Accréditation des organisations non gouvernementales et d'autres grands groupes à la Réunion internationale chargée d'examiner la mise en œuvre du Programme d'action pour le développement durable des petits États insulaires en développement et à sa réunion préparatoire

Note du Secrétariat**

1. Dans sa résolution 58/213, l'Assemblée générale a décidé que l'accréditation et la participation des grands groupes, y compris les organisations non gouvernementales, à la Réunion internationale chargée d'examiner la mise en œuvre du Programme d'action pour le développement durable des petits États insulaires en développement, seraient régies par l'article 65 du règlement intérieur de la Réunion internationale, publié dans la note du Secrétaire général (A/58/567 et Corr.1). Dans la même résolution, l'Assemblée a décidé que les organisations non gouvernementales dont les travaux touchaient au thème de la Réunion internationale et qui n'étaient pas actuellement accréditées auprès du Conseil économique et social pourraient demander à participer, en qualité d'observateurs, à la Réunion internationale ainsi qu'à sa réunion préparatoire, sous réserve de l'approbation de cette dernière.

2. Par l'intermédiaire de sa Division du développement durable, le Département des affaires économiques et sociales a demandé à toutes les organisations non gouvernementales et aux autres grands groupes non accrédités souhaitant assister à la Réunion internationale et à sa réunion préparatoire de présenter leur demande, en y joignant les documents complémentaires nécessaires, pour évaluation. Avec l'aide

du Service de liaison avec les organisations non gouvernementales et des organes compétents de l'ONU, la Division s'est assurée que les activités de chaque organisation requérante s'inscrivaient dans le domaine concerné, compte tenu de ses antécédents et de son intérêt pour les questions de développement durable, en particulier dans le cadre du suivi de la Conférence des Nations Unies sur l'environnement et le développement et de la Conférence mondiale sur le développement durable des petits États insulaires en développement.

3. La Division a indiqué que si l'évaluation, compte tenu des informations fournies, permettait de conclure que les objectifs déclarés par l'organisation requérante étaient légitimes et que ses activités se rattachaient aux travaux de la Réunion internationale, elle recommanderait à la Commission du développement durable d'accréditer l'organisation en question. Si la recommandation était de ne pas accorder l'accréditation, la Division fournirait les motifs de sa décision à la Commission et soumettrait aux États Membres ses recommandations concernant toutes les demandes d'accréditation deux semaines avant le début de la réunion préparatoire.

4. La Division a reçu et évalué les demandes reçues à la date limite du 1er mars 2004, aux fins de leur examen par la Commission du développement durable à sa douzième session lors de la réunion préparatoire de la Réunion internationale, qui se tiendra du 14 au 16 avril 2004. La liste des organisations non gouvernementales et des autres grands groupes recommandés pour accréditation par la Division et de ceux qui ne le sont pas fait l'objet de l'annexe au présent document.
