Press release issued on 28 December 1988 by the Office of the President of Botswana

As reported in the radio Botswana lunch-time news bulletin on 27 December, a 14-year-old school boy was killed in a bomb explosion in Gaborone West just after midnight on 27 December. The boy was killed whilst sleeping in a house with five other members of his family. The house was completely demolished by the explosion from which his mother sustained a fracture of the right leg. The rest of the family, including a 3-month-old baby, escaped unhurt. Eight other properties in the neighbourhood were damaged.

This latest bomb attack comes only 16 days after the attack on Ditlharapeng village near Botswana's southern border with South Africa and only 12 days after the meeting of security officials of Botswana and South Africa, which was held in Gaborone on 15 December.

The Botswana Government regards this bomb incident as the latest in South Africa's acts of aggression, in which innocent citizens of Botswana are always the victims. The Government of Botswana is concerned that such attacks are continuing despite the recent agreement by the Governments of Botswana and South Africa to hold regular talks aimed at addressing the security concerns of both countries.
