CORRIGENDUM TO SUMMARY RECORD OF THE TWENTY-FIRST MEETING,  
9 JUNE 1947, AT 3:00 P.M.

(Submitted by Dr. J.G. de Beus, Representative for the Netherlands)

Page 6, first paragraph, fourth sentence to read as follows:

"If not expressly, at least by implication, the Charter of the Nuremberg Tribunal laid down the principle that an international criminal court might be desirable, since the Charter itself instituted the first International Criminal Court."

Page 7, seventh to ninth lines, to read after the word "purpose":

"and that it might equally be possible to create an authority which, like the Permanent Court of Arbitration, might consist of a panel of names of judges who could be convoked, or from which a tribunal could be set up, as the occasion arose."
