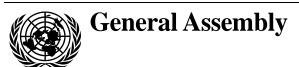

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Section 17A Regional commission

Overview

- 17A.1 The programme of work described below is based on programme 14, Economic and social development in Africa, of the biennial programme plan for the period 2006-2007, adopted by the General Assembly in its resolution 59/275 of 23 December 2004. This programme is under the responsibility of the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA).
- 17A.2 The overall objective of the programme is to assist African countries and their development organizations to formulate and implement appropriate policies and programmes for accelerated and sustained growth for poverty reduction in line with the goals and priorities of the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD) and internationally agreed development goals, including those contained in the United Nations Millennium Declaration (General Assembly resolution 55/2) and in the outcomes of major United Nations conferences and international agreements since 1992.
- 17A.3 The objective of the programme will be achieved through the implementation of activities in eight interdependent and complementary subprogrammes, which broadly reflect the development priorities of the region. The modalities for implementation will include research, advocacy and awareness-raising; policy analysis; organization of policy debates to facilitate consensus-building and adoption of common regional positions on key issues; and the provision of technical assistance in the form of policy advice, group training programmes and field projects to disseminate best practices for wider replication in the region.
- 17A.4 While many of the activities and outputs described in this programme budget reflect continuity in the direction of the work carried out by ECA in the previous biennium, a number of areas will receive greater attention and emphasis in the biennium 2006-2007. Key among these are statistics, addressing the issue of HIV/AIDS, transport and communications infrastructure development and gender mainstreaming. The work on statistics will be reoriented to focus on poverty-related statistics and indicators for tracking and reporting progress on the United Nations Millennium Development Goals in Africa, as well as towards further strengthening the coordination of statistical programmes in the region. Similarly, the programme will place renewed emphasis on addressing the special needs of the least developed countries and landlocked and other geographically disadvantaged countries.
- 17A.5 Emphasis will also be given to social development issues in the work under subprogramme 1, Facilitating economic and social policy analysis, with particular focus on increasing the awareness of member States of the need to pay more attention to emerging social issues in national policy formulation and implementation. In this context, the work of ECA in the area of HIV/AIDS will continue to focus on examining the development implications of the epidemic in Africa and help in promoting appropriate policy responses in its prevention and treatment.
- 17A.6 With regard to gender mainstreaming, ECA will continue to support its member States in ensuring that their development policies and programmes reflect a gender dimension. Specifically, ECA will track the advancement of women in Africa's development performance through the operationalizing tools it has developed, such as the African Gender Development Index and the Gender Aware macroeconomic model.
- 17A.7 During the biennium 2006-2007, continued emphasis will be given to deepening the ECA partnership agenda through special initiatives such as the African Development Forum, the African Learning Group on Poverty Reduction Strategy Papers, the ECA/Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) joint work on Mutual Review of Development

Effectiveness, the "Big Table" high-level dialogue among ministers of finance from selected African countries with their OECD counterparts on key development initiatives and promises for Africa and through the active contribution of ECA to the work of the Strategic Partnership with Africa on improving the quality of assistance to Africa. ECA will also continue to work closely with other institutions at the regional and subregional levels on issues of common concern to member States. ECA will also strengthen its cooperation with partners in the private sector, civil society and research institutions, as well as with bilateral and multilateral donors in support of Africa's development objectives.

- 17A.8 As a result of the comprehensive internal review undertaken in formulating the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2006-2007, the number of outputs for substantive divisions will be reduced by 159, or 32 per cent, from a total of 499 in the biennium 2004-2005 to 340 in 2006-2007. This reduction, which is aimed at concentrating limited resources on key outputs, will also lead to the creation of more synergies in the work programme, particularly between the ECA headquarters and the subregional offices, through the establishment of task-oriented intra- and interdivisional work teams based on a clear division of labour that emphasizes the complementarities in the work programme.
- 17A.9 The programme's main expected accomplishments and indicators of achievement for the biennium 2006-2007 are detailed, together with required resources, under the programme of work, as well as under executive direction and management. The overall framework of these expected accomplishments and indicators of achievement is shown in table 17A.1.

- 17A.10 The overall resources under this section amount to \$94,756,400, before recosting, reflecting a growth of \$100,000, or 0.1 per cent, compared with the revised appropriation for the biennium 2004-2005. The increase is the result of a range of adjustments in the activities and related resources proposed for this section, which may be summarized as follows:
 - (a) An increase of \$271,500 under executive direction and management to meet additional requirements for strengthening special programmes and partnership activities within and outside the continent in connection with resource mobilization and developing and leading the implementation of key development initiatives, such as the African Development Forum and the African Learning Group on Poverty Reduction Strategy Papers, with a view to leveraging the effectiveness of ECA. These activities require the redeployment of one P-3 post from programme support (\$264,000) and additional overtime resources to service high-level policy gatherings (\$7,500);

