REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FOR 2003: STATISTICAL OVERVIEW

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UNFPA IN 2003:

PROGRAMME AND FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS¹

Pledges and contributions

- Regular income in 2003 totalled \$293.1 million, an increase of 12.7 per cent compared to the 2002 income of \$260.1 million. This includes \$288.5 million in voluntary contributions, \$2.6 million in interest income, and other contributions of \$2.0 million.
- Pledges to UNFPA regular resources in 2003 totalled \$288.5 million from donor Governments and private contributions from the Mars Trust and the 34 Million Friends campaign. This is \$38.5 million, or 15.4 per cent, more than the \$250.0 million pledged in 2002. At year's end, cumulative pledges through 2003 totalled about \$5.8 billion from a cumulative total of 191 donors. The number of donors in 2003 totalled 151, composed of 149 donor Governments plus the Mars Trust and the 34 Million Friends campaign.
- Contributions to other resources of \$103.6 million were provided through trust funds (\$62.1 million), cost-sharing programme arrangements (\$27.8 million), and other arrangements (\$13.7 million). The contribution of \$103.6 million is a decrease of approximately 5.4 per cent compared to \$109.5 million in 2002. Interest and other income of \$2.0 million bring to \$105.6 million the total income for other resources for 2003.
- Total regular and other income in 2003 was \$398.7 million.

Expenditures

- Programme expenditures in 2003 totalled \$176.4 million, as compared to \$203.6 million in 2002. The 2003 figure includes \$140.5 million for country programmes, compared to \$172.5 million in 2002; and \$35.9 million for intercountry (regional and interregional) programmes, compared to \$31.1 million for 2002.
- The difference in programme expenditures for 2002 and 2003 was influenced by the difference between the amount of resources carried forward from 2001 to 2002 (\$39.9 million) and from 2002 to 2003 (\$6.6 million). In addition, there were one-time costs in 2003 related to operations, thereby further reducing the amounts available for the programme.
- Technical support services under the successor support cost arrangements approved by the Governing Council in decision 91/37 were \$13.9 million. Costs for administrative and operational services (AOS) amounted to \$5.0 million.

Country categories

- Executive Board decision 96/15 endorsed the procedure for allocating resources according to categorization of countries into groups, and decision 2000/19 updated the relative shares of resources to groups as follows: Group A, 67-69 per cent; Group B, 19-21 per cent; Group C, 7-9 per cent; countries with economies in transition, on a temporary basis, 3-4 per cent; and other countries and territories, 1.5 per cent. - The breakdown of resources expended for country programmes and projects in 2003, by group, is as follows: Group A, 65.5 per cent; Group B, 19.7 per cent; Group C, 9.0 per cent; countries with economies in transition, 4.9 per cent; and other countries and territories, 0.8 per cent.
- Total expenditures in 2003 to Group A countries amounted to \$92.1 million, compared to \$116.5 million in expenditures in 2002.

Intercountry activities

- Expenditures for intercountry activities (regional and interregional) totalled \$35.9 million in 2003, compared to \$31.1 million in 2002. By category of activity, these expenditures were: regional, \$12.7 million in 2003, compared to \$10.2 million in 2002; interregional, \$23.2 million in 2003, compared to \$20.9 million in 2002.
- Intercountry programmes accounted for 20.3 per cent of total programme expenditures in 2003 compared to 15.3 per cent in 2002.

Biennial support budget

• The provisional estimate for the net expenditure for the biennial support budget during the 2002-2003 biennium is approximately \$132.8 million, representing 24 per cent of regular resources and 17 per cent of total resources income.

Personnel

- As of 1 January 2003, the total number of authorized budget posts numbered 972, comprising 431 Professional (including 221 national programme officers) and 541 General Service staff. These include 109 Professional and 115 General Service posts at headquarters, 2 Professional and 2 General Service posts in Geneva and 320 Professional and 424 local General Service posts in the field.
- The percentage of women among UNFPA Professional staff at headquarters and in the field

was 47 per cent in 2003, one of the highest percentages among United Nations agencies and organizations. Moreover, 7 of the 14 members of the Fund's Executive Committee are women.
