Programme of work of the Special Committee against Apartheid

The General Assembly,

Having considered the report of the Special Committee against Apartheid, 1/

- 1. <u>Commends</u> the Special Committee against <u>Apartheid</u> for its work in the discharge of its responsibilities in promoting international action against apartheid;
- 2. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Special Committee against <u>Apartheid</u> and endorses the recommendations contained in paragraph 194 of the report relating to its programme of work;
- 3. <u>Decides</u> to make a special allocation of \$400,000 to the Special Committee for 1989 from the regular budget of the United Nations to cover the cost of special projects to be decided upon by the Committee;

- 4. Requests Governments and organizations to provide financial and other assistance for the special projects of the Special Committee and to make generous contributions to the Trust Fund for Publicity against Apartheid;
- 5. Appeals to all Governments, intergovernmental organizations, information media, non-governmental organizations and individuals to co-operate with the Centre against Apartheid and the Department of Public Information of the Secretariat in their activities against apartheid, and in particular in disseminating information on the deteriorating situation in South Africa in order to mitigate the effects of the restraints on the press in South Africa and to effectively counteract South African propaganda.
