LETTER DATED 8 OCTOBER 1965 FROM THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF INDIA  
ADDRESSED TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL

I have the honour to bring to your attention the following further violations of the cease-fire agreement by Pakistan:

Jammu and Kashmir

Keran Sector

(i) The Pakistani troops fired medium machine-guns and 81 MM mortars towards our troops in the area of Keran on 6/7 October. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

Tithwal Sector

(ii) The Pakistani troops fired 81 MM mortars towards our troops in an area two and one half miles north north-east of Mirpur on 6 October. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

(iii) Approximately sixteen Pakistani troops infiltrated in an area seven miles north of Tangdhar on 7 October but fled at the sight of our troops. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged with the United Nations Observers.

Uri Sector

(iv) The Pakistani troops were seen digging trenches and constructing bunkers in an area eight miles north-west of Uri on 6 October. They fled on being approached by our troops. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged with the United Nations Observers.

(v) One Pakistani helicopter flew over an area four miles west of Haji Pir at 1630 hours on 5 October.

Naushakra Sector

(vi) The Pakistani troops were seen repairing bunkers in an area three miles north-west of Jhangar on 6 October. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

(vii) The Pakistani troops directed rifle fire from their side of the Cease-fire Line towards our troops in an area three miles west north-west of Jhangar on 6 October 1965. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

Akhnur Sector

(viii) The Pakistani troops set fire to Village Samwan, seven miles north-east of Chhamb at 1430 hours on 5 October 1965. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

(ix) The Pakistani troops set fire to three small villages in an area between Dewa and Chhamb on 7 October.

Punjab

Sialkot Sector

(x) Approximately fifteen Pakistani troops were seen digging bunkers in an area two and three fourths miles north north-west of Suchetgarh on 5 October.

(xi) The Pakistani troops started digging in an area five miles south-west of Bajragarhi at 1200 hours on 5 October. They stopped digging when our troops warned them but again started digging in a nearby area at 1545 hours the same day. However, when two United Nations Observers stationed on the Pakistan side came to the area, they stopped digging and went back.

(xii) The Pakistani troops were seen constructing hangars on house tops in an area four and a half miles west of Bajragarhi on 5 October.

(xiii) A Pakistani air observation post aircraft approached from the direction of Magra approximately five miles west south-west of Bajragarhi and flew over Chak Sada, Isalpur, Kalarawanda and returned towards Pathanwali, approximately four miles west south-west, three miles west, three miles south-west and five miles south-west of Bajragarhi respectively. A cease-fire violation complaint is being lodged.

(xiv) A Pakistani air observation post aircraft flew along the railway line Chawinda-Sialkot at 0800 hours on 5 October.

(xv) A Pakistani air observation post aircraft flew over the area three and a half miles south-west of Rajragarhi at 1130 hours on 6 October.

(xvi) One Pakistani transport aircraft No. D 157 flew over Kangre, ten miles north-east of Chawinda, at 1150 hours on 6 October. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

#### Lahore Sector

(xvii) Ten Pakistani troops were seen digging east of Ichhogil canal in an area two and a half miles south of Jallo at 1530 hours on 5 October. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

(xviii) The Pakistani troops, approximately a company strong equipped with medium machine-guns, occupied an area seven miles north north-west of Kher Karan at 1700 hours on 5 October. This area had not been occupied by them previously and our troops warned them to move back but they refused to do so. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

(xix) The Pakistani troops started laying wire on the east bank of Ichhogil canal in an area six and a quarter miles west of Khalra at 1700 hours on 5 October, but they went back when warned by our troops.

(xx) Some Pakistani troops arrived in Barki from the direction of Lahore at 1800 hours on 6 October 1965. They occupied positions along the west bank of the canal on either side of the Barki bridge.

(xxi) Approximately thirty Pakistani troops were seen laying mines east of Ichhogil canal in an area four miles north of Barki on 6 October.

(xxii) Approximately ten to fifteen Pakistani troops crossed the Cease-fire Line and tried to lay mines in an area immediately west of Fograi on 6 October. On being challenged by our troops, the Pakistani troops withdrew. United Nations Observers have been informed.

(xxiii) Some Pakistani troops were seen digging in an area east of Ichhogil canal about three miles north-east of Padian and a quarter miles south-west of Jahman. About twelve of these Pakistani troops had taken position in the vicinity. Our patrol was fired upon with a light machine-gun at 1320 hours on 6 October when they went forward to tell the Pakistani troops to go back. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

(xxiv) The Pakistani troops were seen laying mines in an area one mile north of Hussainiwala headworks on 6 October. A cease-fire violation complaint is being lodged.

(xxv) One Pakistan air observation post aircraft was seen flying from west to east at a height of 2,000 feet over Jhatti Jaimal Singh and Iholan (both approximately six and a half miles north of Khem Karan) at 1005 hours on 6 October.

(xxvi) One Pakistani air observation post aircraft flew over our positions at Jhaman and Burj, approximately two and a half miles north north-west of Jhaman on 6 October.

(xxvii) A Pakistani two engined, propeller driven, aircraft was seen flying north-west to south of Khem Karan at 1030 hours on 6 October.

#### Fazilka Sector

(xxviii) The Pakistani troops fired intermittently at our security posts of Lena Betu, Jaloke Hithar and Bogege, opposite Mandot sector on the night between 5/6 October and again on 6 October from 0900 hours to 1500 hours.

(xxix) The Pakistani troops fired at our troops in an area three and a half miles south-east of Sulaimanke at 1800 hours on 5 October. A cease-fire violation complaint has been lodged.

(xxx) The Pakistani troops fired seven rifle shots towards our troops in area Chanawala on 6 October 1965. Stray shots were also fired by them in the same area on 7 October. Cease-fire violation complaints have been lodged.

(xxxi) A Pakistani air observation post aircraft flew over our forward defence localities in an area four miles south-east of Sulaimanke at 0900 hours on 6 October 1965. A cease-fire violation complaint is being lodged.

#### Rajasthan

(xxxii) Fifty Pakistani troops have intruded in the area Mithurau approximately thirty-five miles south south-east of Gadra road and 100 Pakistani troops in an area Sundra approximately thirty-eight miles north-west of Gadra road at 1730 hours on 5 October 1965.

(xxxiii) Two trucks load of Pakistani troops have infiltrated on 5 October into Village Soala in Barmer District, six miles inside the border.

(xxxiv) The Pakistani troops camping at Achchri Toba again attacked Tanot, a security picket, on the morning of 5 October.

(xxxv) The Pakistani troops fired at our patrol party on the morning of 5 October at a place about one and a half miles from a camp at Hassuwala Tar.

(xxxvi) The Pakistani troops fired three inch mortar bombs towards our troops in the area of Karnewala, approximately sixteen miles north-west of Bhikampur at 1000 hours on 7 October 1965.

(xxxvii) Two Pakistani aircraft flew over our post Asutar, approximately fifty-two miles north-west of Jaisalmer at 2010 hours on 6 October 1965.
