REPORT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON THE CESERVANCE OF THE CEASE-FIRE UNDER SECURITY.COUNCIL RESOLUTION 211 OF 20 SEPTEMBER 1965

1. The following information on the observance of the cease-fire along the Cease-Fire Line in Kashmir and the International Border between India and West Pakistan as of 1030 hours GMT on 25 September 1965 has been received from Lt. General R.H. Ninmo, Chief Military Observer of the United Nations Military Observer Group in India and Pakistan (UNMOGIP) who, as indicated in earlier reports (S/6699/Add.3 and 4), has also been in charge of the United Nations India-Pakistan Observation Mission (UNIFCM) pending the arrival of its Chief Officer, Major-General MacDonald.

2. It is reported that numerous complaints alleging violations of the cease-fire have been submitted by both sides and United Nations Military Observers are undertaking to investigate all of them.

3. A Military Observer at Punch reported that, on 24 September, between 1157 and 1230 hours Indian Standard Time, he had seen Pakistan troops firing with rifles and LMG towards the Uri-Punch road from dominating positions west of the road. General Nimmo has informed the CGS, Pakistan, of this violation and has urged him to take the necessary steps to ensure complete observance of the cease-fire.

On 24 September at 1945 hours IST, United Nations Military Observers at Lahore reported that, in the area between the two Armies, both sides had opened fire with field artillery, medium tanks, recoilless rifles, and light and medium machine guns. This fire lasted for approximately one-half hour. General Nimmo and his deputy got in contact by phone with the commands on both sides to get the firing stopped.
