

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The update of the United Nations and Partners 2009 Work Plan marks a moment of transition. The events of early 2009 have changed the operational environment for humanitarian actors in Sudan and given rise to a review of stakeholders' actions. Key aspects of the Comprehensive Peace Agreement – the census, DDR, and the Interim Abyei Administration – are advancing the movement towards recovery. However, each of these benchmarks has been offset by continued challenges for the people of Sudan. Insecurity and conflict have caused displacement as well as protection and human rights concerns in the Three Areas, southern Sudan and Darfur. Access to vulnerable people to ensure delivery of basic and life-saving services remains a challenge, especially in rural and isolated communities. The loss of Sudanese and international NGOs in early March has altered the humanitarian community's ability to implement programmes, challenging stakeholders to both respond to immediate life-threatening gaps and identify sustainable solutions.

Meeting humanitarian needs and responding to crises have been the objectives of the first half of 2009, and they will remain so for the rest of the year. The United Nations and national and international NGOs, in cooperation with the Government and donors, have responded to life-threatening needs by providing 104,500 metric tons of food assistance, feeding more than six million children, providing chlorinated water to more than a million people, maintaining health facilities and servicing nearly 1.3 million outpatients. This work has prevented meningitis and polio outbreaks in Darfur and southern Sudan, mitigated the long-term effects of malnutrition in children under five, promoted the well-being of persons at risk and enabled preparations for the rainy season. While noting these successes, chronic gaps and concerns for strategic and sustainable solutions are becoming more pressing. The loss of capacity has highlighted vulnerabilities in ensuring that humanitarian needs are met and early recovery is promoted. Lessons learned in 2009 build on the experience of previous years and bring into focus important considerations for the remainder of the year and preparations for 2010.

The situation provoked by the removal of NGOs in northern Sudan resulted in Joint Government-UN assessments in Darfur and the Three Areas. Immediate life-threatening needs were addressed and intense dialogue between stakeholders laid the groundwork for closer collaboration. Broader engagement of stakeholders in an enhanced high-level committee, strengthened cluster coordination and monitoring, and recruitment and resource mobilization to fill capacity gaps, are examples of areas where the United Nations and Partners are solidifying their work for the remainder of 2009 and beyond.

The international community has generously contributed almost US\$ 1.2 billion¹ to humanitarian and early recovery programmes in Sudan, or 56% of the revised requirements, to date in 2009. In addition, Government of National Unity contributions have sustained salaries for critical health and water services in Darfur. Nonetheless, gaps in livelihoods, basic infrastructure, education, returns, and early recovery programming persist across all sectors. Mechanisms for long-term support need to exist if sustainable solutions are to be in place. The United Nations and Partners will engage stakeholders in the second half of 2009 to address issues of strengthened coordination and programme monitoring to ensure humanitarian needs are met and early recovery promoted in a predictable, transparent and accountable manner.

Southern Sudan witnessed increased violence with the presence of the Lord's Resistance Army and inter-tribal conflict. Combined with political instability and severe emergency indicators, the role of the international community to provide a safety net throughout the transition to recovery is paramount. Continued insecurity and risks to the population cannot be assuaged by the nascent Government of southern Sudan. A crisis in public financing and inadequate administrative and legislative capacity limit the role of the Government in ensuring the delivery of basic services to all people, particularly the rural, isolated and vulnerable. Persistent funding gaps have reduced humanitarian programming, and for the remainder of 2009 UN and Partners have identified critical activities that represent a minimum level of assistance required to address emergency needs.

For the remainder of 2009, NGOs and UN agencies will focus on adapting to changes in the operational environment, ensuring capacity is maintained to deliver critical humanitarian services. Of particular focus is strengthening humanitarian coordination and accountability in the wake of the 4 March decision, especially as the critical hunger gap arrives, and the potential for drought and

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insecurity trends continue. Southern Sudan has identified a funding gap of \$59 million for critical activities to maintain a minimum safety net. Key life-saving activities remain essential in Darfur, while gaps in livelihoods and education each remain areas of concerns. The total unmet requirement for the remainder of 2009 is \$916 million.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The funding information presented in this section is drawn from the Financial Tracking Service² (for 1 January to 21 June) and verified against sector reports. The report demonstrates contributions consistent with previous years. However, due to changes in the operational context, lowering commodity prices, insecurity and the removal of NGOs there has been a revision in requirements.

Requirements have shifted from \$2.2 billion in early January to approximately \$2.1 billion at mid-year. UN and Partners assessed projects in light of funding shortfalls and changing operational context, resulting in this re-adjustment. The most significant reduction is witnessed by Food Security and Livelihoods, due to decreases in commodity prices associated with general food delivery programs and funding shortfalls in livelihood and agricultural initiatives. Several sectors have slightly increased requirements due to costs associated with the removal of NGOs and newly identified needs. Against the revised requirements, the \$1.2 billion contribution represents 56% coverage at mid-year.

While the overall funding coverage is positive, the majority of sectors are under-funded against revised requirements. The median coverage of sectors is around 36% of revised requirements. Food Security and Livelihoods is divided against two trends, whereby food aid receives above-median support (81% at mid-year) and agriculture and livelihoods is 33% funded. Cross-Sector Support for Returns and Reintegration is the lowest in coverage and lower than previous years (20%, compared to 23% at mid-2008). It is worth noting that the 2008 UN and Partners Work Plan received \$1.4 billion in contributions. If this should be the case in 2009 a gap in funding could be expected for the remainder of the year, adversely affecting programming. Sectors have accordingly adjusted plans and priorities to maintain critical functions.

The largest portfolio is Food Security and Livelihoods, while the smallest is Cross-sector support for Return. The average funding shortfall by sector is \$94 million, which remains a significant resource mobilization effort.

Contributions are mobilized bilaterally and through pooled fund mechanisms. The Financial Tracking Service (24 June) also records contributions outside the UN and Partners Work Plan which amount to \$66 million.

Pooled mechanisms, such as the Central Emergency Relief Fund (CERF) and the Common Humanitarian Fund (CHF), played important roles in responding to emergencies, enhancing the coordination of humanitarian responses and filling funding gaps for priority activities. Furthermore, to

promote environmental approaches in humanitarian emergencies, the CHF allocated \$1 million to innovative 'green' projects in the Work Plan. As compared to 2008, the CHF has slipped very slightly from \$104 million (10% of total Work Plan contributions) to \$101 million (9%).

While the United States, the lead donor, has contributed nearly half the funds to date, smaller donors (each less than 2% of the total) combined produced 15% of contributions in the first half of the year.

2. REGIONAL REVIEW

The regional review outlines changes since the beginning of the year in the operational environment in Sudan. Humanitarian needs have largely remained as described in the 2009 Work Plan, but conditions were unexpectedly transformed by the removal of 16 NGOs on 4 March. Insecurity in parts of the south and the Three Areas and protracted conflict in Darfur have eroded access, further complicating an already challenging situation. Continued delivery of assistance to people at risk and adapting to shifting conditions will remain the primary focus for the remainder of the year.

Southern Sudan has faced increased violence amid inter-tribal conflict and the presence of elements of the Lord's Resistance Army. Events in Malakal underlined the volatility affecting the population. Chronic poverty and structural underdevelopment keep much of the population at risk; while the Government of southern Sudan (GoSS) budget crisis hinders the provision of basic services and threatens the already fragile safety net. Emergency indicators show a continuing need for rapid response mechanisms.

2.1 ABYEI

Political instability, poor infrastructure and limited humanitarian presence have created various challenges in meeting assistance needs in Abyei. Implementation of the June 2008 Roadmap, intended to avert further fighting and to accelerate the Abyei Protocol, has been difficult. The Abyei Area Administration has too few resources to govern effectively, despite recent logistical and financial support from the Government of National Unity (GoNU). The Integrated Police Units have not deployed outside Abyei town, and both Sudan Armed Forces and Sudan People's Liberation Army (SPLA) have built up beyond the 1956 boundaries. The security situation raises protection issues for the entire population and prevents IDP returns.

