REPORT OF THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE COMMITTEE (E/3419)

4. Mr. TABIBI (Afghanistan), speaking as the Chairman of the Technical Assistance Committee, said that during the discussions in the Technical Assistance Committee (TAC) the point had been raised whether it would be in order for the Co-ordination Committee to consider certain draft resolutions concerning technical assistance. It had been pointed out that those draft resolutions were properly within the competence of the TAC and further that action would be taken by a body in which the six members of the TAC not members of the Council would be denied a vote. It had been pointed out on the other hand that the draft resolutions concerned matters of co-ordination and that their substance arose from reports which the Council had referred to the Co-ordination Committee. The TAC had asked him to raise that question at a plenary meeting so that the Council might, if it so wished, discuss the competence of those committees.

5. The PRESIDENT put to the vote the draft resolution on the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance in paragraph 30 of the report of the TAC (E/3419).

The draft resolution was adopted unanimously.

6. The PRESIDENT put to the vote the draft resolutions on the Expanded Programme in annexes I-IV of the report of the TAC.

ANNEX I — ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE BOARD TO THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE COMMITTEE

The draft resolution was adopted unanimously.

ANNEX II — IMPLEMENTATION OF TWO-YEAR PROGRAMMING FOR 1961-62

The draft resolution was adopted unanimously.

ANNEX III — COUNTRY PROGRAMMING PROCEDURES

The draft resolution was adopted unanimously.

The draft resolution was adopted by 12 votes to none, with 5 abstentions.

7. Mr. OMAR (Afghanistan) said that he had already informed the TAC at its 222nd and 224th meetings of the reasons for his abstention on the draft resolution on local cost arrangements.

8. Mr. HASSAN (Sudan) explained that he also had abstained because that resolution contained financial implications for the under-developed countries which his government would have to ponder.

9. The PRESIDENT put to the vote the draft resolutions in annexes V and VI of the Committee's report.

ANNEX V — REPORT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON THE UNITED NATIONS PROGRAMMES OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

The draft resolution was adopted unanimously.

10. Mr. HASSAN (Sudan) expressed his government's appreciation of the imaginative proposal which the Secretary-General had made. It was of the utmost importance in view of the events in the Republic of the Congo.

11. Mr de SOUZA-GOMES (Brazil) said that he would abstain from the voting on the draft resolution for the reasons which the Brazilian delegation had given at the 223rd meeting of the TAC.

The draft resolution was adopted by 13 votes to none, with 4 abstentions.

12. The PRESIDENT proposed that the Council approve the Committee's request (E/3418, para. 10) that the

Managing Director of the Special Fund and the Executive Chairman of the Technical Assistance Board undertake a study of questions affecting their two programmes.

It was so agreed.

REPORT OF THE CO-ORDINATION COMMITTEE (E/3420; E/L.882)

13. The PRESIDENT invited comments on draft resolutions A to P contained in paragraph 10 of the report of the Co-ordination Committee (E/3420). An amendment to draft resolution E (E/L.882) had been submitted by the Netherlands delegation.

A. STUDY OF THE EFFECTS OF THE INCREASE IN OPERATIONS OF THE EXPANDED PROGRAMME OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND THE SPECIAL FUND

Draft resolution A was adopted by 14 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

B. WORK OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE ON CO-ORDINATION

Draft resolution B was adopted by 14 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

C. CONCERTED ACTION PROGRAMMES

Draft resolution C was adopted unanimously.

D. ADMINISTRATIVE AND TECHNICAL TRAINING

Draft resolution D was adopted by 14 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

E. CO-ORDINATION IN THE FIELD

14. Mr. MEIJER (Netherlands) said that his amendment (E/L.882) to draft resolution E was intended to make the meaning of the third paragraph of the preamble clearer. The function of the Special Fund was broader than technical assistance and was mainly concerned with pre-investment. The Netherlands amendment, if adopted,

would see to it that the Special Fund retained the scope and functions defined in General Assembly resolution 1219 (XII).

15. Mr. AUBOIN (France) said that he would support the amendment.

The Netherlands amendment was adopted by 14 votes to 3.

Draft resolution E, as amended, was adopted by 14 votes to 3.

F. REVIEW OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION PROGRAMMES

Draft resolution F was adopted by 14 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

G. PROGRAMME APPRAISAL IN THE ECONOMIC, SOCIAL AND HUMAN RIGHTS FIELDS

Draft resolution G was adopted by 14 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

H. DECENTRALIZATION OF ACTIVITIES AND OPERATIONS

Draft resolution H was adopted unanimously.

