MEASURES TO PREVENT INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM WHICH ENDANGERS OR TAKES INNOCENT HUMAN LIVES OR JEOPARDIZES FUNDAMENTAL FREEDOMS, AND STUDY OF THE UNDERLYING CAUSES OF THOSE FORMS OF TERRORISM AND ACTS OF VIOLENCE WHICH LIE IN MISERY, ' FRUSTRATION, GRIEVANCE AND DESPAIR AND WHICH CAUSE SOME PEOPLE TO SACRIFICE HUMAN LIVES, INCLUDING THEIR OWN, IN AN ATTEMPT TO EFFECT RADICAL CHANGES: REPORT OF THE <u>AD HOC</u> COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM

Administrative and financial implications of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/32/L.13

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

1. The Sixth Committee at its 68th meeting held on 9 December 1977 adopted the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/32/L.13. It had before it a statement of financial implications (A/C.6/32/L.17).

2. Under the terms of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/32/L.13, the General Assembly would, <u>inter alia</u>:

(a) Invite the <u>Ad Hoc</u> Committee on International Terrorism to continue its work in accordance with the mandate entrusted to it under General Assembly resolution 303⁴ (XXVII), first by studying the underlying causes of terrorism and then by recommending practical measures to combat terrorism;

(b) Request the Secretary-General to provide the <u>Ad Hoc</u> Committee with the necessary facilities and services including summary records.

3. The estimated costs provided hereunder are based on the following assumptions:

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(a) The <u>Ad Hoc</u> Committee would hold a meeting in New York from 19 March to 6 April 1979:

(b) Four languages, English, French, Russian and Spanish, would be used for all purposes during the meeting, but pre-session and post-session documentation would be in five and six languages, respectively;

(c) Documentation in original language would be as follows: 100 pages each for pre-session and post-session and 150 pages for in-session.

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4. Based on the above assumptions the estimated costs would be as follows:
