## WORKSHOP GIVEN BY 'THEGEOGRAPHICAL NAMES SECTION

## Paper submitted by Canada

During the 1999 International Cartographic Association Conference held in Ottawa, Caiiada, staff of the Geographical Naines Section gave a worksliop — Developing and Maintaining u National Geographical Names Data Base. The workshop participants took part in an interactive worksliop lasting six hours. They were also shown the CPCGN's video "What's in u Toponym? The Story of Canada's Geographical Names".

The 19<sup>th</sup> International Cartographic Conference and the 11<sup>th</sup> General Assembly of ICA were held in Ottawa, Caiiada, on August 14 to 21, 1999. The conference theme was *Touch the Past, Visualize the Future*.

As part of this coiiference, the Geographical Names Section of the Centre for Topographic Information, Earth Sciences Sector, Natural Resources Canada, lield a sixhour workshop, *Developing and Maintaining a National Geographical Names Data Base*. 'This workshop was aimed at tliose individuals involved with geographical names, mapping, chartiig, and GIS. The subjects covered included:

- introduction history of Canadian Permanent Committee on Geographical Names (CPCGN),' CPCGN composition at that time, jurisdictional differences, and the CPCGN Secretariat
- overview of names collection in Canada
- impact of linguistic and cultural diversity on geographical names in Caiiada
- design and development of the Canadian Geographical Names Data Rase (CGNDR)
- effect of social, political, and technical issues on the CGNDB

The worksliop was attended by eight participants from the following countries – Australia, Finland, United Kingdom, Zambia, Switzerland, Germany, Sweden, and Canada. During this workshop, the CPCGN video "What's in a Toponym? The Story of Canada's Geographical Names", was sliown. A demonstration of the recently reengineered CGNDB was also given. Participation was interactive and the feedback was positive.
