Australia's Refugee Policy

Society for Threatened Peoples is deeply concerned about Australia's policy towards refugees. Though ninety percent of Australia's asylum seekers are found to be genuine refugees, the country tries to reduce boat arrivals through a new policy of "Operation Sovereign Borders" policy. Of the over 6,000 people in such immigration detention facilities offshore and in Australia, 345 have been detained between and one and two years. 900 Children are among the detained.

Experts have warned about the long-lasting health effects of a prolonged detention. Many of the asylum-seekers have fled traumatizing situations such as war and persecution. Their trauma is only made worse by a prolonged detention.

The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees has criticized the conditions in which people were living after visits to Nauru and Manus Island detention centers.

Society for Threatened Peoples Society for Threatened Peoples therefore calls on the Human Rights Council to call on the Government of Australia to:

 Acknowledge the criticism by the UN High Commissioner for Refugees and end its policy of a prolonged detention of asylum-seekers.
