Algeria, Nepal, Pakistan, Zambia: draft resolution

The Security Council,

<u>Taking note</u> of the complaints by Senegal against Portugal contained in documents S/9513 and S/9541,

Having heard the statements by the parties,

<u>Conscious</u> of its responsibility for taking effective collective measures to forestall and eliminate threats to international peace and security,

<u>Bearing in mind</u> that all States must abstain in their international relations from recourse to the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any State or from any action incompatible with the purposes of the United Nations,

<u>Concerned</u> about the serious situation created by the shelling of the village of Samine in the southern region of Senegal from the Bégène base,

<u>Deeply concerned</u> at the fact that incidents of this nature jeopardize international peace and security,

Bearing in mind its resolutions 178 (1963) of 24 April 1963 and 204 (1965) of 19 May 1965,

1. <u>Strongly condemns</u> the Government of Portugal for ordering the shelling of the village of Samine, which (1) on 25 November 1969 caused one death and eight seriously wounded, struck a building of the Senegalese gendarmerie and completely destroyed two houses in the village of Samine; and (2) on 7 December 1969, killed five persons and seriously wounded one woman;

2. <u>Again calls upon</u> Portugal to cease forthwith to violate the sovereignty and territorial integrity of Senegal;

3. <u>Declares</u> that in the event of failure by Portugal to comply with operative paragraph 2 of this resolution, the Security Council will again meet to consider other measures;

4. Decides to keep the question before it.
