OFFERS BY MEMBER STATES OF STUDY AND TRAINING FACILITIES
FOR INHABITANTS OF NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES (UNDER
RESOLUTION 845 (IX) OF 22 NOVEMBER 1954)

Report of the Secretary-General

1. By note dated 14 September 1961, the Permanent Representative of Yugoslavia informed the Secretariat that of the fifteen scholarships offered by his Government for the academic year 1960-1961 seven have been awarded and that only two candidates, Messrs. S.C. Okwuosa and D. Opadeji of Nigeria, had arrived in Yugoslavia to take up their studies.
2. The scholarships offered include free schooling and health services, a monthly stipend of 25,000 dinars and rooming facilities in school cities as well as a yearly book allowance of 5,000 to 10,000 dinars, depending on the type of studies pursued. All travel expenses are paid by the Yugoslav Government. Fellowships which were not utilized in 1960-1961 are available for the academic year 1961-1962.

By letter dated 9 October 1961, the Permanent Mission of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to the United Nations informed the Secretariat that, in the academic year 1960-1961, 2,626 under-graduate and graduate students from Africa, Asia and Latin America were studying in the Soviet Union, including 529 at the Patrice Lumumba People's Friendship University. Included in this number were two students from the Guianas, one from Trinidad, two from Portuguese Guinea, ten from Zanzibar, thirteen from Kenya, five from Mauritius, nine from Uganda and one from the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland.
4. The Secretariat was also informed that, for the academic year 1961-1962, it was the intention of the USSR Government to admit sixty-four students from Non-Self-Governing Territories.