I. ESTABLISHMENT OF AN *ad hoc* WORKING GROUP

16. Mr. KAWASAKI (Japan) said that the *ad hoc* working group should be established on an experimental basis, which should be reviewed at the Council's thirty-second session. It was most important that new machinery should not be perpetuated unless it proved really useful.

Draft resolution I was adopted by 11 votes to none, with 6 abstentions.

J. CONSULTATION WITH SPECIALIZED AGENCIES

Draft resolution J was adopted by 14 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

K. REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE ON CO-ORDINATION

Draft resolution K was adopted unanimously.

L. CONCENTRATION OF ACTIVITIES OF THE UNITED NATIONS IN THE ECONOMIC, SOCIAL AND HUMAN RIGHTS FIELDS

Draft resolution L was adopted by 14 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

M. TIMELY DISTRIBUTION OF DOCUMENTS

Draft resolution M was adopted unanimously.

N. INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS IN THE FIELD OF EDUCATION, SCIENCE AND CULTURE

Draft resolution N was adopted unanimously.

O. CO-ORDINATION OF THE RESULTS OF SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH

Draft resolution O was adopted unanimously.

P. CO-ORDINATION OF THE RESULTS OF SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH

Draft resolution P was adopted unanimously.

17. Mr. HILL, Deputy Under-Secretary for Economic and Social Affairs, said that the Secretary-General wished

once more to express his regret at having been obliged to leave Geneva so shortly after his arrival and to assure the Council that, despite the urgent tasks he had had to undertake on his return to Headquarters, he had been following the work of the session with interest. The Under-Secretary for Economic and Social Affairs also regretted that his urgent duties in connexion with requests for assistance from the Republic of the Congo had prevented him from attending the latter part of the session.

18. The Secretary-General wished to inform the Council that responsibilities arising in connexion with the requests for assistance by the Republic of the Congo were already taxing the resources of the Secretariat and that the burden was likely to increase in the months ahead. That situation might well necessitate some review of priorities and would in any case call for flexibility in the implementation of the various tasks entrusted to the Secretariat. The Secretary-General hoped that the Secretariat's ability to carry out the major tasks entrusted to it by the Council would not be seriously affected, but that the Council would view with understanding any changes in priorities and in the scheduling of work which might prove unavoidable as a consequence of the emergency.

AGENDA ITEM 16

Calendar of Conferences for 1961 (E/3400, E/3415 and Corr.1)

19. The PRESIDENT invited the Council to consider the report by the Secretary-General on the calendar of conferences for 1961 (E/3415 and Corr.1). He recalled that at the twenty-ninth session (1111th meeting), during the election of the six members of the Committee for Industrial Development which were not members of the Council, no decision had been taken on the date when they should start their term of office. As the first meeting of the Committee was scheduled for 27 March 1961, he proposed that the term of office of the six members in question should start from 1 January 1961.

It was so decided.

20. Mr. SHANAHAN (New Zealand) noted that, according to the calendar, the Social Commission's session was due to begin before the end of the thirty-first session of the Council. Since that might cause difficulties for some delegations, he wondered whether it would be possible to postpone the Commission's session for a few days.

21. Mr. HILL, Deputy Under-Secretary for Economic and Social Affairs, replied that the calendar had been discussed very thoroughly and it would be difficult to alter the date for the opening of the Social Commission's session. On the other hand, the Secretariat hoped that it might be possible to complete the Council's session approximately four days earlier than the scheduled date.

22. Mr. SHANAHAN (New Zealand) requested that the item on the Social Commission's agenda which was of major interest to the members of the Council should not be discussed in the Social Commission until after the end of the Council's thirty-first session.

23. Mr. KOTSCHNIG (United States of America) supported that request. It was, of course, possible that the Council's session might end a few days early, but no attempt should be made to rush the work simply on the grounds that a subsidiary body of the Council was meeting at the same time.

24. The PRESIDENT said that the Secretariat would make the necessary arrangements in the Social Commission's order of business to meet the request of the New Zealand and United States representatives.

25. Mr. DUDLEY (United Kingdom) suggested that the Council might consider holding its spring session one month earlier in future so as to give the Secretariat more time to prepare the documentation for the summer session.

26. Mr. HESSELLUND-JENSEN (Denmark) concurred with that suggestion.

27. Mr. de SOUZA-GOMES (Brazil) pointed out that the Committee for Industrial Development was due to meet on 27 March 1961. Under the resolution on concerted action programmes just adopted by the Council, that Committee was to submit recommendations at the Council's thirty-first session. The time available to it might perhaps not be sufficient, since the Council's thirty-first session was due to open on 4 April.

28. Mr. KOTSCHNIG (United States of America) said that he had no objection in principle to the suggestion made by the United Kingdom representative, although the result might be that the Secretariat would find it difficult to prepare documents in time for the spring session owing to the heavy workload during the General Assembly. In any event, as it was too late to alter the calendar for 1961, the suggestion might be taken up again at a later session of the Council.

29. Mr. AUBOIN (France) supported the United Kingdom representative's suggestion. It was essential that the documents should be ready in good time for the Council's summer session. The Secretariat might well consider the suggestion, and the Council should be able to reach a decision in 1961.

30. Mr. HILL, Deputy Under-Secretary for Economic and Social Affairs, said that it would be very difficult to prepare all the documents in time for the thirty-first session if the Council decided now to alter the calendar for 1961. In principle, however, the Secretariat saw considerable merit in the suggestion made by the United Kingdom representative, although the date of the spring session did not in fact influence the preparation of all the documents for the summer session. For example, the preparation of the *World Economic Survey* was quite independent of the dates of the spring session. The Secretariat would be glad to examine the proposal and to make suggestions for the Council's consideration.

31. Mr. DUDLEY (United Kingdom) said that he would not press for an alteration in the dates for the thirty-first session. He proposed that the Secretariat should examine his suggestion to advance the spring

session for future years and report to the Council at the resumed thirtieth session.

It was so decided.

The calendar of conferences for 1961 was adopted.

AGENDA ITEM 17

Financial implications of actions of the Council (E/3414 and Add.1/Rev.1)

32. The PRESIDENT said that the Council had before it a provisional and a final summary of the financial implications of its actions (E/3414 and Add.1/Rev.1) and that it should also take account of the consolidated statement of work programmes (E/3399) and the observations of the Secretary-General on the work programme (E/3386).

33. The following corrections should be made to the final summary of financial implications (E/3414/Add.1/Rev.1, annex): First, in item 4 the figure of \$5 million should be deleted from the 1962 column and replaced by a footnote stating "amount to be determined", since it was too soon to give any estimate of the requirements for 1962. That would require an adjustment in the total figure. Second, in item 6 (d) a footnote should be added stating that the additional \$14,000 would be required only if the *ad hoc* working group met away from Headquarters. Third, in item 9 the figure \$23,000 should appear under the heading 1962 instead of 1961 and the totals should be amended accordingly.

34. Mr. KOTSCHNIG (United States of America), referring to the estimate of an additional \$5 million under agenda item 4 — opportunities for international co-operation on behalf of newly independent countries — recalled that the original estimate submitted to the Economic Committee (E/3387, para. 9) had been \$2.5 million. His delegation fully recognized the need for, and was willing to support, a substantial increase in the budget for that purpose, but, as it was still too early to make an accurate estimate of the requirements, would be obliged to reserve its position on the figure quoted.

35. With regard to item 6 (d) — *ad hoc* working group of the Economic and Social Council — there would be no additional cost if the working group met at Headquarters. There were financial and other cogent reasons why it should do so. If it met at Geneva, it would have to do so immediately after the meeting of the Administrative Committee on Co-ordination, and its work might be jeopardized by the lack of documents early in May. At Headquarters, however, it would be able to meet later, when more of the agency reports would be ready. It might be argued that if the working group met at Geneva it would have better opportunities for consulting the specialized agencies, but he had found from his experience on the Council's Committee on Programme Appraisals that the agencies could be consulted satisfactorily at Headquarters, where they had highly qualified representatives. He proposed therefore that the Council take an immediate decision on the place for the *ad hoc* working group's meeting.

36. Mr. DUDLEY (United Kingdom) said that his delegation had already recognized that the proposed expansion of technical assistance activities would require an appreciably increased budgetary provision. It was for the General Assembly to decide the amount in the light of the voluntary contributions to the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and the Special Fund, which would by then be known. The initial figure of \$2.5 million and the revised figure of \$5 million could only be very tentative and not precise estimates of cost. They were not in the same category as the other estimates of financial implications. Consequently, like the United States delegation, his delegation wished to reserve its position regarding the estimated additional cost shown against item 4.

37. Mr. KAWASAKI (Japan) said that although he was aware of the increasing need for funds, he must observe that the figure of \$5 million was submitted to the Council for the first time. Presumably, it was merely a round figure, which would be subject to examination and possible revision by the next session of the General Assembly. His delegation would therefore make the same reservation as the United States and United Kingdom delegations.

38. Mr. SHANAHAN (New Zealand) said that neither the figure of \$2.5 million nor the revised figure of \$5 million were precise estimates. His delegation fully appreciated the Secretary-General's proposal but felt that the consideration of the new estimate was a matter for the General Assembly.

39. The estimate of \$14,000 for a meeting of the *ad hoc* working group of the Council at Geneva was unnecessary. The group could work quite effectively at Headquarters.

40. Mr. AUBOIN (France) agreed with the observations made by the representatives of the United States and United Kingdom. The French delegation fully supported the Secretary-General's plans in view of the changes necessitated by recent events. It reserved the position it would take in the General Assembly with regard to the precise amount of the financial provisions, but intended to make a positive contribution to the debates on the item.

41. Mr. KAWASAKI (Japan) observed that, as no formal decision had been taken by the Council on item 4, the figure of \$5 million could not appropriately be included in the summary. The decision on the amount would have to be taken by the General Assembly, where it would be discussed in connexion with other expenditure. His delegation therefore reserved its position.

42. Mr. HILL, Deputy Under-Secretary for Economic and Social Affairs, confirmed that the estimate presented under item 4, which had been submitted in response to the Council's request, was not in the same category as the others in the summary. It would indeed be more appropriate to place it elsewhere in the summary. It might be given in a footnote, with an explanation that it did not form part of the financial implications endorsed by the Council. He confirmed that both the initial and the revised estimates under item 4 related to the regular budget of the United Nations.

43. Mr. CHERNYSHEV (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics) said that his delegation had always held the view that measures such as those envisaged under item 4 (b) should be financed through voluntary contributions made by governments in national currencies, not through the regular United Nations budget. It would reserve its position and revert to the matter when the budget was submitted to the General Assembly.

44. The PRESIDENT proposed that the Council agree that the estimate of \$5 million under item 4 (b) be removed from the summary of financial implications of decisions and a reference to it be inserted in a footnote.

It was so agreed.

45. Mr. MEIJER (Netherlands) said that delegations were not required to decide there and then the place where the *ad hoc* working group should meet. That decision could be taken at the resumed thirtieth session of the Council.

46. Mr. KOTSCHNIG (United States of America) pointed out that under General Assembly resolution 1202 (XII) the working group would automatically meet at Headquarters if the Council did not specifically recommend otherwise. If the Council wished the group to meet at Geneva, it should make a recommendation to that effect. The vote should therefore be taken on his proposal.

47. Miss SEYMOUR (Secretariat) observed that under General Assembly resolution 1096 (XI) concerning the submission of revised estimates, provision might be made to convene the meeting at Geneva if a decision to that effect were taken later. The Council might wish to decide that the meeting should be held at Geneva, subject to review of that decision at the resumed thirtieth session.

48. Mr. KOTSCHNIG (United States of America) said that he would amend his proposal. The Council should decide that the *ad hoc* working group should meet at Headquarters, the decision being subject to review at the resumed thirtieth session.

The United States proposal was adopted by 13 votes to none, with 4 abstentions.

49. Mr. CHERNYSHEV (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics) suggested that the full text of the proceedings of the meetings of the Council held at the ministerial level be published separately.

50. Mr. SHANAHAN (New Zealand) inquired what would be the cost of a separate publication.

51. Mr. HILL, Deputy Under-Secretary for Economic and Social Affairs, replied that a separate publication

would cost approximately \$10,000. Half that sum would represent printing costs and the other half the cost of translation into four languages. That estimate was based on the assumption that several thousand copies of the document would be printed. As an alternative, the Council might wish to ask the Secretary-General to consider the possibility of publishing in the *United Nations Review* a special summary of the proceedings of the thirtieth session at the ministerial level.

52. The PRESIDENT asked whether such a summary could include the verbatim text of the speeches made.

53. Mr. HILL, Deputy Under-Secretary for Economic and Social Affairs, replied that the speeches could only be summarized.

54. Mr. CHENG PAONAN (China) suggested that the speeches should be recorded as fully as was possible if they were to be published in the *United Nations Review*.

55. Mr. de SOUZA-GOMES (Brazil) considered that the statements should be published in full.

56. Mr. CHERNYSHEV (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics) said that he would be prepared to accept the alternative suggested by the Deputy Under-Secretary.

57. Mr. MELLER-CONRAD (Poland) asked the Deputy Under-Secretary whether the ministers' statements could not be published as an annex to the *United Nations Review*.

58. Mr. HILL, Deputy Under-Secretary for Economic and Social Affairs, said that he could not supply an immediate answer to that question, as the publication of an annex to the *Review* would entail additional costs.

59. The PRESIDENT suggested that the Council leave it to the Secretary-General to publish the proceedings of the ministerial meetings in the most appropriate form.

It was so agreed.

60. The PRESIDENT proposed that the Council take note of the documents before it relating to the financial implications of its acts, taking account of the changes to be made in the annex of the final summary (E/3414/Add.1/Rev.1).¹

It was so decided.

The meeting rose at 12.45 p.m.