The removal of NGOs severely set back humanitarian operations and magnified Abyei's isolation and lack of staffing and materials. Health coverage is poor, estimated at less than 25%, and there is ongoing concern about disease outbreaks. Due to the weak community and government structures to maintain water points, frequent breakdowns are reducing the number of functional water points to far fewer than needed. Provision of tools and seeds may help reduce the need for food aid, but agricultural training is needed, as returnees who have lost skills cannot afford crop failure. The Education Sector requires construction of schools, teacher training, and provision of school materials.

Additionally, the rainy season (June to November) will create humanitarian needs. Abyei is accessible by one road, the "Oil Road", which runs north-south and is difficult to pass after heavy rains. The rest is reachable only by bush track, and about 90% of the area is cut off during the rainy season, severely restricting aid efforts. Despite the evident need, there is almost no funding for basic infrastructure.

It should be noted that humanitarian and early recovery efforts can contribute to peaceful resolution of the political situation. As one example, partners in the water sector have placed water points along seasonal Misseriya migration routes, which pass through many returnee Dinka villages to alleviate tensions and promote reconciliation efforts. Ultimately, however, peace will require a wealth-sharing agreement for oil resources and resolution of land rights issues between the Misseriya and Dinka-Ngok tribes.

2.2 Blue Nile State

Blue Nile state continues to cope with the effects of conflict, poor infrastructure and limited basic services. Humanitarian action is focused on providing assistance to IDPs and returnees and supporting returns, while transition towards recovery remains contingent on greater capacity and resource management. Uncertainty surrounding the peace process, census results and the upcoming referendum carry the threat of instability.

An estimated 200,000 individuals – 20% of the state population – were displaced during the years of conflict. The state has hosted approximately 165,000 IDPs, from within Blue Nile as well as other states of Sudan. From 2006 to mid-2008, a total of 20,202 refugees and almost 3,300 IDPs were provided return assistance. Humanitarian indicators in Blue Nile point to persistent emergency conditions, particularly in Kurmuk. Provision of basic services is lacking: 41% of the population use improved drinking water sources, and 34% of children attend primary schools, according to state

authorities. Some 173 of 208 health facilities are functioning, serving approximately 800,000 people. Given low government capacity, the INGOs deliver services. The HIV/AIDS situation is of serious concern, with the Government estimating 2.6% prevalence and independent estimates as high as 6%.

Removal of INGOs had a significant impact on programmes, particularly in Basic Infrastructure, Protection and Human Rights Sectors. Losses in the Education Sector have affected around 105,500 beneficiaries. Health and Nutrition, Water and Sanitation, NFI and Cross-Sector Support to returns also have programming gaps.

More than 1,000 IDPs this year returned to Upper Nile, while in March 1,320 returned to Blue Nile from Khartoum. Contingency plans are needed for spontaneous returns, which present a continuing challenge in delivering assistance.

2.3 DARFUR

The first half of 2009 in Darfur was marked by continued conflict, population movements, and the loss of significant managerial and technical capacity following the removal of 13 international NGOs and dissolution of 3 national NGOs. By mid-May, more than 137,000 people had been newly displaced across Darfur, mainly as a result of clashes among rebel groups and the Government. Fighting between the Sudan Liberation Army – Minni Minawi (SLA-MM) and the Justice and Equality Movement (JEM) in Muhajariya, South Darfur, led to Government attacks to regain the town, and resulted in the displacement of thousands of civilians. In North Darfur, Zam Zam camp population reached approximately 105,000, far exceeding its capacity. Authorities consider the newly arrived population as migrants originally from North Darfur, and have therefore denied requests for a new site. The influx has put enormous pressure on all services in the camp, especially water.

The removal of the NGOs initially affected approximately 1.1 million beneficiaries receiving food assistance, 1.5 million beneficiaries accessing health services, 1.0 million receiving water and sanitation support, and 670,000 beneficiaries receiving non-food items. Short-term actions were implemented to address the immediate gaps. Thanks to efforts of the Government, the UN and remaining NGOs, the gaps created in four life-saving sectors have been narrowed, but concerns remain about quality and standards.

The removals have also had a major impact on humanitarian access to conflict-affected populations in remote areas. The number of national and international aid workers in the region dropped from 17,700 to 12,658; the number of expatriates now working in Darfur is the lowest since September 2004. In many deep field locations, international staff numbers have dropped to zero or just a few, although some organizations have been able to shift resources to areas that previously lacked coverage. Despite these small strategic gains, the net effect has been a severe limitation of early warning reporting, protection by presence and programme delivery.

Attacks on humanitarians and their assets continue. The number of carjackings decreased only slightly following the removal of assets from removed INGOs. The kidnapping of international humanitarian workers in two separate incidents and the threat of more kidnappings resulted in the affected organizations closing some or all programmes.

The fifth joint Darfur Food Security and Livelihood Assessment, conducted before the harvest season, found that 45% of households – 1.7 million people – remain food-insecure (23% severely, 22% moderately).

On a positive note, the Sudanese government and JEM met in Doha on 17 February and signed a goodwill agreement promising a prisoner exchange and confidence-building measures to pave the way for peace talks. The following day, Wada'ah was attacked in North Darfur with reports of bombing in Katur and the surrounding villages. In mid-May, talks between the parties recommenced.

2.4 EASTERN STATES

Eastern Sudan continues to cope with long-standing challenges stemming from conflict, poverty, natural disasters and border tensions with neighbouring states. Despite low humanitarian and development indicators, Gedaref, Kassala and Red Sea states have had substantial funding challenges. Increased interest from donors is expected to bring in more funds – for example, the Eastern Recovery and Development Programme in support of quick-impact projects, and the eastern

Sudan Rehabilitation and Development Fund supporting the eastern Sudan Peace Agreement (ESPA).

While programmes have shifted towards recovery and development, the UN and Partners remain responsive to humanitarian needs. Seasonal flooding could potentially displace more than 130,000 people. Food security in Kassala and Red Sea states is affected by chronic poverty and low harvests. An estimated 68,000 IDPs remain in Kassala and 120,000 in Port Sudan, while insecurity and lack of basic services in areas of origin have prevented returns. About 2,000 asylum seekers arrive from Eritrea, Somalia and Ethiopia each month, putting the current number of refugees and asylum seekers at about 100,000 including the old caseload for which a comprehensive strategy under formulation to unlock their protracted situation.

Eastern Sudan has some of the country's highest rates of malnutrition, under-five mortality, and maternal and child morbidity and mortality. 2009 has seen outbreaks of dengue fever and acute jaundice syndrome, and suspected cases of meningitis. Eastern Sudan is among the areas worst affected by the HIV/AIDS epidemic. Mine-related incidents are common (particularly in Kassala and Red Sea states), and landmine and unexploded ordnance (UXO) clearance is slow.

Despite the NGO removals, which affected key sectors (Health and Nutrition, Water and Sanitation, and Food Security and Livelihoods), the UN and Partners continue efforts to consolidate mutual trust and cooperation with the Government. In response to ongoing access issues, particularly in Red Sea, the UN is following up with authorities to review "go" and "no-go" areas, as the classification was done years before the signing of the ESPA, and the situation on the ground has changed.

2.5 KHARTOUM AND THE NORTH

The recent period in Khartoum and the northern states has seen shifts in the political environment, ongoing financial crisis and protection and human rights issues related to IDPs.

A number of important provisions of the CPA will depend on use of the outcome of the census: voter registration, border demarcation, proportion of seats in the national assembly, and power and wealth sharing. NEC has announced that national elections will take place over a two-week period in February 2010. Meanwhile, SPLM/A has rejected the census result in a dispute over the final figure for the southern population. The financial crisis has led to suspension of many development projects, while the global instability of petrol prices has also affected receipts.