- An increase of \$562,300 under programme of work reflects additional post requirements for strengthening the five ECA subregional offices to enable them to serve as fully operational arms of ECA in delivering policy advice and undertaking operational work for member States and subregional international organizations, especially in the priority areas of implementation of the United Nations Millennium Development Goals and NEPAD. This strengthening is reflected in the net inward redeployment of two additional P-4 posts to the programme of work, in particular to subprogramme 7, Supporting subregional activities for development (\$717,400), partly offset by a decrease in non-post requirements (\$155,100) under consultants and experts, travel, contractual services and external printing, which is mainly due to the reduction of outputs mentioned in paragraph 17A.8 above;
- A decrease of \$733,800 under programme support resulting mainly from the net outward redeployment of three posts: one P-3 to executive direction and management and two P-4 posts to subprogramme 7 under programme of work (\$981,400), partly offset by the reclassification of a Field Service post to P-3 in order to reflect the increased responsibilities of the post (\$6,600), and additional non-post requirements (\$241,000), owing mostly to the expected increase in the cost of water and electricity and rental and maintenance of dataprocessing equipment, including the acquisition of new operating systems software and licences.
- 17A.11 In the biennium 2006-2007, the projected extrabudgetary resources of \$22,972,300, mobilized from mostly bilateral sources under agreements between the Commission and global and regional institutions and organizations concerned with African development, will supplement the regular budget to finance technical cooperation activities in the broad priority areas, including: building capacity for meeting the United Nations Millennium Development Goals; integrated water resources management; improving good governance systems; harnessing information and communication technologies for socio-economic development; strengthening capacity for trade negotiations; integrating gender concerns into development policies and programmes; and providing support to member States and the regional economic communities in the implementation of NEPAD. The projected decrease in extrabudgetary resources compared to the current biennium is based on conservative estimates of bilateral contributions pending the completion of negotiations for the renewal of the Memorandum of Understanding with ECA major donors.
- 17A.12 The issue of publications as a part of the programme of work has been reviewed in the context of each subprogramme. It is anticipated that recurrent and non-recurrent publications will be issued as shown below in summary and as distributed in the output information for each subprogramme.

Pursuant to General Assembly resolution 58/269 of 23 December 2003, resources identified for the conduct of monitoring and evaluation would amount to \$803,836, reflected under programme support. This amount includes \$504,700 under the regular budget and \$299,136 financed from extrabudgetary resources.

A. Policymaking organs

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$578,300

By its resolution 826 (XXXII) of 8 May 1997 regarding the reform of the intergovernmental machinery of ECA, the Commission established the structure and functioning of its intergovernmental machinery, comprising the Conference of African Ministers responsible for Economic and Social Development and Planning and its Technical Committee of the Whole, as well as the Conference of African Ministers of Finance, convened biennially in alternate years, and seven functional and sectoral subsidiary organs of the Commission. At its thirty-fourth session, in 2001, the Commission decided that those Conferences should be merged and henceforth should meet annually. The two subsidiary organs, the Committee on Industry and Private Sector Development and the Committee on Natural Resources and Science and Technology, were discontinued and the related issues are dealt with by the Committee on Trade and Regional Cooperation and Integration and the Committee on Sustainable Development.

Organs dealing with overall development issues

Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development and its Committee of Experts

17A.16 The Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development provides legislative mandate and policy guidance to the work of the Commission, considers and endorses the work programme of the ECA secretariat, serves as a forum articulating Africa's position on development issues on the agenda of the United Nations, and decides on the recommendations of its subsidiary bodies and of the Executive Secretary.

17A.17 Starting in 2001, the Conference of Ministers meets on an annual basis. The Committee of Experts meets prior to the Conference and provides technical support to the Conference. The Bureau of the Commission includes a representative from each of the five subregions of the continent, namely, North, East, Southern, West and Central Africa. It consists of a chairman, three vice-chairmen and a rapporteur.

Intergovernmental committees of experts of the ECA subregional offices

17A.18 The five intergovernmental committees of experts of the ECA subregional offices meet annually and report to the Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development. The committees oversee the overall formulation and implementation of the programme of work and priorities of the respective subregional development centres and make recommendations on issues concerning economic and social development in their respective subregions, as well as on the promotion and strengthening of subregional economic cooperation and integration.

Functional and sectoral subsidiary organs of the Commission

Committee on Women and Development

17A.19 The role of the Committee on Women and Development, as an advisory forum of experts and policymakers, is to provide guidance to the Commission in its work on the advancement of women. It also provides a platform for advocacy and for assessing follow-up and implementation by African Governments of the global and regional platforms for action for the advancement of women. In particular, it addresses issues relating to the economic empowerment of women, protection of their legal and human rights and improved access to education and health. It meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Development Information

17A.20 The Committee aims to strengthen the role of the Commission in assisting its member States in developing their national information and communication infrastructure by bringing together experts and policymakers to advise it in that area. The Committee's members include experts from such fields as planning, statistics and geo-information systems. The Committee meets biennially.

Committee on Sustainable Development

17A.21 The Committee serves as a forum of experts that provides advice to the Commission in the interlinked areas of food security, population, environment and human settlements. In this regard, it provides a platform for advocacy and assessment of follow-up activities by African Governments to regional and global plans of action, such as the relevant decisions and outcomes of the World Summit on Sustainable Development. The Committee also deals with issues related to the promotion of cooperation among African countries in the areas of science and technology and natural resources development and management. The Committee meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Human Development and Civil Society

17A.22 The Committee's mission is to promote human development and the participation of civil society in the development process. It enables ECA to draw on the opinions of experts in the public and private sectors and civil society in its operations. The Committee conducts development and follow-up activities pertaining to global conferences and regional action programmes. It reviews major trends and issues of regional interest regarding human development and society. The Committee meets biennially.

Committee on Regional Cooperation and Integration

- 17A.23 The Committee promotes the implementation of measures designed to strengthen economic cooperation and integration among African countries. It coordinates and harmonizes economic policies among African countries as a prerequisite for accelerating regional economic integration. In view of the importance of trade in regional cooperation and integration, the Committee also focuses on intra-African and international trade. It comprises experts in the field of international trade and integration drawn from Governments and the private sector. It meets on a biennial basis.
- With the exception of the Commission, which meets in a seven-day annual session, all 17A.24 intergovernmental organs of the Commission meet for a duration of from four to six days.

17A.25 The resource requirements in the amount of \$578,300, at the maintenance level, provide for the continuation of non-post resources, including temporary assistance for meetings, general temporary assistance, overtime, contractual services and operating expenses for servicing the sessions of the Commission and its subsidiary bodies and other related requirements.

B. Executive direction and management

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$3,987,900

- 17A.26 The activities under executive direction and management encompass the functions of the Executive Secretary, his or her immediate office, including the Deputy Executive Secretary, the Special Assistant to the Executive Secretary, the Secretary to the Commission and the Information and Communication Team.
- 17A.27 The Office of the Executive Secretary provides overall strategic direction and leadership for the integrated management of the programme of work and resources of ECA for secretariat-wide effectiveness and efficiency; ensures effective implementation of the resolutions and decisions of the intergovernmental organs; defines major regional strategies and plans of action for Africa's socio-economic development approved by the Commission; provides advocacy to member States and subregional and regional organizations in Africa; fosters ownership and policy consensusbuilding on urgent development issues facing the continent; leads resource mobilization efforts in the context of the ECA partnership agenda; and fosters wider outreach and dissemination of the results of ECA activities to Governments, other stakeholders and interested parties. In that respect, the Office maintains liaison with subregional and regional intergovernmental organizations, including, in particular, the African Union and the African Development Bank, on major regional development issues and concerns. The Office also coordinates, harmonizes and maintains liaison with United Nations specialized agencies, funds and programmes and other regional commissions on issues of mutual interest.

- During the biennium 2006-2007, the Office will continue: (a) facilitating and monitoring major international initiatives and programmes by development partners, as well as initiatives undertaken under the auspices of the United Nations, such as the United Nations Millennium Declaration and outcomes of major United Nations conferences and international agreements since 1992; (b) undertaking and overseeing special programmes, such as the African Development Forum and the Mutual Accountability process and Africa/OECD high-level policy forum; (c) playing a critical leadership and oversight role in terms of ECA support to the African Peer Review Mechanism and the overall NEPAD process; and (d) providing direction and policy orientation to sustain awareness of and policy support to address the impact on development of the HIV/AIDS pandemic in Africa.
- 17A.29 The Office also oversees the functioning of the intergovernmental machinery of the Commission, including the provision of overall direction and coordination in servicing its annual sessions and those of its subsidiary bodies.
- 17A.30 The Office includes the Information and Communication Team, whose role is to enhance information and communication flows on Africa's development; facilitate communication between ECA and its key constituents in and outside Africa; and raise awareness on the key challenges to development and the steps needed to address them. The Team also acts as a regional clearing house on African development issues for research institutions, donors and end-users of ECA products.

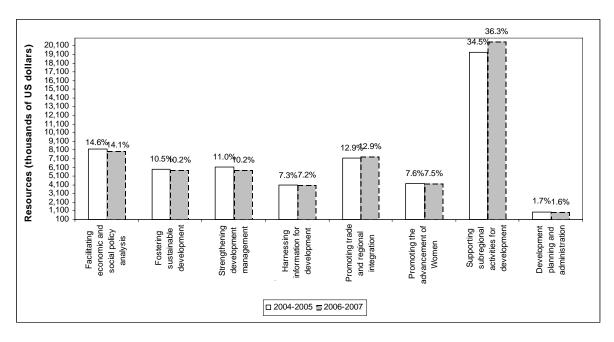
17A.32 The resource requirements of \$3,443,500 will provide for 19 posts, inclusive of 8 posts (1 P-5, 1 P-4, 2 P-3 and 4 General Service (Local level)) for the Information and Communications Team. It reflects an increase of \$264,000 resulting from the inward redeployment of one P-3 post from programme support to strengthen special programmes and partnership activities in connection with resource mobilization and to support the implementation of key development initiatives, such as the African Development Forum and the African Learning Group on Poverty Reduction Strategy. The amount of \$544,400 for non-post requirements includes an increase of \$7,500 for overtime resulting from an additional workload in servicing high-level forums and meetings in connection with the African Union and the African Development Forum themes and meetings of the NEPAD Heads of State Implementation Committee. The extrabudgetary resources of \$5,930,000, provided mostly through bilateral agreements, are in support of the special initiatives to advance Africa's Development Agenda, build consensus and help advocate Africa's position. These initiatives include: the African Development Forum; the high-level policy gathering ("Big Table") with the participation of the African Union, OECD, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), and the Bretton Woods institutions; the Poverty Reduction Strategy Learning Group established by ECA at the request of member States; and the Mutual Review process to sustain the mechanism for joint reviews and monitoring of aid effectiveness.

The statistics component of the subprogramme will be implemented by the Centre for Statistics under the overall leadership of the Division.

17A.56 The resource requirements of \$3,913,000, at the maintenance level, will provide for the continuation of 20 posts and for related non-post requirements of \$313,500, reflecting a decrease of \$14,700, which is due mainly to the reduction in the number of expert groups from three to one. Extrabudgetary resources of \$583,300, provided through bilateral agreements, are for operational activities, including advisory missions on assessing the effective use of the African Gender and Development Index, the gender-aware macroeconomic model and gender mainstreaming; and the organization of a regional workshop for policymakers on gender mainstreaming.

17A.69 The resource requirements of \$16,638,000 will provide for 87 posts and reflect an increase of \$908,700, which is the net result of: (a) the outward redeployment of three P-2/1 posts from this subprogramme to subprogrammes 3 and 5 and to programme support; (b) the inward redeployment of one P-5 and one P-3 posts from subprogramme 3 to strengthen the capacity of the ECA subregional offices for Central Africa and Southern Africa; (c) the inward redeployment of one P-3 post from subprogramme 5 to strengthen the capacity of the ECA subregional office for Southern Africa; and (d) the inward redeployment of two P-4 posts from programme support to strengthen the capacity of the ECA subregional offices for North and Southern Africa. The amount of \$3,895,800 for non-post requirements reflects an increase of \$294,600, which is mostly attributable to the increase in the number of expert groups from 15 to 17, as well as to the increase in the number of participants and in the duration of meetings, which reflect further steps to strengthen the ECA subregional offices to better serve their respective member States and regional economic communities. The provision of extrabudgetary resources (\$2,366,700) reflects the commitment on the part of member States and the Commission to strengthen the subregional element in the process of the integration of African economies, in particular through expansion of the operational activities of the Commission at the subregional level by financing special events, group training and field projects.

 - (a) Programme planning, budget and finance: provision of guidance and support to the substantive divisions in the formulation and preparation of the respective programme plans; preparation of an integrated programme of work; development of policy papers on the strategic orientation of the Commission, including the coordination of secretariat-wide preparation of major policy documents in the area of programme management and coordination; provision of guidelines and support services to programme managers in the preparation of programme budget proposals; assessment of activities in terms of their relevance to their original objectives and monitoring of the utilization of programme resources; financial disbursements, including payroll, vendors, per diem and other staff entitlements; and provision of support services to the subregional development centres and ECA-sponsored institutions. In addition, the activities include the provision of administrative and financial management of the technical cooperation activities carried out by the substantive divisions;
 - (b) Administrative support services: provision of overall administration and management, including financial management; control and guidance on the proper utilization of financial resources; financial management and control systems; and treasury services;
 - (c) Internal oversight services: establishment of procedures for systematic monitoring and evaluation of the progress made in the implementation of work programmes, including their results and impact; preparation of progress reports using inputs from the organizational units; preparation and implementation of self-evaluation at the subprogramme level; evaluation on managerial, operational and policy issues; in-depth evaluation on selected programme issues; preparation of budget performance reports for internal use and for subsequent submission to Headquarters; and organization of project review and evaluation, including the preparation of evaluation reports;
 - (d) Human resources management: recruitment and placement; provision of staff administration and staff welfare services; staff development and training formulation; management and administration of the United Nations Health Care Centre; staff-management relations; administration of justice; staff counselling; provision of personal and career counselling services to staff members, including the determination of courses of action to be taken to resolve disputes and conflicts;
 - (e) Conference services: provision of conference services to meetings of the policymaking organs of ECA and other intergovernmental meetings held under its auspices, including the preparation and coordination of meetings; provision of interpretation, translation and editorial services; and documentation and publication services;

(f) General services: provision of electronic support and communications services, including quality of service-compliant local area network connectivity at ECA headquarters and the subregional development centres; computerized systems development, including coordination of the Integrated Management Information System (IMIS); commercial and procurement services; transportation, logistics and travel services; shipping; contracts and legal services; facilities management and maintenance; archives and records management; and stores and inventory management.

17A.76 The resource requirements of \$22,084,000 will provide for 237 posts and reflect a decrease of \$974,800, which is the net result of: (a) the outward redeployment of three P-4 posts, one to subprogramme 5 and two to subprogramme 7 to strengthen the capacity of the ECA subregional offices for North and Southern Africa; (b) the outward redeployment of one P-3 post to executive direction and management to strengthen special programmes and partnership activities in connection with resource mobilization; (c) the inward redeployment of one P-2/1 post of Administrative Officer from the ECA subregional office for North Africa under subprogramme 7 to strengthen the administrative and finance activities of the Human Resources Management and Finance Division; and (d) the reclassification of one Field Service post to P-3 to recognize the more complex nature, increased accountability and responsibility of the post dealing with communications, videoconferencing and VSAT functions in view of the recent implementation of the ECA information and communication technology programme. The amount of \$11,449,100 for non-post requirements reflects an increase of \$241,000, which is mostly the result of additional requirements for: (a) utilities, due to the increase of water and electricity costs; and (b) the rental and maintenance of data-processing equipment, including the network operating system, library system, firewalls, anti-spam and anti-virus specialized applications and software maintenance and licence fees, partly offset by a decrease under miscellaneous services and other staff costs as a result of the realignment of the existing overtime provisions among the substantive subprogrammes, which were formerly budgeted centrally. Extrabudgetary resources of \$4,324,300 provide for improved services in the areas of finance, information technology, medical, travel, transportation and other miscellaneous services.

General Assembly

(resolution 58/270)

Requests the Secretary-General to report on further progress made to increase the capacity of the Economic Commission for Africa to communicate and transmit data electronically in the context of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2006-2007 (para. 54).

Following the commissioning of the Earth station in ECA, VSAT installations have taken place in ECA headquarters and four of the subregional offices and were finalized by the end of December 2004. The remaining subregional office and the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning are planned for 2005. This will enable full data, voice and videoconferencing communications to be used by all of the subregional offices.

General Assembly

(resolution 58/250)

Strongly discourages any invitation to host meetings which would violate the headquarters rule, in particular for the United Nations Office at Nairobi and other United Nations centres with a low utilization level (II, para. 6).

ECA does and will continue to ensure that all meetings held in its conference facilities are held in accordance with Headquarters rules and relevant security requirements.

Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (A/58/7)

The Advisory Committee notes that the presentation of resource requirements for information and communication technology in this part of the proposed programme budget varies from section to section and even within some of the sections (para. V.2).

Resources required for information and communication technology are shown under programme support above.

The Advisory Committee reiterates its view that publications need to be linked directly to expected accomplishments in the manner stated in paragraph 72 of the first report of the Advisory Committee on the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2002-2003. The Committee also recommends that thought be given to devising other means of providing the information now being communicated through hard-copy publications, such as increasing use of the Internet and the United Nations-wide Intranet, as well as seminars and workshops (para. V.4).

In the budget proposals for 2006-2007, ECA took note of the recommendation, both in terms of reviewing publications and use of the web. ECA has directed efforts and resources towards making publications available electronically.

Action taken to implement the recommendation

The Advisory Committee recalls its previous observations on interregional interaction and collaboration (see ibid., paras. V.28, V.31, V.49 and V.50) and requests that the regional commissions intensify their efforts, as well as coordination within the United Nations system. The Committee does not find the measures adopted so far to be adequate and believes that the regional commissions should intensify their efforts to collaborate and interact among themselves and with other regional entities in order to share experiences, lessons learned and workload (para. V.5).

The Advisory Committee recalls that in paragraph 72 of General Assembly resolution 56/253, the Assembly noted with concern the high proportion of General Service posts compared to Professional posts in the regional commissions and requested the Secretary-General to report to it at its fifty-seventh session on efforts undertaken, as appropriate. The Committee notes the information contained in paragraph 66 of the Introduction to the proposed programme budget, and requests that information on such steps as may have been taken to address the request of the Assembly, including the elaboration of local prevailing conditions, be provided for each regional commission in the context of the next estimates (para. V.6).

The Advisory Committee notes that no explanation was provided for the changes in the composition of staffing funded from extrabudgetary sources. The Committee requests that a brief explanation of changes in extrabudgetary posts and non-post resources that are not subject to separate review by the Committee be included in future budget submissions (para. V.10).

The Advisory Committee notes that 52 Professional posts, or 23.4 per cent, and 23 General Service posts, or 6.6 per cent, remained vacant at ECA as of 31 May 2003. The Committee is concerned that little progress has been made in improving the incumbency situation at ECA in the Professional category of staff. The Committee was informed that despite

ECA has made efforts in this regard in October 2004 with a visit to the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean by the Chief of Administration and programme coordination staff, thus ensuring that modalities and best practices are shared among the regional commissions. Efforts are being made to harmonize practices for monitoring reporting and evaluation. It is expected that interregional collaboration among the regional commissions will enhance the effectiveness and impact of the services they deliver.

ECA continues to make an effort to reduce the ratio between General Service and Professional staff through exploring the possibility of outsourcing some of the services. Addis Ababa has a limited number of established companies with which ECA could arrange for outsourcing of the specific services required. ECA will continue its efforts to find a creative solution by setting up a joint staff-management team to review options and submit its proposal for consideration.

The changes in the level and composition of staff funded from extrabudgetary resources are the direct result of expected extrabudgetary funds received and as per specific donor approved projects. Funds are allocated to reflect the priority activities for the Commission within the biennium.

ECA has filled 49 out of the 52 Professional posts that were vacant in May 2003. From 1 June 2003 to 15 December 2004, ECA filled 69 vacancies. In 2004, 59 posts were filled, 17 of which were through internal ECA promotions and 2 lateral movements between divisions. In 2004, ECA was able to significantly reduce its vacancy rate by 73 per

Action taken to implement the recommendation

efforts to recruit on a short-term basis, between 5 and 17 per cent of programmed activities in some divisions had not been delivered because of the vacancy situation. The Committee was informed that the difficulties the Commission was experiencing with the use of the Galaxy recruitment system were due primarily to inadequate staff training. The Committee was further informed that the measures taken so far by ECA to rectify the situation included: (a) the establishment of a task force composed of recruitment focal points from every division to monitor and review progress in recruitment; and (b) training of staff in the Galaxy recruitment database. Pending the resolution of problems with the Galaxy system, United Nations system offices in the region could be used to publicize ECA vacancies. The Advisory Committee requests that consideration be given to enhancing the authority delegated to ECA for recruitment (currently up to the P-4 level) on an exceptional basis to speed up the recruitment process. The Committee also requests that the next budget submission for ECA contain information on progress achieved in the incumbency situation there (para. V.11).

