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The Representative of the United States of America to the United Nations presents his compliments to the Secretary-General of the United Nations and has the honor to transmit herewith, for the information of the Security Council, United Nations Command communiques No. 1,469, issued Saturday, December 20, No. 1,470, issued Sunday, December 21, and No. 1,471, issued Monday, December 22, 1952.

UNITED NATIONS COMMAND COMMUNIQUE NO. 1,469, ISSUED IN TOKYO
10:00 A.M., SATURDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1952 (KOREAN TIME)

Nine enemy probing efforts, none of them of any consequence, were the extent of hostile efforts on the Korean ground front. As those enemy thrusts were being repulsed United Nations Command patrols fanned out across the front, but reported only minor contacts with the enemy.

In the air war, United Nations Command fighter-bombers hit front-line positions and troop concentrations, while screening jet fighters engaged enemy fighters but reported damaging only one. Medium bombers Friday night blasted a supply area at Unhung, near Anju in Northwest Korea, while another medium was attacking battle-line targets.

Ground action in Korea continued to be very light. Scattered probes by the enemy failed to penetrate United Nations Command positions. A friendly raiding party operating in the western sector engaged the enemy briefly before breaking contact.

Targets for land-based United Nations Command aircraft flying during the day and night included enemy supply areas, a military staff school and front-line positions.

Activities of the United Nations Command fleet were routine with bombardment, patrol, and mine-sweeping operations conducted throughout the period.

Ground action in Korea came to a virtual halt yesterday (Sunday) with only a handful of minor contacts made with enemy forces by United Nations Command patrols.

In the air war, enemy troop and supply areas, railroads, front-line positions and vehicles were targets for United Nations Command land-based planes.

United Nations Command naval forces continued attacks against hostile installations.
