ANNEX

Press communiqué issued on 13 December 1989 by the Diplomatic  
Information Office of the Spanish Ministry of Foreign Affairs

The Diplomatic Information Office of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs hereby issues the following communiqué:

1. Spain, which has supported the Central American peace process from the outset and given its full backing to the Esquipulas Agreements and the Declarations adopted at Alajuela, Costa del Sol and Tela, considers that the commitments undertaken by the Central American Presidents at San Isidro de Coronado constitute an important step towards a firm and lasting peace.
2. The new Declaration by the Central American Presidents comes, moreover, at a time when the violence and problems inherent in the conflict have worsened. It is thus especially noteworthy that the five Central American Presidents have reached agreement.
3. Spain reiterates that serious negotiations leading to political solutions are the only way to resolve the conflict, and urges all the parties involved, and the countries with ties to and interests in the region, to support the Declaration of San Isidro de Coronado and the initiatives of the United Nations Secretary-General relating to the Central American region.
