## Statement

The Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil welcomes the transition from the Millennium Development Goals, which was a catalyst for its formation, to the upcoming sustainable development goals.

Similar to when the Millennium Development Goals were introduced, we foresee that governments, corporations, organizations and efforts will once again gravitate and align itself towards the sustainable development goals.

Many of the proposed sustainable development goals reflect our objectives of sustainable production of palm oil, thus making them shared goals. Among them include poverty alleviation, food security, water management, addressing climate change, managing forests, biodiversity conservation, sustainable development and economic growth.

However, the one sustainable development goal that resonates best with us is in ensuring sustainable consumption and production patterns and that is exactly what we have been striving to achieve since inception.

We are pleased to say that multi-stakeholder initiatives and commodity roundtables such as our organization have made significant progress and achieved a reasonable level of success. We have successfully forged tangible links between buyers and sellers in markets worldwide. We have effectively established a network between a kaleidoscope of stakeholders that are concerned, be it directly or indirectly, with the commodity of interest. We are now viewed upon as a credible avenue that is empowered and capable of delivering environmental, social and commercial outcomes.

All that being said, the journey is still long and there is still plenty more ground for us to cover before we can come close to achieving our shared goals.