Monitoring and reporting on protection and human rights issues and strengthening coordination and partnership with the authorities remain priorities for humanitarian action. The removal of INGOs and dissolution of national NGOs created a widening gap in the Protection and Human Rights Sector, compounded by the general deterioration in livelihoods and humanitarian situation of affected communities. Relocation of IDPs in Mayo area affected some 1,000 people, leaving them without shelter, sanitation or schooling for their children, in violation of the agreed Guiding Principles on IDPs. There have also been increased police raids and incidents of harassment in IDP camps and communities, and food insecurity persists among vulnerable groups. The draft National IDP Policy acknowledges the primary responsibility of the state in ensuring protection for and assistance to IDPs.

2.6 SOUTHERN KORDOFAN

Already faced with security and political challenges related to the peace process, and threats of food shortages and natural disasters, Southern Kordofan has been heavily affected by the removal of NGOs working in the state. The impact is most visible in the health sector, with 102 health facilities losing NGO support; more than 550,000 people have been denied access to health and nutrition services, and more than 200,000 have received diminished services. Many have also been affected by loss of capacity in the water and sanitation sector, education sector and protection/human rights sector most notably child protection. Suspension of operations in the NFI sector has implications not only for settlement of returnees (2500 have not received scheduled NFI or seeds and tools), but also for emergency relief during the coming rainy season: pre-positioning of NFI has become impossible, and the lack of paved roads cuts off many parts of the state from basic services during the rains. Although last year's sporadic rainfall brought predictions of a food shortage, only a few locations gave cause for concern and WFP food distributions were able to compensate.

Resumption of tribal conflict in Lagawa locality led to suspension of all activities in Abu Junuk, where up to 6,000 people benefit from humanitarian assistance. Although the situation has come under control, continued tensions prevent resumption of access. State-level political developments may help defuse some local issues, as the newly appointed governor seeks unification of the divided civil service, long an impediment to delivery of basic services to former SPLM areas. Along with narrowing the gaps left by the NGO removals, such a development would send a strong public signal that the State Government is the main provider of services.

2.7 SOUTHERN SUDAN

Providing basic services and maintaining the existing safety net remain urgent priorities in southern Sudan, but conflict, displacement and financial crisis threaten to worsen the situation. The budget crisis hampers transition from humanitarian to early recovery programming, and GoSS remains unable to provide basic services or public sector salaries. The emergence of service gaps poses a significant risk, and the lack of available funding has already resulted in premature termination of critical activities and projects.

Armed attacks by the Ugandan rebel movement the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) have displaced more than 70,000 people and caused an influx of nearly 20,000 refugees from DRC since October 2008. At the same time, more than 60,000 people have been displaced by inter-ethnic fighting, mainly over competition for natural resources. Heavy fighting in Jonglei state has killed hundreds and displaced thousands. In Warrap state, cattle raiding and rustling by herdsmen from Unity State has displaced nearly 10,000 people. In Upper Nile, Jonglei and entral Equatorial States, UNHCR has improved the access to protection of the 4,700 Ethiopian Anuak asylum seekers who started arriving in Southern Sudan in December 2003 as a result of the systematic attack and widespread human rights abuses which victimized the Anuak community in Gambella region. The repatriation of Sudanese Refugees from asylum countries has continued. Since 2005, some 322,813 people have returned home as of 30 May 2009 of which 167,023 with the assistance of UNHCR. Some 87,000 Sudanese refugees remain in the countries of asylum.

Despite access constraints, UN agencies and Partners have worked with GoSS to conduct needs assessments, protection monitoring and interventions, and provide emergency food rations, NFI, and water, sanitation and hygiene materials. The onset of the 2009 rainy season will aggravate vulnerability and pose further challenges to humanitarian action. The lack of adequate funding to repair and rehabilitate roads and bridges damaged last year poses a critical obstacle. Outbreaks of cholera, polio and meningitis have already been reported this year, and the rainy season will bring heightened risk of disease.

3. CROSS-CUTTING ISSUES

3.1 ENVIRONMENT

Work on the environment has focused on water resource management and preparation for the CHF environmental allocation. Groundwater monitoring is now a routine activity aimed towards integrating environmental concerns into WASH programming.

Loss of water resources in Nyala and El Fasher, despite good rains in 2008, is a cause for concern; there is need for preparedness planning for the risk of drought. Work on camp-level drought preparedness plans has been delayed by the NGO removal and is prioritized in the second half of 2009.

Five projects have been developed and proposed for the CHF environmental allocation, including a review of the impacts of Shelter and NFI programming, the introduction of environmental issues in camp management in Darfur, work with pastoralists in South Kordofan and participation of civil society in the proposed Juba cleanup. These projects, once funded, are ready for implementation. Work on capacity-building for use of alternative technology in Darfur has proceeded well, with a focus on training trainers and demonstration projects. This is important progress in slowing the rapid deforestation taking place during the crisis. Work is now needed to ensure widespread deployment of this capacity to scale up the use of alternative building technologies.

3.2 GENDER

Focus: To enhance the capacity of the UN and Partners to mainstream gender

While individual UN and humanitarian partners have made strides on gender policy development and operational strategies, the impact on early recovery and humanitarian action is limited. Greater knowledge is needed on practical ways to integrate gender mainstreaming in the delivery of programmes. As humanitarian actors learn more about gender mainstreaming, their humanitarian and early recovery responses should more effectively meet the needs of women and men.

Following the United Nations Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM) guidance note and gender checklist, there was increased inclusion of gender considerations within sectors. 27 sector leads were guided on the use of the checklist and equipped with skills for gender mainstreaming in their respective sectors. Improved tracking of gender goals in the respective sectors of the UN work plan is expected to clarify the impact of the humanitarian crisis on different groups (women and men, girls and boys, including the elderly and physically challenged), and evaluate how specific needs of women and men are being met. The goal of the various sectors is to provide reliable information and data disaggregated by age and sex, for use by policy makers, planners and decision-makers.

Achievements against objectives

To strengthen the UN and Partner' understanding of the importance of gender mainstreaming and their capacity to implement it in practical ways during the delivery of humanitarian and early recovery protection and assistance programmes.

- Darfur-wide consultations with sector leads confirm that UN and Partners delivering humanitarian services and products have policies and strategies for gender mainstreaming; lack of capacity and technical expertise and high staff turnover do not support sustainability or skills transfer.
- Two gender mainstreaming workshops were held (43 women and 40 men) aimed at addressing capacity and technical expertise needs of the various partners.
- Guidance note and checklist for gender mainstreaming in the UN and Partners Work Plan
- A Darfur-wide gender network was established as a community of practice and a website set up for knowledge sharing and peer support.
- An email for networking was set up to assist the working parties (darfurgender@unsudanig.org).
- A gender web page of the UN work plan (www.unsudanig.org/sector/gender) was established for sharing of information.

To increase routine collection and analysis of humanitarian data disaggregated by age and sex.

• The Gender Task Force has had three monthly meetings to discuss issues affecting gender issues in the Sudan and also for the implementation of the Work Plan. As the attendance is usually low, some of the discussions have not been properly implemented.

To strengthen the role and ability of gender focal points to ensure gender equality responses and programming.

• The Gender Task Force, comprised of gender focal points, led the process of developing a gender strategic plan, and an action plan is now in place. The Task Force meets monthly and has collaborated on a gender mainstreaming workshop for the sector leads.

Priorities

• The Task Force has not been very effective in the implementation of the action plan, as the members who are the gender focal points of the UN agencies tend not to give it a priority. Efforts are being made to strengthen the Task Force in the second half of 2009.

All sectors have maintained objectives as stated in the 2009 Work Plan.

The decision to dissolve three of the largest Sudanese NGOs and remove 13 international NGOs led to a loss of capacity, programming and assets felt across northern Sudan, affecting approximately 6,000 NGO staff and \$122 million in planned programming.