The Advisory Committee was informed, upon enquiry, that at the time of the consideration of the budget submission 83 posts (27 security officers, 11 drivers, 16 clerks, 6 finance assistants, 6 technicians, 6 cleaners and 11 messengers) were funded from general temporary assistance for periods sometimes exceeding 10 years. The Committee understands that many of these staff perform continuing functions. In this connection, the Committee recalls its recommendation that the issuance of 11-month contracts to meet continuing needs be discontinued and that strict controls be put in place to prevent future misuse of general temporary assistance funds (para. V.15).

cent. However, the vacancy rate for the upcoming year will remain slightly on the high side due to several factors: (a) 22, or 10 per cent, separations (retirement, resignation, transfer, etc.) between 2003 and 2004; (b) 19 posts filled through promotion and internal movements, which created 19 new vacancies, or 8.6 per cent; (c) a number of posts had to be recirculated due to candidates declining offers; (d) ECA has difficulty filling its 8 information technology and administrative P-2 posts, which represents a 3.6 per cent of vacancy rate. In 2004, despite filling 59 posts, 29 new vacancies were created through separations and promotions. Both staff members and programme managers are well conversant in using Galaxy as a recruitment tool, hence the speed of processing vacancy cases has increased. ECA has also been very successful in attracting national competitive examination candidates for substantive functions (economic affairs). Eleven P-2 staff members were recruited between 2003 and 2004 and three more will be reporting within the next two months. With the number of vacancies significantly reduced, and the experience gained in the last two years, ECA is confident of its ability to fill its new vacancies timely in the coming years.

ECA has set up a joint staff-management team to review this matter. The staff funded by general temporary assistance have provided considerable length of service to the Commission. This is further complicated by the lack of other employment opportunities outside ECA. The objective of the joint staffmanagement team is to propose options for consideration.

Action taken to implement the recommendation

With regard to the amount of \$1,364,300 (before recosting) requested under other staff costs for, inter alia, temporary assistance for meetings for translation, interpretation, proofreading and editorial services, the Advisory Committee is of the opinion that considerable efficiency and productivity are possible in the use of these resources. The Committee encourages the Commission to explore opportunities for sharing workload by taking account of spare capacity that may exist at a given period of time at other duty stations in such areas as translation, editing, printing and interpretation. For example, the United Nations Office at Nairobi projects that it will use only 34 per cent of its interpretation capacity during the next biennium. The Committee observes that workload-sharing has the potential to optimize the use of staff and non-staff resources and could lead to savings in some services for the receiving duty station. The Committee requests that progress in the area of workload-sharing be reported in the context of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2006-2007 (para. V.16).

The Advisory Committee welcomes the information provided in table 18A.27 of the budget submission on the progress made to increase the videoconferencing capacity of the Commission. The Committee stresses that increased capacity to communicate and transmit data electronically could improve efficiency and productivity and reduce costs for travel of staff and pouch services. The Committee requests that further progress in this regard be reported in the context of the next proposed programme budget of ECA (para. V.19).

The Advisory Committee notes from the supplementary information provided to it that a significant increase is proposed for contractual services for external printing, public information services, editing, translation, hiring of short-term staff for peak workload periods, training, advertising and so

ECA and the United Nations Office at Nairobi have collaborated on providing temporary assistance to meetings, primarily language assistance for interpretation at meetings. It is worth noting that the United Nations Office at Nairobi has a limited number of interpreters available in the working languages required. Experience in the past year has shown that the services offered by the United Nations Office at Nairobi for interpretation are not sufficient to cover the growing needs of ECA. This being said, the United Nations Office at Nairobi and ECA are continuing their collaboration where it is cost-efficient to do so and when excess capacity is available to cover the needs of ECA. In the areas of translation and editing, the United Nations Office at Nairobi has confirmed that no excess capacity exists. ECA and the United Nations Office at Nairobi collaborated on a charge-back basis on the French translation of the ECA flagship publication, the Economic Report on Africa 2004. The expected benefits of this outsourcing of activities were not all fully realized.

The videoconferencing capability of ECA and its five subregional offices was enhanced following the successful implementation of the videoconferencing project. The required equipment was procured and installed in the ECA headquarters, allowing the Commission to hold several conferences with United Nations Headquarters. It is planned to finalize the installation of videoconferencing capability with all the subregional offices with VSAT capability in 2005. As a result of the VSAT installation all offices will have connectivity for videoconferencing facilities.

There is a decrease (\$234,400) in the funds requested for contractual services in the budget proposals of 2006-2007. The contractual services for ECA relate, in the main part, to translation, interpretation, editing and preparation of documents for conferences and meetings. The funds requested for external

Action taken to implement the recommendation

on. The Committee welcomes the efforts of the Commission to expand its internal printing capabilities and encourages further progress in this area; the Commission should also explore the possibility of reducing the amount of external printing by making available, when feasible, as many of its publications as possible in electronic format, taking into account the specific situation of end-users (para. V.20).

printing and translation are primarily for flagship publications, as ECA has built its internal capacity in the reproduction area to cater for the majority of its printing needs. Outside expertise/knowledge is required where the in-house expertise of current staff at the required level of delivery is not available to meet the demands of substantive areas.

