THE SITUATION IN CENTRAL AMERICA: THREATS TO INTERNATIONAL PEACE AND SECURITY AND PEACE INITIATIVES

Cuba, Iran (Islamic Republic of), Libyan Arai Jamahiriya, Nicaragua, United Republic of Tanzania and Zambia: draft resolution

The General Assembly,

<u>Taking note</u> of the statements made in the General Assembly and the Security Council regarding the invasion of Panama,

Reaffirming the sovereign and inalienable right of Panama to determine freely its social, economic and political system and to develop its international relations without any form of foreign intervention, interference, subversion, coercion or threat,

Recalling that, in conformity with Article 2, paragraph 4, of the Charter of the United Nations, all Member States shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any State, or in any other manner inconsistent with the purposes of the United Nations,

Reaffirming the need to restore conditions which will guarantee the full exercise of the human rights and fundamental freedoms of the Panamanian people,

Expressing its profound concern at the serious consequences the armed intervention by the United States of America in Panama might have for peace and security in the Central American region,

1. Strongly deplores the intervention in Panama by the armed forces of the United States of America, which contitutes a flagrant violation of international law and of the independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity of States;

- 2. <u>Demands</u> the immediate cessation of the intervention and the withdrawal of the United States armed invasion forces from Panama;
- 3. <u>Demands also</u> full respect for and strict observance of the letter and spirit of the Torrijos-Carter Treaties;
- 4. <u>Calls upon</u> all States to uphold and respect the sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of Panama;
- 5. Requests the Secretary-General to monitor the developments in Panama and to report to the General Assembly within a twenty-four-hour period after the adoption of the present resolution.
