LETTER DATED 16 MARCH 1977 FROM THE SECRETARY-GENERAL TO GOVERNMENTS OF ALL STATES MEMBERS OF THE UNITED NATIONS AND MEMBERS OF THE SPECIALIZED AGENCIES, CONTAINING A FURTHER APPEAL FOR VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE FINANCING OF THE UNITED NATIONS PEACE-KEEPING FORCE IN CYPRUS

I should be most grateful if you would bring to the urgent attention of your Government this special appeal which I am addressing to all States Members of the United Nations or members of specialized agencies in order to obtain additional voluntary contributions for the United Nations Peace-keeping Force in Cyprus (UNFICYP).

The importance of UNFICYP has been emphasized time and again by the Security Council, and the stationing of the Force in the island has been repeatedly extended by it. Most recently, in its resolution 401 (1976) 1/ of 14 December 1976, the Council noted from my report that in existing circumstances the continued presence of UNFICYP was essential, not only to help maintain quiet in the island, but also to facilitate the continued search for a peaceful settlement, and it decided to extend the stationing of the Force in Cyprus for a further period of six months ending 15 June 1977.

This decision has taken on added importance in view of the meeting that I held on 12 February 1977 with His Beatitude Archbishop Makarios and His Excellency Mr. Denktash, at which it was decided to resume the intercommunal talks under my auspices. At the same meeting guidelines were agreed upon for the interlocutors in the talks. The results of that meeting have certainly enhanced the prospects of a just and lasting settlement of the Cyprus problem.

I shall, of course, continue to do all I can to maintain the United Nations Force in Cyprus, but in this connexion I am obliged to point out the increasing difficulties in this endeavour in view of the continuing deficit in the UNFICYP budget. As you know, UNFICYP is financed by voluntary contributions. But the voluntary contributions provided have been utterly insufficient and the deficit in UNFICYP's budget has now grown to nearly \$44 million. As I have warned the Security Council on two occasions, UNFICYP may well one day find itself unable to function for lack of funds if additional voluntary contributions are not received in time.

I consider it essential to remedy this situation as a matter of urgency. I need hardly emphasize that my responsibility in regard to this peace-keeping operation can be discharged only if Governments provide the necessary support for it. I am therefore appealing to your Government to respond promptly and generously with a voluntary contribution to enable UNFICYP to carry out its important function.

FINANCIAL POSITION OF UNFICYP

The basis for the financing of UNFICYP, as decided by the Security Council, is by voluntary contributions. Since 1964, 62 countries have made payments of pledges on that basis. Voluntary contributions paid or pledged to the UNFICYP Special Account since the beginning of the operation, as well as the pledges and payments received so far for the period from 16 June 1976 to 15 December 1976, are listed in the attached table. In addition, Governments contributing contingents are continuing to bear at their own expense considerable extra costs incurred as a result of this operation (see foot-note a/ to attached table).

The contributions received from Governments have not been sufficient, however, to cover expenditures for the maintenance of the United Mations Force. The accumulated deficit for the period through 15 December 1976 now stands at \$43.8 million, as compared to the total of \$39.7 million which I indicated in my letter to you of 15 July 1976. One pledge, in the amount equivalent to \$842,000 approximately, has been received so far towards the costs, estimated at \$12.7 million, of maintaining the Force during the current six-month period ending 15 June 1977.

As a result of the shortfall in contributions and the resulting deficit, the bills presented by the troop-contributing Governments to the United Mations for reimbursement of their extra and extraordinary costs have been met only to June 1973. The practical effect of this situation has been that these Governments have continued to shoulder a disproportionate burden in providing contingents for this United Nations peace-keeping operation. The Governments concerned have conveyed to me their growing and very serious concern over this situation, which may oblige some of them to reduce their contingents or withdraw them from Cyprus.
