### Extensions of ongoing country programmes

#### Note by the secretariat

##### *Summary*

In accordance with Executive Board decision 2009/11, this note informs the Executive Board of the first one-year extensions of the country programmes for Burkina Faso, Mozambique, Somalia and Yemen, all of which were approved by the Executive Director.

The note further presents the reasons for the proposed one-year extensions of the country programmes for Côte d'Ivoire, Lebanon and Libya. The Executive Board is requested to approve these programme extensions.

###### *The Executive Board*

1. *Takes note* of the first one-year extensions of the country programmes for Burkina Faso, Mozambique, Somalia and Yemen, all of which were approved by the Executive Director, as presented in table 1;
2. *Approves* the one-year extensions of the country programmes for Côte d'Ivoire, Lebanon and Libya, as presented in table 2.
