- 3. Requests the Secretary-General to transmit to Member Covernments not later than 1 October of each year:
- (i) A list of the recommendations of the General Assembly and of the Council on economic and social matters adopted during the year ending 1 September and requiring specific action by Covernments, drawing attention to the fact that in certain cases the relevant information will have been requested from Members in a different context;
- (ii) A list of previous recommendations of the Ceneral Assembly and of the Council on which in the Secretary-General's opinion further reports on continuing action by Governments under this resolution are necessary;
- (iii) A list showing previous recommendations, not falling under (ii) above, which are yet to be implemented or which require further action by the particular Government to which each communication is addressed; and
- 4. Requests Member Covernments to report on the steps taken to give effect to the recommendations transmitted to them by the Secretary-General under paragraph 3 above in time for their replies to reach the Secretary Ceneral by 1 March of the year following receipt of the Secretary-General's communication, and to arrange their report in such a form as to assist the Secretary-General in compiling the annotated list referred to in paragraph 5 (ii) and (iii) below:
- 5. Further requests the Secretary-General:
- (i) To circulate the full text of the reports received from Member Governments under paragraph 4 above immediately on receipt;
- (ii) To transmit to the Council not later than 1 May of each year a report containing:
  - (a) A fully annotated list to serve as an index to all the reports received under paragraph 4 above before 1 March of the same year and indicating in what other context information has been supplied which does not appear in these reports;
  - (b) A factual statement regarding the extent to which Governments have not reported on the implementation of the recommendations transmitted to them under paragraph 3 above;

- (iii) To arrange the list referred to in paragraph 5 (ii) so that it will show:
  - (a) Which resolutions deal only with requests for factual information;
  - (b) The extent of compliance to requests falling under paragraph 5 (iii) (a)."

At its minth session the Council, in resolution 255 (IX), establishing an ad hoc committee on this subject, urged "all Governments to reply fully and in good time to the questions submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with the resolutions of the General Assembly and the Council."

With a view to the preparation of his report for May 1950, the Secretary-General has the honour to request your Government to report on the steps taken to give effect to the recommendations referred to in paragraphs 3 (i) and (ii) and (iii) of resolution 210 (VIII) above. Annexes I, II and III to the present communication contain lists of the resolutions in question together with information which the Secretary-General feels might be of assistance to your Government in preparing its reply. Annexes I and II are the same for all Governments and relate respectively to the recommendations falling under paragraphs 3 (i) and 3 (ii) of the above resolution. Annex III lists for each Government those resolutions which appear to fall under paragraph 3 (iii).

In accordance with paragraph 4 of the above-mentioned resolution, the Secretary-General requests that the required information reach him not later than 1 March 1950 in order to permit submission of his report to the Economic and Social Council at its eleventh session. In accordance with a suggestion made in the Council, he would also be glad if your Government could inform him regarding the approximate time required to prepare replies in the case of any recommendations regarding which it is not practicable to report before 1 March 1950.

#### ANNEX I

The following list contains recommendations on economic and social matters adopted by the General Assembly at its third regular session (Parts I and II) and by the Economic and Social Council at its seventh, eighth and ninth sessions on which a report from your Government on specific action which it has taken is requested under the terms of paragraph 3(i) of resolution 210 (VIII).

Recommendations of the seventh session of the Council have been included in the present list in view of the fact that the seventh session of the Council took place after the dispatch of the previous request of the Secretary-General for reports on implementation of resolutions on economic and social matters. Some Governments have provided full or partial information with respect to certain of the following recommendations in other than the present context. The Secretariat, however, in accordance with paragraph 3(i) of resolution 210 (VIII) has limited its action to the compilation of the list of recommendations, drawing attention to the fact that in certain cases the relevant information has been requested from Members in a different context.

Having observed that in several fields post-war supply shortages have been overcome and that sales difficulties are apparent,

Realizing that these sales difficulties may be met by action of the kind which entails a curtailment of production and a reduced utilization of natural resources,

Realizing further that the sales difficulties originate rather from lack of effective monetary demand than from a lack of needs and wants of the broad masses of the population in various countries,

Urges the Member Governments, in working out their national plans for anticyclical measures, to consider the possibilities of giving such measures a form which may promote economic development;

NOTE: A further paragraph of this resolution "Requests the Secretary-General, in co-operation with the specialized agencies, to report to the Economic and Employment Commission and to the regional economic commissions on arrangements that would be conducive to international co-operation in utilizing excess productive capacity for development projects and on the practical measures necessary to implement such arrangements."

In the Secretary-General's opinion much information on national plans for anti-cyclical measures will emerge during the debate in the regional economic commissions on the above-mentioned report by the Secretary-General. However, if any Government is in a position to provide specific information in answer to the present communication, such information will be welcome.

Further recommends that, in view of the considerable economic importance of developing local sources of supply in under-developed countries having an appreciable incidence of malaria and whose exchange position is difficult, technical assistance be extended by the United Nations, specialized agencies and Member Governments to encourage the production of basic forms of insecticides in those under-developed countries in which the necessary preconditions exist for the economical development of such production, as well as the setting up of formulating plants and improvements of methods of application;

Calls to the attention of Member Governments the recommendations of the World Health Organization regarding the correct labelling of insecticides.

# SUBMISSION BY MEMBER GOVERNMENTS OF FISCAL INFORMATION REQUIRED BY THE SECRETARIAT

# INTERNATIONAL STANDARD INDUSTRIAL CLASSIFICATION OF ALL ECONOMIC ACTIVITIES

# The Economic and Social Council

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Recommends that all Member Governments make use of the International Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities either by:

- (a) Adopting this system of classification as a national standard, or
- (b) Rearranging their statistical data in accordance with this system for purposes of international comparability.

# FUBLICITY TO BE GIVEN TO THE UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

# The General Assembly

1. Recommends Governments of Member States to show their adherence to Article 56 of the Charter by using every means within their power solemnly to publicize the text of the Declaration of Human Rights and to cause it to be disseminated, displayed, read and expounded principally in schools and other educational institutions, without distinction based on the political status of countries or territories;

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Declares that the measures which prevent or coerce the wives of citizens of other nationalities from leaving their country of origin with their husbands or in order to join them abroad, are not in conformity with the Charter; and that when those measures refer to the wives of persons belonging to foreign diplomatic missions, or of members of their families or retinue, they are contrary to courtesy, to diplomatic practices and to the principle of reciprocity, and are likely to impair friendly relations among nations;

Recommends the Government of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to withdraw the measures of such a nature which have been adopted."

#### ABOLITION OF OPTUM-SMOKING IN THE FAR EAST