The Advisory Committee was informed, upon enquiry, that the Commission was required to report to all donors on the use of funds provided by them. The Committee trusts that standard reporting mechanisms will be formulated in consultation with the donor community with a view to simplifying the reporting process and rationalizing the frequency of reports, thereby reducing the attendant workload and costs. The Committee suggests that the experience of UNHCR and the World Food Programme, which had received similar requests from the Committee, be investigated (para. V.23).

A standardized and harmonized reporting mechanism was developed and has been in use since June 2002. This followed a number of study visits to the World Bank, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to share experiences and learn the best practices of these organizations, which have substantial extrabudgetary resources. The current ECA reporting system has been simplified and accepted as a standard reporting formula by all bilateral donors.

The Advisory Committee notes that extrabudgetary resources have been used in ECA to establish capacity in information and communication technology. The Committee welcomes this development. However, it emphasizes that requirements for short- and long-term maintenance and upgrading should be fully taken into account at the time of receipt of extrabudgetary resources (para. V.24).

Steps have been taken to ensure the sustainability of extrabudgetary funds to enable the Commission to effectively undertake its communication activities, including enhancing its outreach and output dissemination of its major products, including its publications.

The Advisory Committee observes that, although the work programme of ECA is based on programme 14 of the medium-term plan for the period 2002-2005, entitled "Economic and social development in Africa", there is no subprogramme entitled "Social development", unlike the sections dealing with Asia and the Pacific (Sect. 19) and Latin America and the Caribbean (Sect. 21), nor is there a subprogramme dealing with transport (para. V.25).

While there is no subprogramme for social development, issues and concerns in this area are being addressed by ECA subprogramme 1, Facilitating economic and social policy analysis. This subprogramme covers three critical components, namely, economic analysis and management, social development, and statistics.

Action taken to implement the recommendation

The reply in table 18A.27 does not deal satisfactorily with the request of the Advisory Committee, and the representatives of the Commission confirmed that as yet no impact analysis had been conducted. The Committee notes from table 18A.2 that 107 publications would be produced by ECA during the biennium 2004-2005, compared with 88 for the current biennium (para. V.27).

The work of ECA was assessed during an external review undertaken in 2004. The thirty-seventh session of the Commission considered and endorsed the work of ECA and recommended the strengthening of dissemination of publications and the monitoring and evaluation function. These recommendations have been taken into account in the 2006-2007 proposed programme budget by including evaluation plans for the subprogrammes.

Office of Internal Oversight Services(OIOS) (A/58/785)

The Executive Secretaries of the regional commissions should undertake an overall reassessment of their intergovernmental machinery to streamline the processes and avoid duplication. Recommendations to revitalize and support those entities that could be useful and a change in the focus of others that have been inactive should be presented to the member States for their consideration. The Executive Secretaries should specifically review the overall coherence and effectiveness of their respective intergovernmental bodies, with particular emphasis on: (i) standardizing rules and procedures for the establishment of those bodies (including subsidiary bodies); (ii) regularly reviewing and monitoring participation by members of the regional commissions; (iii) clarifying mandates to avoid overlap among different bodies; (iv) revisiting mandates of non-functioning bodies; (v) aligning those bodies and the substantive divisions servicing them; and (vi) regularly reporting and following up on the recommendations made by intergovernmental bodies (para. 71).

ECA has complied with this recommendation. The ECA review undertaken in 2004 included an assessment of its intergovernmental machinery. As a result, the thirty-seventh session of the Commission recommended a deeper role by member States in setting priorities. In developing the 2006-2007 proposed programme budget, the recommendations of the intergovernmental machinery were reviewed and incorporated in the work programme. The sectoral committees have also reviewed the proposed work programme of their respective divisions before its finalization. Thus, there has been an improved alignment between the subsidiary bodies and the substantive divisions, while the mandates of the sectoral bodies in guiding the work of the subprogrammes have been reemphasized.

OIOS recommends that in the area of fundraising, there should be a focal point within each regional commission to: (i) follow up on all fund-raising meetings, contacts and activities; (ii) coordinate, prepare and follow up on the pledging conference; (iii) maintain a database of all projects in need of fund-raising; (iv) prepare a quarterly report on the progress The Executive Secretary, as the primary fundraiser for the Commission, is assisted and supported by a Principal Adviser who is responsible for ECA partnership activities and provides follow-up on all fund-raising meetings, contacts and activities, while the Chief, Trust Fund and Project Management Unit, prepares and follows up on the pledging

Action taken to implement the recommendation

of fund-raising activities for the Executive Secretaries, with circulation to all divisional heads; and (v) exchange best practices and lessons learned in fund-raising efforts (para. 77).

The Executive Secretaries of the regional commissions should exchange best practices with respect to the recruitment of regional advisers, the development of work plans and the monitoring, reporting and evaluation of all regional advisory activities, so that their respective regional advisory services can be better integrated into their substantive divisions' work programmes and thereby achieve maximum thematic impact (para. 79).

The Economic Commission for Africa should review whether the re-establishment of separate statistics divisions, with a minimum critical mass of statisticians, would strengthen their statistical strategy and outputs and better guarantee methodological standards in their respective regions. An exchange of best practices among the regional commissions could contribute to that assessment (para. 81).

