Supplementary Report submitted by the Secretary-General

The Secretary-General has the honour to communicate to the Economic and Social Council the text of the additional reply of the Government of Japan^{1/} to the Questionnaire on Slavery and Servitude.^{2/}

Note dated 14 September 1954 to the Secretary-General
from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of Japan

"The Minister for Foreign Affairs of Japan presents his compliments to the Secretary-General of the United Nations and has the honour to acknowledge the receipt of his note No. SOA 321/02 (1) of 27 May 1954, requesting the Japanese Government to review its earlier reply to the questionnaire on slavery and servitude and forward to him any additional data or information which it may think it necessary or appropriate to submit.

In compliance with that request, the Japanese Government has examined its earlier reply, and found it desirable to add some data to its reply of 19 January 1954 (Note No. 15/IC1).

The Minister would therefore be grateful if the Secretary would be so kind as to add the following to Question 5 of the said reply:
