Preventing the acquisition by terrorists of radioactive materials and sources

1. Insert after the current eighth preambular paragraph a new preambular paragraph reading:

"Recalling paragraph 25 of the Mauritius Strategy for the Further Implementation of the Programme of Action for the Sustainable Development of Small Island States and paragraph 56 (o) of the 2005 World Summit Outcome regarding the cessation of transport of radioactive materials through the regions of small island developing States,"

- 2. Insert after operative paragraph 4 a new operative paragraph 5 reading:
 - "5. Stresses that cessation of the transport of radioactive materials through the regions of small island developing States is an ultimate desired goal of small island developing States and some other countries and recognizes the right of freedom of navigation in accordance with international law, that States should maintain dialogue and consultation, in particular under the aegis of the International Atomic Energy Agency and the International Maritime Organization, with the aim of improved mutual understanding, confidence-building and enhanced communication in relation to the safe maritime transport of radioactive materials, that States involved in the transport of such materials are urged to continue to engage in dialogue with small island developing States and other States to address their concerns and that these concerns include the further development and strengthening, within the appropriate forums, of international regulatory regimes to enhance safety, disclosure, liability, security and compensation in relation to such transport;"
- 3. Renumber all the subsequent operative paragraphs accordingly.