Combined with escalating insecurity and reduced international presence, the resulting loss of access to affected populations has serious implications for programme delivery, as well as for continuous needs assessments and protection mechanisms. The departure of NGOs has also come at a period of financial restrictions, limiting public expenditures for basic services. In Darfur and the Three Areas, in particular, financial shortfalls in State Government line ministries have had a negative effect on services. Short-term measures to fill gaps have been critical to meeting immediate needs, including emergency blanket feeding and the GoNU provision of salaries to staff for maintaining health and water facilities. The sustainability of these measures needs to be addressed.

Focus: Offer infrastructure construction and rehabilitation to increase access to basic services and establish the foundations for (re-)settlement programmes.

The departure of six of 19 sector partners has reduced capacity for project implementation and coordination. Most CHF allocations went to NGOs that subsequently had to leave. Remaining partners may fill some gaps if additional funding is made available.

In southern Sudan, there is little or no money available for infrastructure. Along with a deterioration of security (particularly in Jonglei and Western Equatoria states), there have been project delays as well as administrative obstacles such as a tightening of customs control. Priorities have shifted from big construction projects to road maintenance and access to markets.

Achievements against objectives

Bl_1 To support communities and local authorities in building both sustainable and temporary settlements that are environmentally sensitive, especially through building their capacities.

- trained 650 individuals on construction and maintenance techniques in Blue Nile, Khartoum and Darfur: most participants (515) received training on stabilized soil blocks in Darfur;
- 35 ministry staff in Khartoum were trained on settlements development;
- started two pilot projects for settlements improvement in Khartoum and 22 demonstration buildings with woodless technology in Darfur have started.

BI_2 To increase access to and provision of basic services by constructing or rehabilitating transportation networks and public infrastructure facilities.

- southern Sudan: 130km of roads rehabilitated; 219km of roads maintained; two bridges repaired; four Government offices constructed; \$71,500 distributed through cash for work;
- Darfur: Nine airfields assessed in North and South Darfur, and support given to United Nations African Union Mission in Darfur (UNAMID) Civil Affairs in the identification of 31 quick impact projects:

Priorities

Focus: To provide strategic support to humanitarian actors, facilitating the monitoring of, preparation for and response to humanitarian and early recovery needs and emergencies.

UN and Partners support assessments, coordination and strategic planning of humanitarian action. Limitations to humanitarian resources and humanitarian space affect the capacities to respond. Reduced accessibility linked to incidents and bureaucratic impediments has adversely affected programmes. Lack of funding has resulted in staffing constraints in key sector partners, affecting the capacity of the sector to meet its objectives. Services continued with the introduction of two 'free to user' common transport services in the north of Sudan and dedicated cargo aircraft providing air carrier services in South Sudan.

In northern Sudan, the removal of 13 international and three national NGOs critically weakened humanitarian capacity. During the reporting period, insecurity and bureaucratic impediments in Darfur, as well as UN Security requirements, have restricted movements, inhibited operations and delayed missions. Insecurity is a major concern; demand for training and Saving Lives Together programming is increasing in deep field locations. The impact of recent security incidents (including kidnappings) has caused the UN and Partners to further prioritize the protection of staff.

In southern Sudan, the budget crisis coupled with weak State Government structures have adversely affected the capacity of counterparts to deliver basic services, increasing the need for coordination among humanitarian organisations to fill gaps. Furthermore, conflicts have increased three-fold compared to the same period in 2008 and resultant displacements require more resources than anticipated to assess and respond to needs. The scale and nature of the current inter-tribal conflicts are causing significant protection concerns.

Objectives against achievements

CCS_1 Mobilize and coordinate humanitarian action including early recovery.

- UN and Partners conducted inter-agency assessments in 19 areas in six states, including 60
 assessments in support of 120,000 people displaced by conflicts and disease outbreaks in
 southern Sudan.

Focus: Increase equitable access to quality education services to all children, youth and adults with a special focus on disadvantaged groups and conflict-affected areas.

The sector has witnessed a significant reduction in capacity, especially in inaccessible conflict-stricken areas. Nine NGOs delivering educational services to approximately 290,000 children in Darfur, South Kordofan, Blue Nile, Red Sea, Khartoum and Abyei were removed. As NGOs were paying salaries of teachers in areas currently inaccessible to government, the loss of teachers will have immediate effects upon school returns.

Community participation in education activities is reduced in IDP camps by a lack of awareness and dependence on donor support. Furthermore, demand has increased due to IDP movements in Khartoum and new displacements in Darfur. The relocation of IDPs in Omdurman is of concern. Escalating market prices are indirectly inflating education costs.

Partners are conducting a gap assessment; the priority is to ensure that vulnerable children in and out of school have access to teachers and school materials and can continue learning in safe, child-friendly environments.

Funding is urgently needed to cover these gaps. For all the areas, there are ongoing discussions with the Government to ensure that teachers are available when schools open in June. Available resources are being used to prioritize learning materials and rehabilitation of temporary classrooms in all areas. UNICEF, as the education sector lead, has increased its funding needs to cover the gaps left by expelled NGOs.

Achievements against objectives

E_1 To enhance the quality of the teaching and learning environment for children, youth and adults.

- 225 teacher trainers have improved knowledge and skills on learner-centred methodologies, life skills and the concept of child-friendly schools.
- 2,008 Ministry of Education (MoE) teachers and 909 unqualified/volunteer teachers are being trained.
- Close to 50,000 children have received educational supplies in Northern Darfur, Southern Darfur, Northern Khartoum, Blue Nile, Khartoum & Other Northern States and an agreement was reached with MoE West Darfur to ensure efficient distribution of materials. Materials were distributed and training of teachers offered in Kassala.
- Catholic Relief Services (CRS) supporting community capacity development and providing food for education in collaboration with WFP in many locations.
- World Vision supported education of 623 disabled children, trained 30 teachers on food management and provided food for education for 1,383 children in Khartoum.
- 1,380 teachers are currently being trained on the HIV/AIDS life-skills curriculum, endorsed last December 2008.
- In southern Sudan, 1,270 teachers have received Intensive English Language and Interactive Teaching Methodologies training in Juba, Wau, Aweil, Yambio, Malakal, Renk, Kuajok, Bor and Bentiu.
- 1,700 student kits, 17,000 teacher kits, 3,300 head teacher kits, 3,300 recreation kits, 500 boxes of exercise books and 400,000 school–in–a–box kits distributed to benefit 1.6 million children in schools in southern Sudan (target 250,000).

E_2 To increase enrolment and retention in basic education including pre-schooling in hard-to-reach, marginalized and disadvantaged areas.

- More than 130,000 children have been registered for enrolment when the school year opens.
- Constructed 11 semi-permanent classrooms, seven kitchens and seven food store rooms in the northern corridor of West Darfur; rehabilitating classrooms in South Darfur.
- Completed an assessment of food for education in West Darfur; joint education gap assessment.
- Girls' and nomadic education strategies will accelerate accessing children in hard to reach, marginalized and disadvantaged areas.
- 2,400 children are benefiting from ECD services in South Kordofan.
- 990 Parent Teacher Association (PTA) members are currently being trained on school comanagement in South Darfur and Geneina (of which 890 supported and 100 leaders and members from 5 El Geneina IDP schools supported).
- Conducted training on the construction, use and maintenance of fuel-efficient stoves for 26 schools cooks from 14 El Geneina schools.
- Established six hand pumps for schools and constructed 15 school latrines in Khartoum.
- A total of 1.6 million children are enrolled in schools all over southern Sudan (target 250,000)

E_3 To increase access to quality non-formal/alternative or complementary learning opportunities with a special focus on at-risk and out-of-school youth, adolescents and adults.

 Accelerated Learning Programme National Strategy and State Plans have been drafted and are under review at State level.

