Question of slavery and the slave trade in all their
practices and manifestations, including the slavery-
like practices of apartheid and colonialism

Note by the Secretary-General

1. In addition to the candidatures contained in documents E/CN.4/1299 and E/CN.4/1299/Add.1, the Secretary-General has received nominations of candidates from the Governments of Argentina, Barbados and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland for inclusion in the updated list of experts in economic, sociological, legal and other relevant disciplines, whose advice would be available to States concerned with the liquidation of slavery and the slave trade in all their practices and manifestations, including the slavery-like practices of apartheid and colonialism.
2. The present document contains the names and curricula vitae of the candidates proposed by the said Governments.

Mr. Mario AMADEO (Argentina)

committed in that region by all the belligerent factions.

Ambassador to Brazil (1966-1969).

Member of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights (1959-1961),
in which capacity, on the proposal of René Cassin (one of the drafters
of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights), he was unanimously
elected Chairman of the Commission (1960). During his term of office,
he played a fundamental role in the elaboration of a draft declaration
on respect for beliefs as an essential guarantee of peace.

Mr. SWIFT became Chairman of the Anti-Slavery Society in 1973. From 1965 to 1969 he was working in the Forestry Department of the Food and Agriculture Organization responsible for planning, negotiating and implementing FAO's programme in wildlife conservation and resource conservation. His field research and remedial work has been in the Sahel countries (mainly Mali), in Somalia and in Iran.
