QUESTION OF PALESTINE

Afghanistan, Bulgaria, Burkina Faso, Cuba, German Democratic Republic, India, Indonesia, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Madagascar, Malaysia, Mali, Malta, Pakistan, Senegal, Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic and Yugoslavia: draft resolution

The General Assembly,

Having considered the reports of the Secretary-General, 1/2

<u>Having noted with appreciation</u> the statement of the Chairman of the Palestine Liberation Organization, $\frac{2}{2}$

Stressing that achieving peace in the Middle East would constitute a significant contribution to international peace and security,

Aware of the overwhelming support for the convening of the International Peace Conference on the Middle East,

Noting with appreciation the endeavours of the Secretary-General to achieve the convening of the Conference,

<u>Welcoming</u> the outcome of the nineteenth Extraordinary Session of the Palestine National Council as a positive contribution towards a peaceful settlement of the conflict in the region,

<u>Aware</u> of the ongoing uprising (<u>intifadah</u>) of the Palestinian people since 9 December 1987, aimed at ending Israeli occupation of Palestinian territory occupied since 1967,

1. <u>Affirms</u> the urgent need to achieve a just and comprehensive settlement of the Arab-Israeli conflict, the core of which is the question of Palestine;

2. <u>Calls for</u> the convening of the International Peace Conference on the Middle East, under the auspices of the United Nations, with the participation of all parties to the conflict, including the Palestine Liberation Organization, on an equal footing, and the five permanent members of the Security Council, based on Security Council resolutions 242 (1967) and 338 (1973) and the legitimate national rights of the Palestinian people, primarily the right to self-determination;

3. <u>Affirms</u> the following principles for the achievement of comprehensive peace:

(a) The withdrawal of Israel from the Palestinian territory occupied since 1967, including Jerusalem, and the other occupied Arab territories;

(b) Guaranteeing arrangements for security of all States in the region, including those named in resolution 181 (II) of 29 November 1947, within secure and internationally recognized boundaries;

(c) Resolving the problem of the Palestine refugees in conformity with General Assembly resolution 194 (III) of 11 December 1948, and subsequent relevant resolutions;

(d) Dismantling of the Israeli settlements in the territories occupied since 1967;

(e) Guaranteeing of freedom of access to Holy Places, religious buildings and sites;

4. <u>Notes</u> the expressed desire and endeavours to place the Palestinian territory occupied since 1967, including Jerusalem, under the supervision of the United Nations for a limited period, as part of the peace process;

5: <u>Requests</u> the Security Council to consider measures needed to convene the International Peace Conference on the Middle East, including the establishment of a preparytory committee, and to consider guarantees for security measures agreed upon by the Conference for all States in the region;

6. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue his efforts with the parties concerned, and in consultation with the Security Council, to facilitate the convening of the Conference, and to submit progress reports on developments in this matter.
