West Africa was treated as part of South Africa for this purpose.
- (e) Postal relations were broken, except for a few items on humanitarian grounds. Landing and passage facilities to all aircraft belonging to Government companies registered in South Africa were refused.

JORDAN

/Original: English/ 27 September 1971

The Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan does not maintain any diplomatic or consular relations with South Africa and has not concluded any treaty with that State. The Government of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan hopes that the Ad Hoc Sub-Committee on Namibia will succeed in its efforts to discharge its mandate and will be given all necessary help and support from all Members of the United Nations.
