AGENDA ITEM 33

Question of an increase in the membership of the Technical Assistance Committee (E/L.929 and Add.1) (concluded)

1. Mr. EL-FARRA (Jordan) said that he could not agree with those delegations which considered that

the elections to all nine vacancies on the Technical Assistance Committee (TAC) should be held at the same time, whether at the present meeting or at the thirty-third session of the Council. In his view, the seats to be vacated by the three retiring members of the Committee should be filled at the present meeting. But elections to the six additional seats which would be created under the terms of the Salvadorian draft resolution (E/L.929) should take place later, so that Governments would have time to consider candidacies. Accordingly, his delegation, together with those of Italy and Spain, was submitting an amendment to the draft resolution, based on provisions adopted in similar circumstances at the first part of the Council's thirty-second session; namely, that the following two paragraphs should be added to the operative part:

"4. The election to fill the vacancies created by the enlargement of the Technical Assistance Committee shall take place at the thirty-third session of the Council;

"5. The Secretary-General shall be requested to inform the Members of the United Nations of the increase in the membership of this Committee and invite them to indicate to him by 1 April 1962 their desire to submit their candidates."

2. Mr. URQUIA (El Salvador) said that his delegation had revised its draft resolution in response to the comments made by the representative of Denmark at the previous meeting. In operative paragraph 1, the words "as from 1 January 1962" should be deleted. In operative paragraph 2, the words "in 1961" should be replaced by "pursuant to this resolution".

3. As regards the three-Power amendment just introduced by the representative of Jordan, he asked whether it was usual for Governments to submit the names of candidates for TAC.

4. Mr. SILVA SUCRE (Venezuela) said that his delegation was in favour of holding the elections to all seats on TAC at the present meeting. There were a number of candidacies which it wished to support, but it would not be able to do so at the thirty-third session, since it would no longer be a member of the Council. It would therefore be obliged to abstain in the vote on the three-Power amendment.

5. Miss SALT (United Kingdom) said that she sympathized with the views of the three Powers on the procedure to be followed by the Council. Her delegation maintained its amendments to operative paragraph 1, made orally at the previous meeting, but proposed, in order to meet the objections raised by Brazil, that the following paragraph should be inserted as a new operative paragraph 3:

"Should the expansion of the Council itself result in the Technical Assistance Committee having

more than thirty members, the Committee shall temporarily consist of that larger number of members until the terms of office of sufficient of the members have expired to make possible the re-establishment under the terms in this resolution of a Committee of thirty."

The existing operative paragraph 3 would accordingly be renumbered paragraph 4.

6. Mr. EL-FARRA (Jordan) said that if the sponsor of the draft resolution would accept the first paragraph proposed by the three Powers, they would withdraw the second.

7. Mr. URQUIA (El Salvador) said that his delegation could not incorporate the United Kingdom amendments or the first paragraph of the three-Power amendment into the draft resolution, since it had not had time to consider them in detail and Spanish texts were not available. It was, however, in favour of the ideas behind the amendments and would therefore vote in favour of them.

8. Mr. PAZHWAK (Afghanistan) asked if the United Kingdom representative would explain the meaning of the phrase "sufficient of the members" in her delegation's latest amendment.

9. Mr. NATORF (Poland) said that the phrase "Should the expansion of the Council itself ..." in the United Kingdom amendment implied that a decision had already been taken to enlarge the Council. That was not the case, although his delegation hoped that conditions would be created in which such a decision could be taken.

10. Miss SALT (United Kingdom) said that the purpose of the new operative paragraph 3 submitted by her delegation was to avoid a situation where some members of TAC would have to be asked to retire before their terms of office were completed. It was therefore proposed that, if the Council was enlarged, all members should remain in office until they completed their terms. But retiring elected members would not be replaced until the membership of the Committee fell to thirty.

11. The text in no way implied that a decision had been taken regarding the enlargement of the Council; it merely provided for the possibility of such a decision being taken.

12. Mr. EL-FARRA (Jordan) said that the three Powers had withdrawn the second paragraph of their amendment in view of the statement made by the representative of El Salvador.

13. The PRESIDENT put to the vote the United Kingdom amendments, two relating to operative paragraph 1 of the Salvadorian draft resolution (E/L.929), and the third providing for a new operative paragraph 3.

The United Kingdom amendments were adopted by 14 votes to none, with 4 abstentions.

14. The PRESIDENT pointed out that the new operative paragraph 4 proposed by the three Powers should be renumbered operative paragraph 5.

