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**CIVIL AND POLITICAL RIGHTS, INCLUDING THE QUESTION
OF TORTURE AND DETENTION**

**Status of the Convention against Torture and Other Cruel,
Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment**

Report of the Secretary-General*

1. The General Assembly, in its resolution 39/46 of 10 December 1984, adopted and opened for signature, ratification and accession the Convention against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment, and called upon all Governments to consider signing and ratifying the Convention as a matter of priority.
2. The Convention was opened for signature in New York on 4 February 1985. In accordance with article 27 thereof, the Convention entered into force on 26 June 1987, on the thirtieth day after the date of the deposit with the Secretary-General of the United Nations of the twentieth instrument of ratification or accession.
3. The General Assembly, in its resolution 57/199 of 18 December 2002 adopted the Optional Protocol to the Convention. The Protocol was opened for signature on 4 February 2003. The Protocol shall enter into force on the thirtieth day after the date of deposit with the Secretary-General of the United Nations of the twentieth instrument of ratification or accession.

4. In its resolution 2003/32 of 23 April 2003, the Commission on Human Rights urged all States to become parties to the Convention against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment as a matter of priority; encouraged States parties to consider limiting the extent of any reservations they lodged to the Convention, to formulate any reservations as precisely and narrowly as possible and to ensure that no reservation was incompatible with the object and purpose of the Convention; also encouraged States parties to review regularly any reservations made in respect of the provisions of the Convention with a view to withdrawing them; invited all States ratifying or acceding to the Convention and those States parties which had not yet done so to make the declarations provided for in articles 21 and 22 of the Convention and to consider the possibility of withdrawing their reservations to article 20; urged States parties to notify the Secretary-General of their acceptance of the amendments to articles 17 and 18 of the Convention¹ as soon as possible; urged States parties to strictly comply with their obligations under article 19 and to include a gender perspective and information concerning children in their reports and called upon States parties to ratify the Optional Protocol to the Convention.

5. As at 10 December 2003, the Convention had been ratified, acceded to or succeeded to by 134 States. In addition, 12 States had signed the Convention. The list of States that have signed, ratified or acceded to the Convention, as well as the dates of their signature, ratification or accession, is contained in annex I to the present report.

6. As at the same date, 50 of the States parties to the Convention, namely Algeria, Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Cameroon, Canada, Costa Rica, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Ecuador, Finland, France, Germany, Ghana, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Malta, Monaco, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Paraguay, Peru, Poland, Portugal, the Russian Federation, Senegal, Serbia and Montenegro, Slovakia, Slovenia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Togo, Tunisia, Turkey, Ukraine, Uruguay and Venezuela, had made the declarations provided for in articles 21 and 22 of the Convention. In addition, four States parties, namely Japan, Uganda, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and the United States of America, had made the declaration provided for in article 21 only, thus bringing the total of declarations under that article to 54.² Azerbaijan, Burundi, Guatemala, Mexico and Seychelles had made the declaration provided for in article 22 only, thus bringing the total of declarations under that article to 455. Under article 21, a State party to the Convention may declare at any time that it recognizes the competence of the Committee against Torture to receive and consider communications to the effect that a State party claims that another State party is not fulfilling its obligations under the Convention. Under article 22, a State party to the Convention may declare at any time that it recognizes the competence of the Committee to receive and consider communications from or on behalf of individuals subject to its jurisdiction who claim to be victims of a violation by a State party of the provisions of the Convention.

7. The provisions of articles 21 and 22 entered into force on 26 June 1987 in accordance with paragraph 2 of article 21 and paragraph 8 of article 22.

8. As at 10 December 2003, seven States, namely Afghanistan, China, Equatorial Guinea, Israel, Kuwait, Morocco and Saudi Arabia had declared, in accordance with article 28, that they do not recognize the competence of the Committee provided for in article 20 of the Convention. Under article 20 (paras. 1 and 2), if the Committee receives reliable information which appears to it to contain well-founded indications that torture is being systematically practised in the territory of a State party, the Committee shall invite that State party to cooperate in the examination of the information and to this end to submit observations with regard to the information concerned. Taking into account any observations which may have been submitted by the State party concerned, as well as any other relevant information available to it, the Committee may, if it decides that this is warranted, designate one or more of its members to make a confidential inquiry and to report to the Committee urgently.

9. As at 10 December 2003 three States, namely Albania, Malta and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, have ratified or acceded to the Optional Protocol to the Convention. In addition to the 3 aforementioned, 19 States have signed the Optional Protocol, namely Argentina, Austria, Brazil, Costa Rica, Croatia, Denmark, Finland, Guatemala, Iceland, Italy, Madagascar, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, Romania, Senegal, Serbia and Montenegro, Sierra Leone and Sweden.

10. The Committee against Torture held its thirtieth and thirty-first sessions at the United Nations Office at Geneva from 28 April to 16 May 2003 and from 10 to 21 November 2003, respectively. In accordance with article 24 of the Convention, the Committee submitted its annual report,³ which covered the activities of the Committee at its twenty-ninth and thirtieth sessions, to the States parties and to the General Assembly at its fifty-eighth session.
