**Statement of the Government of the Republic of Moldova on the  
events in South Ossetia and Abkhazia**

The Moldovan authorities and the entire Moldovan society followed with concern the development of events in South Ossetia and Abkhazia over the last weeks. Unfortunately, the parties to the year-long inter-ethnic conflict in Georgia have once again failed to find an adequate solution based on the standards of international law and human values. It has been transformed into a bloody drama, with casualties among the civilian population.

Categorically rejecting all methods of forcible settlement, including those of ensuring territorial integrity, the Moldovan Government does not consider, however, that international recognition of Abkhazia and South Ossetia will stabilize the situation. Just as in the case of the recognition of Kosovo, this will achieve nothing other than to reduce the responsibility of the parties to the conflict in finding a compromise and a way of identifying equitable and modern solutions by respecting the territorial integrity and observing human rights and freedoms.

At the same time, we deem it inappropriate to compare the situation in Georgia with the one in Transnistria. We also believe that speculations on how the situation in Abkhazia and South Ossetia might affect the Transnistrian settlement process are counterproductive. Moldova has already created very favourable prerequisites for its settlement and there is political will on all sides participating in the settlement to the conflict.

The Moldovan Government states that it will further determine its attitude towards the situation in South Ossetia and Abkhazia only in line with the Helsinki Final Act, the Charter of the United Nations and all the current principles of international law.