The Executive Secretaries of the regional commissions should establish a mechanism for:
(i) assessing the quality of publications;
(ii) categorizing a publication as a "flagship";
(iii) harmonizing the timing of the issuance of flagship publications; (iv) implementing peer-

conference, funding agreements reached with both bilateral and multilateral donors, and maintains a database of all projects in need of fund-raising and for which funds have been received. The Trust Fund Unit also prepares a quarterly report on trust funds activities for the Executive Secretary, which is circulated to all divisional heads. To enhance the management of the trust funds of the Commission and enhance their funding base, ECA has undertaken a number of missions to the World Bank and some United Nations offices with substantial extrabudgetary resources, such as UNICEF, UNHCR and OHCHR to share experiences and adapt best practices in fundraising efforts and overall trust fund management.

Following the recent review of the regular programme of technical cooperation undertaken by the Secretary-General, ECA has reviewed and updated the operational guidelines governing the management of technical cooperation activities. As part of the biennial programme plan for the period 2006-2007, ECA has also put in place an improved mechanism for prioritizing technical cooperation activities.

A number of steps have been taken to strengthen the statistics function at ECA. These include the establishment of an Advisory Board on Statistics in Africa and a Forum on African Statistical Development, and the preparation of an overall Strategic Framework for African Statistical Development over the next decade (i.e. 2005-2014). ECA is planning to launch a number of field projects to enhance national capacities to implement the 1993 System of National Accounts and to develop basic data, including household, poverty and gender statistics.

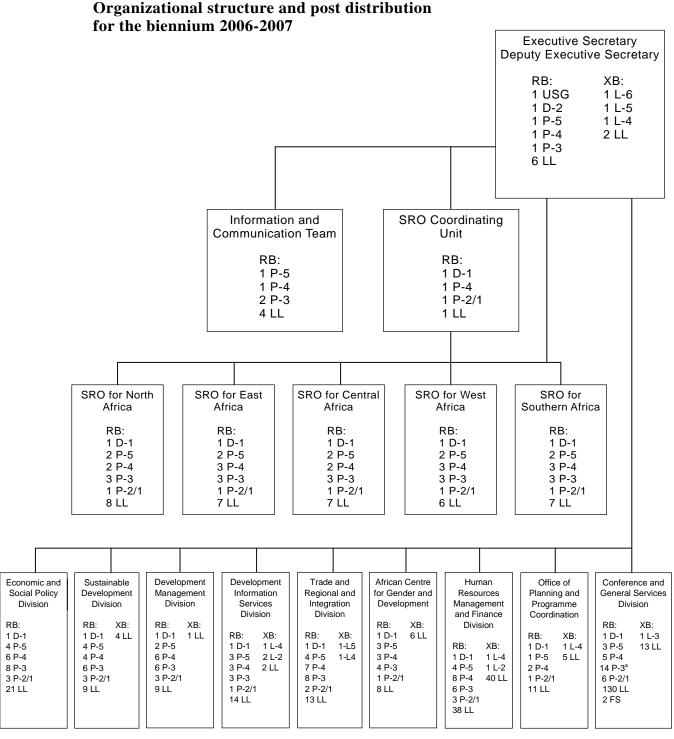
ECA has reconstituted the Publications Committee to look into the issues raised by the Office of Internal Oversight Services. The Committee has the responsibility to oversee the publications. Its main functions will be to: (a) categorize the types of publications;

review exercises; (v) assessing the composition of the readership; and (vi) exchanging best practices and lessons learned. That could enable the regional commissions to improve the dissemination of information to their respective regions, improve access to their publications and standardize policies for the downloading of their documents (para. 83).

Action taken to implement the recommendation

- (b) implement peer-review mechanisms;
- (c) work towards harmonizing the timing of the issuance of flagship publications of the regional commissions; and (d) ensure compliance with recommended publication types, characteristics and requirements. During 2004, significant progress was achieved in peer review of ECA flagship publications.

Section 17B Regional Commissions New York Office

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$1,585,600

The Regional Commissions New York Office serves as the focal point for all aspects of the substantive and operational activities of the five regional commissions with departments, offices and programmes at United Nations Headquarters, as well as with United Nations funds and programmes based in New York. It also maintains regular contact, on behalf of the regional commissions, with permanent missions of States Members to the United Nations, relevant intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations and the general public. The Office acts as the global coordinating secretariat for the cooperative and interregional activities of the regional commissions. It provides the commissions with analysis and synthesis of developments as they occur during the course of meetings of the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council and their subsidiary bodies, as well as United Nations inter-agency meetings held at Headquarters. It also provides substantive support for participation of the regional commissions in the Executive Committee on Economic and Social Affairs and represents the regional commissions at meetings of the subsidiary bodies of the United Nations System Chief Executives Board for Coordination and the United Nations Development Group.

Outputs

- 17B.2 Representation of the five regional commissions at Headquarters at intergovernmental and intrasecretariat meetings; provision of information among the regional commissions, Headquarters, permanent missions of Member States in New York and the general public; and coordinating services among the regional commissions. The Office publishes a biennial newsletter in print and on the United Nations website, which is circulated to delegations, relevant United Nations funds and programmes, agencies of the United Nations system, other interested institutions and the general public.
- 17B.3 The Office is responsible for the preparation of the annual report of the Secretary-General on regional cooperation in the economic, social and related fields, which is submitted to the Economic and Social Council at its substantive session, and provides substantive servicing to the Council during its consideration of the item on regional cooperation.
