Poland: draft resolution

International co-operation for development: towards  
confidence and common approaches

The General Assembly,

Noting with satisfaction the growing awareness of the community of interests in the international economic relations resulting from the progressing interdependence among national economies,

Convinced of the need to address jointly crucial challenges confronting the world economy, with the reactivation of growth, ensuring stable development of the developing countries in particular, and aware of the emerging common desire to develop international economic co-operation in the interest of all countries, particularly the developing countries,

Considering, in that connection, that enhanced confidence in international economic relations is essential in efforts to secure a more supportive, predictable and stable economic environment for non-inflationary growth and sustained development,

Considering also that mutual confidence and search for common approaches are indispensable to deal effectively both with urgent international economic and social problems, and with those of a protracted nature, especially on the eve of the elaboration of an international development strategy for the fourth United Nations development decade,

Conscious of the role of the United Nations in promoting such confidence and stimulating common approaches to international economic issues as exemplified by the results of the seventh session of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development,

1. Invites all States and organizations and bodies of the United Nations system concerned to undertake specific measures that may contribute to fostering confidence, predictability and reliability in international economic relations, and to promote common approaches to international economic issues, especially those confronting the developing countries;

2. Requests the Secretary-General to keep the matter under constant review and assemble the available information on the ongoing and planned activities of the United Nations system, which are relevant from that point of view, and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its forty-fifth session through the Economic and Social Council;

3. Appeals to Governments to continue utilizing the United Nations potential to promote constructive, concerted and mutually supportive economic policies of Member States.

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
