REPORT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON COMPLIANCE WITH THE
WITHDRAWAL PROVISION OF SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION 211
OF 20 SEPTEMBER 1965

Addendum

1. Additional information relating to the question of withdrawal of armed personnel which has been received since the publication of the first report on this subject (S/6719 and Corr.1) is set forth below.
2. In the previous report it was noted that both India and Pakistan had been requested twice to indicate their plans and schedules for the withdrawal of their respective forces back to the positions held by them before 5 August 1965 (S/6699, para. 3, and S/6699/Add.2, p. 2) and that the reply of Pakistan to my cabled message of 20 September on this subject (S/6715) had been received. The reply of India has been received since then and has been circulated in document S/6720.
3. The same report presented a list of the positions held by armed forces of each party on the other party's side of the line. The following additional information on the subject has been received:

Cease-Fire Line

(a) Domel-Uri Sector:

Indian forces occupy four positions north-west of Uri on the Pakistan side of the Cease-Fire Line as follows:

- a point one-half mile west-north-west of the Chhota Kazinag mountain;
- altitude points 10227 and 11506 feet;
- the Burzi locality about one mile west of the Cease-Fire Line.

(b) Kotli-Naushera sector:

Pakistan forces occupy three areas close to the Cease-Fire Line on the Indian side extending south from the Mendhar region to the Kotli-Naushera road. These areas are delimited as follows:

- the northern area by grid references: 070543, 080544, 085542, 092535, 095531, 100529, 107532, 110535, 114540, 118549, 124547, 130546, 142545, 139539, 138534, 136526, 129521, 124519, 118518, 113514, 111509, 104503;
- The central area by grid reference: 105499, 113499, 116500, 122502, 128504, 134505, 138505, 139506, 144504, 148501, 154498, 164492, 169488, 161483, 191480, 200477, 210475, 216473, 222468, 227461, 245435, 254424, 257416, 258405, 261397, 270395, 276399, 284410, 294413, 303410, 306406, 306397, 303391, 305377, 304366, 299359, 291347, 283330, 278322, 272317;
- the southern area by grid reference: 210416, 212141, 220130, 220126, 210120, 200114, 190110, 181109, 168109, 159113, 150113, 146114, 114115.

Sialkot-Jammu border

- (a) Indian forces occupy an area on the Pakistan side of the Sialkot-Jammu border, which is roughly bounded by a line running from a point west of Ranbirsinghpura south to Chawinda and then north-east to a point south of Nanga (from the southern portion of grid square 8034 through grid squares 7934, 7933, 7932, 7832, 7831, 7830, 7829, 7828, 7928, 7927, 7926, 8026, 8024, 8125, 8124, 8023, 8222, 8221, 8220, 8219, 8119, 8019, 8018, 8017, 7917, 7916, 7915, 8015, 8014, 8013, then around Chawinda, grid square 8802, to the boundary in grid square 1316 south of Nanga).
- (b) Pakistan troops occupy a strip of territory about 4 miles long on the Indian side of the border just north of the Indian-held area described above (from grid reference 818373 to 802345).

4. The Chief Officer, UNIFOM, Major-General R.F. MacDonald, after a careful examination of the situation in the field, has come to the conclusion that from a purely military viewpoint the present cease-fire is hazardous in certain localities because incidents are virtually unavoidable when the positions held by troops of the opposing sides are as close as they are now, that is, sometimes only fifteen or twenty yards apart. He is seeking local agreements for a tactical moving back of a few hundred yards by both sides in order to reduce tension and avoid accidental incidents.