Priorities

- completion of the joint assessment and action planning to address emerging gaps, including the strengthening of the cluster system;
- mobilization of \$10 million to cover areas previously supported by the 9 expelled NGOs;
- rapid procurement of learning materials and rehabilitation of temporary classrooms in advance of the opening of the school year;
- engagement with Partners to invest in PTA capacity development to implement at community level:
- advocate for capacity development of remaining NGOs; Sector coordination; monitoring and evaluation of UN and Partners' Work Plans;
- Sector leads at federal and state levels should follow-up with Government in the planned recruitment and placement of teachers in Darfur. Ad interim, provide incentives through training to attract teachers to schools that used to be covered by expelled NGOs as well are in areas with newly displaced children;
- reallocate CHF to NGOs that have committed to fill gaps;
- the decentralization of textbook printing has reduced costs and enhanced the chances of improved and timely availability of textbooks;
- the Education Sector policy review process will create opportunities for greater national leadership, ownership and accountability for action;

Focus: Restore, improve and stabilize food security and diversify livelihoods that are environmentally sustainable and conflict-sensitive.

The Food Security and Livelihoods situation varies across states, geographic regions and population groups. Food insecurity is reported in Darfur and is chronic in Kassala and Red Sea state. Instability in Abyei has forced the UN and Partners to focus on rebuilding destroyed premises and recovering lost assets. The border between Sudan and the Republic of Chad is also unstable, resulting in frequent displacement. Post-harvest assessments conducted in 2008 predicted a more favourable harvest than in the previous year, but yields remain insufficient to meet requirements. IDPs in camps, as well as recent returnees, may have minimal access to farmland and therefore remain at higher risk to malnutrition.

Although the overall security situation remains mostly unchanged since the beginning of 2009, there were threats of further potential deterioration of the humanitarian access following the decision to remove 16 NGOs. Lack of funding and logistical capacity has hindered coverage of critical gaps.

While a WFP one-off distribution in areas affected by the removals filled the immediate gap, it is not a sustainable approach in the longer term. Discussions have taken place with alternative NGO partners, but agreements have not yet been concluded. The Three Areas and the east were also affected by the departure of the removed NGOs, which abruptly cut assistance to some 46,000 beneficiaries of nutrition and livelihoods interventions.

Inter-tribal conflicts in southern Sudan have caused continued displacements and constrain food security actions, particularly in Akobo county and Jonglei state. Transportation costs and inputs are also high in southern Sudan, limiting coverage to 42% of targeted beneficiaries.

Funding across Sudan is lower than the same period in the previous year both for humanitarian and early recovery programmes. Hence early recovery and sustainable initiatives remain at low levels and slow pace.

Objectives:

FSL_1 To reduce acute food insecurity among vulnerable populations.

• Through the end of March 2009, WFP reached about 3.5 million beneficiaries, providing over 104,500 MT of food assistance. This includes some 2.45 million IDPs, refugees and returnees, who received about 84,000 MT of assistance. The tonnage provided through the end of the first quarter was about 50% of the estimated mid-year target.

FSL_2 To restore and maintain household food security for vulnerable populations and host communities.

- Emphasis during the first five months of the year has been mostly on the preparation of support
 to farmers in the 2009 main cropping season (rainy season), involving identification of
 beneficiaries (areas and population groups in critical need for productive inputs) and needs
 (seed and tool kits appropriate to local customs and needs, technical support such as relevant
 training), procurement of agricultural inputs and timely prepositioning of the same for the rainy
 season.
- Reduced funding levels in 2009, particularly from CHF, have limited quantities and outreach of support to agricultural production; less than 50% of targeted beneficiaries are estimated to have received assistance.

 Livestock protection (vaccination and treatment) services are being provided with quantities of vaccines and drugs from carryover funds from 2008. Close cooperation has been established with the Ministry of Animals and Fisheries, as well as with the National Laboratories, for the production of vaccines.

FSL_3 To promote and strengthen livelihoods' coping mechanisms to enhance resilience of vulnerable households, promote sustainable natural resource management and prevent natural resource-based disputes and disease outbreaks.

- Activities include diversification of food production (vegetable and fruit production, small animal husbandry), food processing and environmental and natural resource restoration. Many activities are planned predominantly to be promoted and practiced in winter (November to April).
- Tree nurseries rehabilitation and tree seedlings production have been supported from carryover funds from a joint project by United Nations Environment Programme and Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (UNEP/FAO) in Darfur. Activities are aimed at supporting food production, protecting the environment and promoting fuel saving techniques.

Priorities

Agricultural activities for the rainy season are under preparation with the procurement and prepositioning of inputs at state level. The budget available until now is far below requirements.

• More financial support will be needed during the coming months to support critical food security and livelihood activities and to protect the assets and effects of previous interventions.

Sector partners should continue providing food aid to the most vulnerable and at the same time support self-reliance through early recovery.

• The Sector should enhance integrated programming in order to build communities' capacity to prepare for and respond to food and agriculture threats and emergencies.

Funding to the Food Security and Livelihoods (FSL) Sector does not support the focus on restoring, improving and stabilizing food security.

- Increased coordination is needed to improve impact in the FSL sector, with additional costs.
- Additional costs are also to be considered due to MORSS (Minimum Operating Residential Standards for Security) compliance and sometimes the scope of the initiative.

Focus: To strengthen local capacity to mitigate, prepare for, respond to and properly manage public health risks to prevent avoidable mortality and morbidity. The Sector will place emphasis on maternal and child health and on ensuring vulnerable populations are covered by an integrated health and nutrition service package.

The expulsion of NGOs and deterioration of the security situation have led to the disruption of many health programmes. Additionally, technical and managerial capacities have been affected, as many senior staff and expatriates have been lost, with the largest overall impact being experienced in Darfur. In the Three Areas, the removal of NGOs has also affected health and nutrition programmes, potentially influencing the peace process.

Funding for nutrition and health has been less than in previous years. The Government has shown increased commitment to filling operational gaps and facilitating humanitarian aid, however vast unmet needs persist— especially in terms of quality and quantity of service delivery.

As of 3 May 2009, the joint UN-Government presentation indicated that 130,000 people in Darfur (compared to 650,000 on 4 March) still lack access to health services due to the expulsion of NGOs. It is estimated that approximately 43 facilities have been affected by the removal of the NGOs, while the number of facilities closed has been reduced from 12 to five; issues of quality and completeness of services persist nonetheless. The gaps in vital basic services (including social mobilization and community-level screening), mobile clinics and emergency obstetric care in remote areas are still not covered. Disease outbreaks, such as meningitis and polio, have so far been dealt with through mass vaccination campaigns.

The nutrition sector has responded quickly by re-establishing selective feeding programmes through partnership with the Government and new partners. By the end of May, 33 of 35 (94%) of therapeutic feeding programmes and all 14 supplementary feeding programmes had resumed in Darfur. The National Nutrition Policy has been endorsed and launched. The Ministry of Health (MoH) and UN and Partners conducted a Child Health Week as part of the Accelerated Child Survival and Development Initiative, targeting six million children with high-impact nutrition initiatives and low cost health and nutrition interventions.

The MoH and the UN have developed a specific joint action plan for health, and monitoring indicators to ensure that the response is maintained and the quality of the interventions are improved. This is an important tool in responding to the NGO suspensions and advocating for improvements and funding.

The health and nutrition sector was highly under-funded during the first CHF allocation (less than 10% of needs), resulting in a large response gap.

The main sector concerns include:

- availability and sustainability of health and nutrition services;
- quality and level of services provided;
- retention and augmentation of available skilled human resources;
- inadequate availability of funds to ensure medium- to long-term operational running costs;
- increased disease outbreaks and malnutrition during rainy and onset of the lean season.

The challenge for the next period is to ensure the filling of gaps through a commitment of both the international community and the government. The current reduction in capacity or financial resources impedes service delivery and quality. Additionally, commitments by the government and partners in other areas, in particular food aid and food security as well as water and sanitation, must be ensured

in order to prevent additional increases in caseload through a weakened network of health and nutrition services. If this is not maintained, the sector will require increased humanitarian response.

