United Nations Cocoa Conference

The General Assembly,

Considering the relevant provisions of its resolutions 3201 (S-VI) and 3202 (S-VI) of 1 May 1974, concerning the Declaration and Programme of Action on the Establishment of a New International Economic Order, 3281 (XXIX) of 12 December 1974, containing the Charter of Economic Rights and Duties of States, and 3362 (S-VII) of 16 September 1975, relating to development and international economic co-operation,

Concerned at the increasing difficulties confronting developing countries in international trade in commodities and at the little progress that has been made so far in the preparatory meetings and negotiations on the majority of commodities under the Integrated Programme for Commodities, adopted by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development at its fourth session,

Considering that the question of commodities, in particular cocoa, was considered in depth at the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development by producers and consumers but that insufficient progress has been achieved to date,

Taking into account the work done so far with regard to commodities, and in particular cocoa,

Takes note of the efforts being made within the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development to implement the Integrated Programme for Commodities;

- 2. <u>Urges</u> all States participating in the United Nations Cocoa Conference to intensify consultations preparatory to the third part of the Conference, which will be held in Geneva in November 1979;
- 3. <u>Invites</u> all participating States to show the necessary political will during consideration of the main outstanding questions in order to create conditions conducive to the success of the negotiations for the speedy conclusion of an international agreement on cocoa.
