The role of ecosystems is increasingly valued for reducing disaster risks, adapting to climate change and protecting livelihoods. Healthy ecosystems provide natural defences to human communities by regulating hazards, while degraded ecosystems increase exposure and reduce community resilience. However, poor communities must be able to access livelihood benefits in maintaining ecosystems sustainability. This side event will examine how ecosystems management can serve as a long-term preventive and mitigation measure against climate-related disasters and achieve sustainable livelihoods. It focuses on practicable approaches and methodologies of applying ecosystems management, highlighting the role of communities as well as local and national authorities. Case studies from Myanmar, Mexico and Sri Lanka will be presented.

The proposed International Group for Wind-Related Disaster Risk Reduction will establish linkages to coordinate various communities, e.g., IAWE, to serve as inter-agency coordinators with a charter to work with international organizations involving agencies of the UN and involved NGOs, and to empower them with the responsibility to serve as a bridge between policy makers and agencies responsible for actually carrying out the DRR at the local community level. The increasing demand in disaster risk reduction investment has in turn generated demand for tools to inform the decision making process related to identifying priorities, cost/benefit ratios, and returns on investement. A number of recent studies assessing the relative costs and benefits of risk reducing initiatives have indicated high potential returns for investment in risk reduction. This session will share emerging evidence on the impact and benefits of DRR investments, discuss the challenges of using cost-benefit analysis as a tool for measuring benefits of DRR investments, and reinforce calls for using DRR investments as part of wider climate change adaptation programming at all levels.

The importance of mainstreaming DRR into development is recognized by the countries but the challenge remains in understanding 'How to' initiate mainstreaming of DRR at an operational level in each of the development sector. This session is aimed at providing a venue for the RCC member countries to share their experiences on initiating mainstreaming of DRR into various priority sectors in their respective countries; under the RCC Program on 'Mainstreaming DRR into Development Policy, Planning and Implementation'. RCC members would discuss the Priority Implementation Partnerships which they have been undertaking with their respective government agencies to initiate mainstreaming and highlight the importance of strengthening partnerships between the various sectors.

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The event will highlight and discuss the role of formal and informal institutions and their interfaces in enhancing the adaptive capacity of vulnerable households and communities. It links with priority area 4 of the Hyogo Framework for action – Reducing underlying risk factors. The argument will be presented by one author of a multidisciplinary paper underpinning the Commission on Climate Change and Development's final report. It will be discussed by representatives of formal and informal institutions dealing with climate change adaptation and disaster risk reduction at the local, national and international levels. "GFDRR South-South Cooperation Program facilitates collaboration among disaster prone low- and middle-income countries in mainstreaming disaster risk reduction and recovery into their development programming. It provides grant financing to innovative partnership proposals to facilitate the cross regional and cross country collaboration in disaster risk management based on mutual interest and benefit of partnering entities. The new Call for Proposals was announced in May, 2009 and the deadline for submissions is June 30. The side event is organized for interested

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partnerships to help them develop fundable partnership proposals. During the meeting the potential partnerships will have the opportunity to meet the team from GFDRR South-South Program to discuss their partnership initiatives and seek advice on both conceptual and technical issues related to their applications.

Hyogo Framework for Action highlights the importance of integrated flood management approaches in incorporating the underlying risk factors of flood prone communities into natural resources and environmental management strategies. WMO and some 20 partner organizations from Governments, Academia, International Bodies, etc, are now launching the HelpDesk for Integrated Flood Management to assist countries in implementing an integrated approach to flood management on the ground. Diverse communities in hazard prone areas around the world have traditionally learnt to cope with and reduce the risks of natural disasters through the indigenous knowledge they have inherited from the time tested experiences of generations. Contextualized within the local geo-climatic conditions, natural resources and social and cultural practices, indigenous knowledge has been an integral component of human and social capital of the communities, which is often not recognized. On the contrary, it is under continuous threats of becoming extinct by the onslaught of the so-called modern and quick fix solutions. It is therefore important to document, learn, revive and replicate wherever possible such knowledge and practices and further synergize this with modern scientific knowledge, especially in the context of promoting community based disaster risk management (CBDRM) and Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) strategies. The Special Event shall discuss all these and other related issues regarding integration of indigenous knowledge in policies and programmes on disaster risk reduction. Three publications on the subject shall also be launched on the occasion.

Views from the Frontline (VFL) is the largest independent global assessment of disaster reduction at the local level ever undertaken; involving 48 countries and over 400 civil society organisations; gathering local perspectives of progress from over 7,000 people. The review - which is designed to complement the national-level HFA monitoring coordinated by UN-ISDR - has reached striking and surprising conclusions. It presents new insights on connecting policy formulation at international and national level with the realities of local level policy execution. The special event presents the VFL headlines including key findings, conclusions and recommendations to accelerate progress towards local level implementation.

Government disaster risk financing strategies need to ensure that public expenditure levels on risk reduction correspond to the level of risk faced, the expected economic and social returns to risk reduction and the reasonable responsibilities and obligations of government; and that there are adequate financial arrangements to manage the residual risk in the form of post-disaster relief and recovery expenditure. In reality, although many hazard-prone developing countries undertake some planning for disasters, none has a comprehensive disaster risk financing strategy. 