Achievements against objectives:

HN_1 To contribute towards better access for vulnerable populations to quality health care services that include a basic health package, nutrition and emergency referral services.

- More than 1.3 million patients have attended outpatient departments of health facilities (Darfur target 1,454,555).
- More than 1 million beneficiaries have been supported in the area of PHC.
- Eight states have emergency plans and pre-positioned supplies for outbreak preparedness.
- Around 560,000 IDP/community health workers benefited from health awareness campaigns focusing on health and nutrition key messages and in some cases active case finding and reporting of public health and nutrition threats.
- More than 35,000 beneficiaries benefited from routine immunization activities, out of which 265 were women at child bearing age.
- Two laboratories supported to ensure the continuity of diagnostic capacity in areas affected by the removal of the INGOs.
- 7 of 12 health facilities closed have been re-established through MoH and health cluster support.
- Over 750 staff trained during reporting period to support active case finding, meningitis case management, and to revitalize the disrupted Early Warning System (EWARS) Emergency Obstetric Care services lab techniques, focusing on areas affected by the removal of INGOs.
- By the end of April, more than 5,500 acutely malnourished children and more than 18,500 moderately malnourished children 6-59 months have been admitted for treatment in Darfur and non-Darfur states.
- Re-establishment of 33 of 35 therapeutic feeding centres and 14 of 14 supplementary feeding centres (affected by the removal of NGOs) through the provision of financial technical and logistic support to SMOH teams to take over the management of these centres and other cluster partners.

HN_2 To strengthen local capacity to predict, prepare for, respond to, mitigate and manage health and nutrition risks that include communicable diseases and seasonal emergencies, with measures such as outbreak control and nutrition surveillance.

- 85% of communicable disease outbreaks detected within 48 hours (target 100%);
- 80% of EWARS sentinel surveillance sites re-established in areas affected by the removal of the NGOs;
- 158,302 people (2-30 years) immunized and protected from meningitis;
- six million children vaccinated against polio (February, March and April rounds) during reporting period;
- eight high-risk states have developed emergency plans and have propositioned supplies for outbreak preparedness;
- environmental health programs, including vector control carried out in Darfur reaching 143,000;
- health care waste management programme reaching over 300,000:
- water quality control initiatives reaching 169,410;
- nutritional surveillance system maintained and strengthened;
- over 200 staff trained on treatment of severe acute malnutrition;
- training on preventative nutrition has been carried out for midwives, communities and health workers, including infant and young child feeding, salt iodization monitoring, nutrition behaviour change communication and blanket supplementary feeding.

HN_3 To contribute to a reduction in maternal and child morbidity and mortality focusing on Safe Motherhood interventions.

- On average, 44% of births have been attended by skilled health personnel.
- Six million children under five targeted through April Child Health Weeks with Vitamin A and deworming.
- Launch and endorsement of the National Nutrition Policy giving the government and partners a framework to address the nutrition situation in Sudan.
- Finalization of the Minimum Nutrition Package training manuals and facilitator manuals.
- 56 cases of vaginal fistula were repaired in Maternity hospital.

SUDAN

Priorities

- The main challenge is inadequate funding, which hinders the response ability.
- Strengthening the roll-out of the cluster approach and support its implementation, with a special focus on emergency States such as the three Darfur States.
- Focus on enhanced preparedness and timely response to the upcoming rainy and hunger season.
- Preparedness measures for Nile floods, including pre-positioning of stocks, especially in areas that might become inaccessible.
- Identification of durable solutions to upgrade the health and nutrition system.

Focus: Strengthen national capacities and implement mine action through assessments, clearance of mines and explosive remnants of war (ERW), victim assistance and mine risk education programmes throughout Sudan, in accordance with national and mission priorities.

The Mine Action Sector has facilitated safer movement through survey and land clearance, mine risk education, socio-economic reintegration of victims and capacity-building of national partners. Clearance in localities such as Lobanok and Kajo Keji in southern Sudan and Kurmuk in Blue Nile State provide land for re-settlement and access for agriculture.

Security proved to be a challenge in southern Sudan; operations in Jonglei state were relocated, and temporally suspended in Maridi, Malakal and north of Rumbek. In Darfur, surveys, uxo destruction and risk education has been suspended by the Government since 2 March. As a result, the Sudanwide target has been reset from 7,605km to 3,005km of road assessed and/or verified for 2009.

Achievements against objectives

MA_1 To facilitate free and safe mission and humanitarian operations through survey and clearance of landmines and ERW.

- 2,394km of road were opened through assessments and clearance; including Marial Bai-Raja in southern Sudan and Kauda-Talodi in South Kordofan State.
- More than 16 million m² of land were cleared of mines and ERW, as well as 1,514 antipersonnel, 284 anti-tank and over 22,000 UXO destroyed.

MA_2 To reduce the risk of injury from mines and ERW and facilitate the reintegration of victims through targeted mine risk education and victim assistance.

- Mine risk education was provided to 116,895 persons; focused on at-risk populations (returnees and people in high- or medium-impact areas).
- Victim Assistance Reintegration projects enhanced the living standards of 363 mine and ERW survivors and their families.

MA_3 To strengthen the management and operational capacities of the national authorities and implementing partners to enable them to address the socio-economic impact of landmine and ERW contamination in Sudan.

 On-the-job training provided to 5 National Mine Action Centres and 9 southern Sudan Demining Authority staff in information management, quality assurance and operations.

Priorities

Capacity development of the National Mine Action Centre and the southern Sudan Demining Authority/Commission remains a priority for the sector. In addition, training and support was provided to raise the management and technical capacity of national NGOs in landmine and ERW clearance, mine risk education and victim assistance.

Focus: To provide Non-Food and Emergency Shelter Items to people affected by conflict and disaster and other extremely vulnerable populations.

The removal of NGOs and subsequent seizure of all CARE-managed NFI Common Pipeline warehouses (El Obeid, Khartoum, El Fasher, Geneina and Nyala) left the NFI Common Pipeline without a transportation partner and effectively crippled operations throughout Sudan. After negotiations with GoNU, all five Pipeline warehouses were handed over to the United Nations Joint Logistics Centre (UNJLC).

Of the revoked NGOs, 11 were needs assessment and distribution partners for NFI; primary partners involved in the provision of environmentally friendly shelter were also lost. In addition to specific sector-related capacity, lost NGO partners had extensive local knowledge of the camps and communities where they worked and had established a level of trust with sector beneficiaries that will not be easily replaced. To date, the sector has managed to re-establish NFI Common Pipeline operations throughout northern Sudan on an emergency basis in close collaboration with the GoNU in general and the Humanitarian Aid Commission in particular. Distributions from all Pipeline warehouses have recommenced and new long-term transport and warehousing partners are in place. Alternative partners have been identified for rainy season needs-assessment and distribution coverage for the majority of households in Darfur and all households in the rest of Sudan. Additional funding has been allocated or is actively being sought for additional modalities to ensure coverage. While the UNJLC and its partners work to serve the needs of IDPs in Darfur, United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) continues to support refugee populations with NFI stocks procured outside the NFI Common Pipeline.

In southern Sudan, increased insecurity, higher than expected levels of displacement and challenges in accessing populations in need tested the sector's ability to meet needs in several southern states. The sector has continued to support spontaneous returnees and disaster-affected populations throughout southern Sudan.

Achievements against objectives

NS_1 To provide needs-based and timely non-food and emergency shelter items to people affected by conflict and disaster, returnees and other vulnerable populations.

