CONCLUSION OF EFFECTIVE INTERNATIONAL ARRANGEMENTS ON THE STRENGTHENING OF THE SECURITY OF NON-NUCLEAR-WEAPON STATES AGAINST THE USE OR THREAT OF USE OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS

Bulgaria and Nigeria: revised draft resolution

Conclusion of effective international arrangements on the strengthening of the security of non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons

The General Assembly.

<u>Deeply concerned</u> by the arms race, in particular the nuclear arms race, and the possibility of the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons,

<u>Convinced</u> that nuclear disarmament and the complete elimination of nuclear weapons are essential to remove the danger of nuclear war,

<u>Considering</u> that, until complete nuclear disarmament is achieved on a universal basis, it is imperative for the international community to develop effective arrangements to ensure the security of non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons,

Noting the general desire to conclude effective international measures to that end at an early date,

Noting also the unilateral declarations on the security of non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons made by all nuclear-weapon States, A/C.1/44/L.23/Rev.1 English Page 2

<u>Desirous</u> of promoting the implementation of paragraph 59 of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly, 1/ the first special session devoted to disarmament,

<u>Recognizing</u> that effective measures of such security assurances to non-nuclear-weapon States would constitute an important contribution to the non-proliferation of nuclear weapons,

<u>Aware</u> of the in-depth negotiations on this subject in the (onference on Disarmament during the past ten years,

<u>Recalling</u> the relevant parts of the special report of the Committee on Disarmament 2/ submitted to the General Assembly at its twelfth special session, 3/ the second special session devoted to disarmament, and of the special report of the Conference on Disarmament submitted to the Assembly at its fifteenth special session, 4/ the third special session devoted to disarmament, as well as of the annual report of the Conference on its 1989 session, 5/

<u>Welcoming</u> the unanimous support in the Conference on Disarmament to continuing the search for a common approach to the substance of negative security assurances, which could be included in a legally binding document,

<u>Recognizing</u> the need for a fresh look at the issue, in particular by the nuclear-weapon States, in order to overcome the difficulties encountered at the negotiations in previous years,

Noting the proposals on this subject submitted to the Conference on Disarmament, $\underline{6}/$

1. <u>Reaffirms</u> the urgent need, pending the achievement of complete nuclear disarmament, to reach an early agreement on effective international arrangements to assure non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons;

2. <u>Recommends</u> that the Conference on Disarmament pursue intensive negotiations 'n its <u>Ad Hoc</u> Committee on Effective International Arrangements to Assure Non-Nuclear-Weapon States against the Use or Threat of Use of Nuclear Weapons at the beginning of its 1990 session, with a view to reaching such an agreement, taking into account the widespread support in the Conference for conclusion of an international convention and giving consideration to any other proposals designed to secure the same objective;

3. Appeals to all States, in particular the nuclear-weapon States, to demonstrate willingness and to exercise the flexibility necessary to reach agreement on a common approach to, including the possibility of a common formula in, an international instrument or instruments of a legally binding character, to assure the non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons;

4. <u>Decides</u> to include in the provisional agenda of its forty-fifth session the item entitled "Conclusion of effective international arrangements on the strengthening of the security of non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons".