The three-Power amendment was adopted by 14 votes to none, with 4 abstentions.

The revised draft resolution, as amended, was adopted by 15 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

AGENDA ITEM 25

Elections (E/3557 and Add.1-4, E/L.930)

15. Mr. KAKITSUBO (Japan) proposed that, in order to expedite the Council's work, two teams of tellers should be appointed.

It was so agreed.

At the invitation of the President, Mr. Ito (Japan) and Mr. Joury (Jordan), and Mr. Serafimov (Bulgaria) and Mr. Harland (New Zealand), acted as tellers.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNING COUNCIL OF THE SPECIAL FUND (E/L.930)

16. The PRESIDENT invited the Council to proceed to the election of six members of the Governing Council of the Special Fund, taking into account the provisions of paragraphs 13 and 14 of part B of General Assembly resolution 1240 (XIII). He suggested that the Council should first elect three members to replace France, the United Kingdom and the United States of America, chosen from among the economically more developed countries, and then three members to replace Argentina, India and Mexico, chosen from among the less developed countries.

It was so decided.

17. The PRESIDENT stated that the Governments of Brazil, India, Indonesia and the United Kingdom had indicated their interest in being elected or re-elected to the Governing Council, but that the Government of India had later withdrawn its candidacy (E/L.930).

ELECTIONS TO FILL VACANCIES RESULTING FROM THE INCREASE IN THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE FUNCTIONAL COMMISSIONS OF THE COUNCIL (E/3557 and Add.1-4)

28. The PRESIDENT recalled that, by resolution 845 (XXXII), the Council had decided that the membership of the functional commissions of the Council should be increased and that the elections to fill the vacancies created by the enlargement of the commissions should take place at the resumed part of its thirty-second session.

29. He inquired whether it was the Council's wish to follow the suggestions in paragraph 5 of document E/3557, namely that in the initial stage, the additional members of the Population Commission and the Statistical Commission should serve for two, three and four years respectively and that, in the case of the Social Commission, the term of office of the additional members should be for one, two and three years and that of members to be elected thereafter should be for three years.

It was so agreed.

30. The PRESIDENT invited the Council to proceed to the election of three additional members of the Commission on International Commodity Trade. The Governments of Cambodia, Indonesia, Ivory Coast, Madagascar, Mali, Morocco, Romania, Thailand and Uruguay had expressed interest in being elected to that Commission.

AGENDA ITEM 27**Confirmation of members of functional Commissions of the Council (E/3561 and Corr.1 and Add.1)**

50. The PRESIDENT drew the Council's attention to the names of the persons nominated by Governments to represent them on the functional commissions of the Council (E/3561 and Corr.1 and Add.1).

51. Mr. NATORF (Poland) reserved his delegation's position with regard to the nomination of Mr. Ju Li Pao-kung, since he did not represent the Central People's Government of the People's Republic of China or the Chinese people.

52. Mr. MAKEEV (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics) and Mr. TCHOBANOV (Bulgaria) associated

themselves with the remarks of the Polish representative.

The nominations were confirmed.

Closure of the session

53. The PRESIDENT expressed his gratitude to the members of the Council and to those members of the Secretariat who had assisted the Council in its work for their co-operation.

54. Mr. NORRISH (New Zealand) observed that 1961 had been the last year of his delegation's term as a member of the Economic and Social Council. It had also been a year in which the leader of the New Zealand delegation had been elected to the Presidency of the Council.

55. Speaking on behalf of the United Kingdom delegation as well as his own, he expressed appreciation of the distinguished manner in which the Acting President had conducted the resumed session.

56. Mr. SILVA SUCRE (Venezuela), speaking for the delegations of Spain, the United States of America and Uruguay as well as his own, Mr. PAZHWAK (Afghanistan), Mr. URQUIA (El Salvador) and Mr. MAKEEV (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics), speaking for the delegation of Poland as well as his own, congratulated the Acting President, the other officers of the Council and the representatives of their Secretariat on the able and impartial way in which they had discharged their tasks.

57. Mr. DANGEARD (France) expressed his delegation's good wishes to New Zealand, Spain and Venezuela, who were concluding their terms of office as members of the Council. He pointed out that with the departure of Spain there would be one European member less on the Council. He hoped that that state of affairs would be rectified when the membership of the Council was enlarged.

58. He offered his delegation's thanks and congratulations to the Acting President, the other officers of the Council and the Secretariat.

59. The PRESIDENT declared the thirty-second session of the Council closed.

The meeting rose at 6.45 p.m.