In Darfur, more than 80,500 households (target 200,000) have been assisted with non-food items and emergency shelter since 1 January 2009. Of this, 87% are classified as IDPs requiring replenishment, 7% newly displaced, 4% disaster-affected, and 2% vulnerable host populations. NFI distributions in the rest of Sudan have not been substantial to date in 2009, as no major disasters or displacements have occurred:

- emergency replenishment of non-food items and emergency shelter to as many as 7,500 IDP and returnee households in Abyei will be finalized prior to the onset of rains in late May, with support from NFI Common Pipeline and GOAL;
- in southern Sudan, more than 19,000 households (target 36,500) have been assisted since the beginning of the year. Due to on-going LRA attacks in Western and Central Equatoria States and tribal conflicts in Jonglei, the majority of distributions have been to conflict-affected populations, accounting for 59% of households served, 18% have been to flood-affected households and 14% to refugees.

NS_2 To facilitate coordination and timely information sharing amongst all partners and stakeholders in the sector.

- UNJLC continues to facilitate distributions of non-food items and emergency shelter and to spearhead reporting, planning and funding activities. As sector lead, UNJLC organizes interagency task forces for assessments and distributions in areas without coverage.
- Monthly NFI & ES sector updates for Darfur, the Rest of Sudan region and southern Sudan
 ensure regular communication of standard sector-relevant information such as stock positions
 and distribution activities, the funding status of the entire sector and details about specific
 initiatives.
- Weekly reports on sector response to newly displaced populations throughout Sudan, occurring regularly in southern Sudan and Darfur due to outbreaks of conflict.
- Implementation of an emergency strategy for rainy season distributions in Darfur, through identification of replacement agencies for needs assessments and distributions; arrangements for long-term coverage are also being put in place.

NS_3 To expand the provision of environmentally friendly and locally acceptable emergency shelter, using regionally produced and/or externally sourced materials.

- As a result of NGO removals, only 11,306 environmentally friendly shelters have been constructed by sector partners in Darfur in 2009.
- Assessment of impact of emergency shelter construction in northern Sudan on the country's natural resource reserves, focusing especially on Darfur. The program aims to develop guidance for humanitarian organizations on environmentally friendly shelter programming.

Priorities

- Full resumption of NFI Common Pipeline activities in Darfur and the rest of Sudan,
- The implementation of a more comprehensive environmental strategy to mitigate the effects of emergency shelter construction and continued focus on strong and consistent coordination of sector activities throughout Sudan.
- Additional support will be sought from the global emergency shelter cluster lead as the Sudan Country Team moves towards the adoption of the cluster system.
- Preparations for the upcoming rainy season are being implemented throughout Sudan with NFI and ES replenishments underway in Darfur and emergency preparedness activities commencing in the rest of the north and southern Sudan.

Focus: Work with authorities, communities and individuals to ensure the protection of civilians and promote respect for their rights with particular attention to women, children, displaced populations and other individuals with specific needs.

The Protection/Human Rights Sector (PHR) started the year with 110 projects and budgetary requirements of more than \$107 million. Some 99 projects are still active, with 9 revisions and 15 withdrawals, almost exclusively linked to the removal of NGOs. The related loss in budgetary terms is approximately \$7.5 million. Four new projects have been added at mid-year.

The Three Areas and Southern Sudan have seen protection of civilians re-emerging as a concern, with the continuous inter-tribal clashes causing new displacement (Jonglei, Upper Nile) and the LRA-affected displacement and refugee influx in the Equatorias. East Sudan has had a steady influx of asylum seekers, particularly from Eritrea, adding to the existing protracted refugee situation. Funding shortfalls limited operational engagement in Khartoum and southern Sudan. In Darfur, the challenges of access persist and are aggravated by restrictions imposed by the Government on protection actors, notably in South Darfur. This has hampered protection, camp coordination and return-related efforts.

In all areas, the sector has seen a quantitative change: loss of key partners (seven international NGOs and two national NGOs); decrease in coverage for protection monitoring, including in rural areas; exclusion of survivors of violence from referral support; decrease in provision of specialized services, particularly for population with specific needs such as women, children and internally displaced. In northern Sudan the sector experienced a substantial loss of capacity; an overall deterioration of the operational environment, not only in Darfur; and a weakening of the links with communities, essential for community outreach, sensitization and referrals. Direct repercussions on NGO staff and on human rights defenders have been reported. Moreover, the capacity-building and support provided to local NGOs and community organizations has suffered, weakening grass-roots structures.

The PHR sector in North Sudan has examined how the gaps left by the removed NGOs can be filled and tried to identify potential actors. Gaps are likely to remain, however, in the spheres of community referrals and specialized support for gender-based violence (GBV) victims or victims of grave abuses. On a positive side, some segments of protection activities, such as child protection, will be able to absorb the negative impact.

Achievements against Objectives

PHR_1 To increase the protection of civilians and the respect and realization of their rights through targeted and coordinated policies, strategies, programmes and activities, taking into account age, gender and diversity.

- There are about 99 projects still active in the sector as of June 2009: 43 in child protection (including Disarmament, Demobilization and Reintegration), 18 targeted to women empowerment and/or GBV, 13 related to protection monitoring, 10 devoted to access to justice, 5 tackling multiple protection interventions including coordination, 5 targeting refugees protection and assistance and the remaining focusing on individuals with specific needs.
- The PHR sector at central and regional level collectively or through sub-sector leaderships supported important institutional developments in the country: key PHR actors actively provided comments to the Government on the national IDP Policy approved in February 2009; both in North and in South Sudan PHR actors continued the consultation and the advocacy with authorities (NCCW, Ministry of Justice, Ministry for Social Welfare) on crucial legislative reform processes, particularly in the field of child protection and in the field of criminal justice and access to justice for GBV survivors.

- Coordination of protection activities has continued throughout the country with some 46 regional and national fora on protection, child protection and GBV.
- Monitoring missions and visits assess conditions and concerns of the civilian population, formulate plans for targeted support, and verify new displacement situations, new arrivals or the voluntary character of return movements. (e.g. 270 only in Darfur, including rural areas).
- Access to justice and legal aid projects have continued in Darfur, East, Khartoum, Three Areas
 and southern Sudan, but have been severely curtailed in numerous areas of North Sudan due
 to the expulsion of the main specialized NGOs managing these projects.

PHR_2 To improve government prevention of and response to violations by strengthening the capacity of authorities to fulfil their responsibility to protect civilians and promote and respect human rights, with particular attention to those with specific needs (such as children and youth, women, IDPs and refugees).

- PHR actors have actively participated in advocacy campaigns and dialogue with authorities on legislative reform, particularly on child protection and violence against women/GBV.
- Continuous support and expansion of the Family and Child Police Unit, now operational through 14 units/desks (4 new Units established in Gezeera, Blue Nile, South Darfur, North Kordofan and 8 new outreach desks in various States).
- Training and capacity-building initiatives for authorities have targeted various institutions, especially in the field of child protection and GBV (target 60 officials trained).
- Refugee protection, assistance and cooperation with authorities on refugee matters remained at the forefront of UNHCR activities in Khartoum and the East as well as in Darfur and in the LRA-related emergency in South Sudan. Support to asylum authorities (Commissioner for Refugees), technical assistance and on the job training (350 staff) was provided. In East Sudan, UNHCR and COR and managed to complete the first phase of a comprehensive verification, with more than 62,000 camp-based refugees having their status verified. Legal and social counselling for urban refugees and asylum seekers continued in Khartoum, with Court interventions and the provision of social and emergency medical assistance for more than 1,000 vulnerable refugees.

PHR_3 To empower communities and individuals to know and exercise their rights, in particular the rights of women and children.

- Almost 70 percent of the PHR projects countrywide have been devoted to the needs of women and children, entirely or as part of a comprehensive intervention;
- Awareness on child protection principles has reportedly reached almost 3 million people with targeted messages on child rights, including public awareness campaign on the Family and Children Police Unit.
- These segments of PHR activities has been particularly hit by the NGO removals. Whereas in child protection some gaps may be filled and solutions may be in sight in agreement with the authorities, the challenges are bigger in GBV-related activities. A dialogue with the authorities continues to be sought.

