#### I. OBJECTIVE AND MANDATE OF THE EXPERT GROUP MEETING

- 1. International trade and transport of radioactively contaminated scrap metal increasingly causes concern among Governments as it may have severe negative consequences for public health, the environment and for security. Therefore, its monitoring and control have become important issues to be tackled at the international level.
- 2. In 2004, the UNECE hosted a first expert group meeting to begin addressing the issue of radioactive scrap metal, which was described in detail in a UNECE report published in 2001 on the "Improvement of the Management of Radiation Protection Aspects in the Recycling of Metal Scrap". Three recommendations emerged from this meeting:
- (a) The need to establish a voluntary international Protocol providing for a consistent and internationally harmonized approach to monitoring and response procedures;
- (b) The desirability to have an Internet-based information exchange system open to all concerned parties;
- (c) The need for training and capacity-building programmes on best practices.<sup>2</sup>
- 3. As a consequence, the UNECE, with funding from the Government of the United States of America, has developed a second phase of the project, with a particular focus on the development of a voluntary international Protocol that would help Parties to better identify the problem, effectively manage their responses and harmonise their approach. This proposal is inspired by experiences made in Spain following a serious incident in 1998.
- 4. This present meeting aims to reach general agreement on such a voluntary international Protocol (hereafter referred to as "the Protocol").

# ITEM 3 - NEED FOR ACTION AND OBJECTIVES OF A VOLONTARY INTERNATIONAL PROTOCOL ON RADIOACTIVELY CONTAMINATED SCRAP METAL

- 7. The Group of Experts may wish to reassess the concerns of governments and the metal processing industries about the control of scrap metal and the potential use of radioactively contaminated scrap metal by the steel and foundry industries worldwide.
- 8. In this respect, the Group of Experts may wish to take note of the so-called Spanish Protocol for collaboration on radiation monitoring of metallic materials that has been developed in Spain in 1998 following a serious incident in the metal scrap industry (reproduced in document ECE/TRANS/AC.10/2006/2). Information on experiences made with this important national initiative will be provided at the meeting.
- 9. The Group of Experts may also wish to consider the need for action at the international level and review the positions held earlier by experts participating in these UNECE activities. In particular, the Group of Experts should concur with the strategy that has been followed in the preparation of the voluntary international Protocol on radioactively contaminated scrap metal. To facilitate discussions, the UNECE secretariat has prepared a document that recalls the mandate of these activities and highlights the issues addressed in the proposed Protocol, such as its objectives and scope as well as stakeholders and areas of action to be addressed (ECE/TRANS/AC.10/2006/3). The document also stresses that the Protocol would not constitute legal commitments, but should establish a framework of recommended actions and good practices to support governments and the metal scrap and metal processing industries to prevent the use of radioactively contaminated scrap metal and to act jointly, responsibly and effectively in case of radioactive incidents.

#### **ITEM 4 - OVERVIEW OF KEY ISSUES**

10. The Group of Experts is expected to consider the key issues to be addressed at the international level with a view to minimizing all problems associated with radioactive contamination of scrap metal and to facilitate its handling and trade during all stages of the metal recycling process.

- 11. As a basis for discussions the UNECE secretariat has prepared a document that provides an analysis of the questionnaire replies from more than 50 countries covering the period 2003 to 2005. The document also undertakes an overview of good practices in these countries and identifies areas and issues needing particular attention (ECE/TRANS/AC.10/2006/4).
- 12. The Group of Experts will also be informed of progress made by selected countries and international organizations in addressing radioactive contamination of scrap metal, particularly focusing on the three main fields of action identified earlier: prevention, detection, and reaction (including reporting).

# ITEM 5 - DRAFT VOLUNTARY PROTOCOL: INTERNATIONAL RECOMMENDATIONS TO MONITOR AND MANAGE RADIOACTIVE SCRAP METAL

#### A. Body of the Protocol

- 13. In accordance with the recommendations adopted at the first expert group meeting in 2004 (TRANS/AC.10/2004/4) and taking account of questionnaire replies from more than 50 countries, the UNECE secretariat, assisted by country experts, has prepared a draft of a voluntary international Protocol on radioactively contaminated scrap metal (ECE/TRANS/AC.10/2006/5 and Add.1).
- 14. The Group of Experts may wish to consider and agree on the basic provisions of the Protocol that would establish, a framework of recommended actions and good practices to support governments and the metal scrap and metal processing industries to prevent the use of radioactively contaminated scrap metal and to act jointly, responsibly and effectively in case of radioactive incidents.
- 15. The Group of Experts could start by considering and agreeing on the layout and structure of the Protocol and its annexes as contained in document ECE/TRANS/AC.10/2006/5. It could then review the specific provisions and recommendations contained in the body of the Protocol relating to its three major sections:

#### General provisions

(Definitions, aim, scope, existing recommendations and legal instruments, sources of contaminated scrap metal, responsibilities and coordination, costs and financing);

#### Fields of action

(Prevention, detection, reaction/reporting (by stakeholders), management of detected radioactive sources);

#### Additional provisions

(Training, international information exchange, monitoring procedures, etc.).

The Group of Experts may wish to consider and agree in principle on the proposed annexes to the Protocol that would provide specific reference lists and guidance on good practices based on the provisions and principles recommended in the body of the Protocol. An outline of these annexes is contained in document ECE/TRANS/AC.10/2006/5/Add.1. While these annexes would be an integral part of the Protocol, they have not yet been fully developed by the UNECE secretariat pending a decision on the basic provisions of the Protocol. If approved by the Group of Experts, the UNECE secretariat would finalize these annexes immediately following the expert group meeting taking account of comments made by the Group of Experts.

#### ITEM 6 - OTHER RELEVANT ISSUES AND NEXT STEPS

The Group of Experts may wish to recall that, at its first session, it had felt that its meeting had been an excellent opportunity to exchange views among Governmental and industry experts on the present situation on the monitoring and management of radiation incidents related to scrap metal. The input from more than 40 countries worldwide has allowed the compilation of a large amount of up-to-date data and information that was not previously available. The Group of Experts noted that such an exercise, if convened periodically, could ensure a continued dialogue in this area among all parties concerned and could further international coordinated action in this field.

- 18. In addition to the preparation of the Protocol, the Group of Experts had envisaged in particular the establishment of an Internet-based information exchange system open to all concerned parties and the compilation of training and capacity-building programmes on best practices (TRANS/AC.10/2004/4, paras. 58-59).
- 19. Based on a document prepared by the UNECE secretariat, the Group of Experts may wish to consider means and mechanisms to assist in the implementation of these proposals (ECE/TRANS/AC.10/2006/6).

#### **ITEM 7 - CLOSING SESSION**

- 20. Before the conclusion of the meeting, the chairperson will summarize the recommendations and follow-up activities considered and agreed by the Group of Experts.
- 21. As in the past, following the meeting, the UNECE secretariat will establish a report of the meeting as well as a final version of the Protocol and its annexes (English only). These documents will be transmitted to all delegations participating at the expert group meeting for final review. On this basis the UNECE secretariat will establish the final text of the Protocol and its annexes as well as the proceedings of the expert group meeting in English, French and Russian.
- 22. These documents will then be distributed to countries and radiation monitoring experts and programme managers around the world. They will also be uploaded onto a web portal that has been created for the project.