Priorities

- Priorities set in the different regions remain a guide for action in the remaining part of the year.
 The PHR sector should be included in all advocacy efforts that the UN system undertakes with the government and a more regular dialogue be established.
- The attention and participation of all protection/human rights actors and a stronger inter-agency coordination— within the sector and inter-sector — will have to increase in specific areas to increase impact and fill gaps.

Focus: Continue to facilitate a voluntary and informed return process for IDPs and refugees, to assist spontaneous and organized returns and to strengthen reintegration assistance in areas of return through a joint approach with GoNU, GoSS and other actors.

With the conclusion of most north-south convoys under the Joint Organized Return Programme, only a few targeted south-south movements, spontaneous IDP returns and sporadic convoys organized by state governments or political bodies have occurred so far this year. Emphasis has shifted in the north to improved coordination with state-organized movements to the southern states and Three Areas, as well as to the expansion and refinement of tracking and monitoring activities to capture spontaneous return movements. The announcement of the electoral calendar has created the possibility of a surge in returns in late 2009. General insecurity and inter-ethnic violence across many areas of return has produced secondary displacement, including backflows to previous areas of displacement.

Objectives:

RR_1 For UN agencies and authorities to coordinate organized returns characterized by a voluntary (i.e. free and well-informed) decision-making process.

- Figures for organized IDP returns comprised 3,039 individuals during April 2009, for a total of 8,687 so far in 2009.
- As of the end of May 2009, UNHCR reported the total for organized and assisted repatriation had reached 27,658 individuals since the beginning of the.
- Including spontaneous movements, cumulative total repatriation had meanwhile climbed to nearly 324,000 since 2005. More than 60% of Sudanese refugees have now returned home.

RR_2 For UN agencies and authorities to coordinate the provision of and identification of gaps in environmentally sustainable early reintegration assistance to spontaneous and organized returnees, and to build the capacity of their receiving communities.

- Capacity-building workshops have been organized for seven of the thirteen Return, Reintegration and Recovery (RRR) field locations.
- Consultations with the relevant authorities have been conducted by all thirteen RRR field teams
 to advocate the inclusion of high-return areas into the planning process for reintegration
 strategies.
- Return and Reintegration Working Groups continued to meet at national, regional and field (state/area) levels. National counterparts have gradually and increasingly assumed the chair of these fora in an effort to strengthen ownership, build capacity and promote sustainability of the reintegration process.

RR_3 To provide a planning tool for the delivery of basic services and livelihood opportunities in areas of return.

- Tracking of spontaneous returns from the north at the major transit hub in Kosti by Adventist
 Development and Relief Agency and the IOM has complemented the expansion of returnee
 monitoring to cover additional areas of returnees in the southern states and Three Areas.
- Monthly returnee reports provide figures for planning of reintegration activities by sector partners.
- All 13 RRR field teams have begun entering and updating data for the Return and Reintegration Information Management System to enable analysis and identification of gaps in the provision of early reintegration assistance.

Priorities

For the remainder of 2009, the sector will continue to shift its priorities towards early reintegration activities in an effort to promote the creation of conditions conducive to sustainable return.

Focus: Ensure equitable access to safe water supply and improve sanitation and hygiene

The impact of the removal of NGOs on service delivery requires the sector to seek new partners and funding sources. Eight removed or suspended NGOs were active in the water and sanitation sector. In the north, they handled 15 projects with total requirements of about \$21 million.

In Abyei, Water, Environment and Sanitation (WES) sector partners are very limited; sanitation, hygiene promotion and capacity-building at community and government levels are among the key challenges. UN and Partner support to establish WES unit and maintenance centre in Abyei town is expected to enhance sustainability of water supply systems. In Blue Nile, ousted NGOs planned to provide WASH services to 37,500 returnees and host communities (16.7% of the total planned budget for 2009). Alternative interventions will partially fill the gap.

With 36 sector projects, Darfur had secured a budget of \$30.5 million of which a significant amount went to the removed NGOs. The UN-Government Joint Assessment Mission published 24 March indicated that 989,490 people from 38 IDP locations were critically affected by the removal. Challenges remain in filling capacity gaps and providing resources for better planning, coordination, monitoring and supervision of activities. The government with the support of UN and Partners is filling most gaps created by the removed NGOs.

In the Eastern States, with a secured budget of nearly \$2.2 million, capacity to respond to 50,000 returnees and host communities has been lost with the removal of the sole NGO provider. A low level of funding from donors remains the biggest challenge in the region.

Most partners in Khartoum and the northern states have not implemented significant activities due to lack of funding, others have focused on pre-positioning emergency supplies for acute watery diarrhoea (AWD) and floods response.

In Southern Kordofan, four NGOs engaged in sector projects were removed, affecting at least 175,000 people, according to the Joint UN/Government assessment team,

Achievements against Objectives

WS_1 Sustain access to improved water and sanitation services and hygiene promotion for emergency affected populations

• Water and sanitation services have been sustained in all northern regions, meeting or exceeding mid-year targets in Abyei (120%) and Darfur (92%), and short of targets in Blue Nile (56%), Eastern States (50%) and Southern Kordofan (33%).

WS_2 Expand/re-establish access to improved water and sanitation services and hygiene promotion for emergency affected populations

• Service delivery exceeded mid-year targets in Abyei (153%) and Blue Nile (190%). In the East, delivery achieved 75% of the target. Service fell well below mid-year targets in Darfur (33%), Khartoum (34%) and Southern Kordofan (26%).

WS_3 Build capacity of communities, local authorities, and implementing partners to sustain and expand water, sanitation and hygiene services, and to manage water resources to improve resilience to drought and sustainability of services.

• Achievements fell short of mid-year targets in most regions: Khartoum (9%) Darfur (17%), Abyei (35%), Southern Kordofan (41%) and the Eastern States (45%). In Blue Nile, achievements reached 118% of the mid-year target.

Consolidated Appeal Process (CAP)

The CAP is a tool for aid organisations to jointly plan, coordinate, implement and monitor their response to disasters and emergencies, and to appeal for funds together instead of competitively.

It is the forum for developing a strategic approach to humanitarian action, focusing on close cooperation between host governments, donors, non-governmental organisations (NGOs), the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, International Organization for Migration (IOM), and United Nations agencies. As such, it presents a snapshot of the situation and response plans, and is an inclusive and coordinated programme cycle of:

- Strategic planning leading to a Common Humanitarian Action Plan (CHAP);
- Resource mobilisation leading to a Consolidated Appeal or a Flash Appeal;
- Coordinated programme implementation;
- Joint monitoring and evaluation;
- Revision, if necessary;
- Reporting on results.

The CHAP is the core of the CAP – a strategic plan for humanitarian response in a given country or region, including the following elements:

- A common analysis of the context in which humanitarian action takes place;
- An assessment of needs;
- Best, worst, and most likely scenarios;
- A clear statement of longer-term objectives and goals;
- Prioritised response plans, including a detailed mapping of projects to cover all needs;
- A framework for monitoring the strategy and revising it if necessary.

The CHAP is the core of a Consolidated Appeal or, when crises break out or natural disasters strike, a Flash Appeal. Under the leadership of the Humanitarian Coordinator, and in consultation with host Governments and donors, the CHAP is developed at the field level by the Humanitarian Country Team. This team includes IASC members and standing invitees (UN agencies, the International Organization for Migration, the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, and NGOs that belong to ICVA, Interaction, or SCHR), but non-IASC members, such as national NGOs, can also be included.

The Humanitarian Coordinator is responsible for the annual preparation of the consolidated appeal document. The document is launched globally near the end of each year to enhance advocacy and resource mobilisation. An update, known as the Mid-Year Review, is presented to donors the following July.

Donors generally fund appealing agencies directly in response to project proposals listed in appeals. The **Financial Tracking Service (FTS)**, managed by the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), is a database of appeal funding needs and worldwide donor contributions, and can be found on www.reliefweb.int/fts.

In sum, the CAP is how aid agencies join forces to provide people in need the best available protection and assistance, on time.

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
