INTRODUCTION

1. In resolution 845 (IX) of 22 November 1954, the General Assembly invited Member States to extend generously to the inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories their offers of facilities not only for study and training of university standard but, in the first place, for study at the post-primary level as well as technical and vocational training of immediate practical value. The Secretary-General was requested to establish a simple procedure for bringing to the attention of the Administering Members offers and applications made through the United Nations and the specialized agencies and for transmitting the applications to the offering States concerned. Further, the Administering Members were requested to give appropriate publicity in Territories under their administration to offers of study and training facilities and to take such other measures as would ensure that the greatest possible advantage was taken of the offers.
2. Since the adoption of resolution 845 (IX), the General Assembly has adopted a number of resolutions relating to the subject of scholarships.^{1/} By resolution 1696 (XVI), the General Assembly revised the procedures established in resolution 845 (IX) and requested that applications for scholarships received from inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories should be transmitted simultaneously to the offering States for consideration and to the Administering Members concerned for information. Resolution 1974 (XVIII) reaffirmed resolution 1849 (XVII) and:
 - (a) requested Member States offering scholarships to take into account the necessity of furnishing complete information about the scholarships offered and, whenever possible, the need of travel funds to prospective students;
 - (b) invited the Administering Members to take the necessary measures to ensure that all scholarships and training facilities offered by Member States were utilized by the inhabitants of those Territories, and to render effective assistance to persons who had applied for, or had been granted, scholarships or fellowships, particularly

with regard to facilitating their travel formalities; (c) requested the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its nineteenth session on the implementation of this resolution.

3. The Secretary-General therefore submits the present report which supplements the information supplied to the General Assembly at its eighteenth session.^{2/} The report considers the problems connected with the actual use of scholarships offered by Member States under resolution 845 (IX) and reviews the progress achieved in the implementation of the resolutions subsequently adopted by the General Assembly on the same subject.

4. As in previous years, the report also provides information on offers and awards of scholarships made to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories under national and regional schemes.

I. OFFERS

5. A detailed description of the scholarships offered by twenty-one Member States up to 27 November 1963, was presented to the General Assembly at its eighteenth session.

6. In a note dated 26 June 1964, the Permanent Representative of Bulgaria stated that his Government had decided to offer a total of ten scholarships for higher and university education for the academic year 1964/1965 to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories under resolution 845 (IX), as well as to indigenous inhabitants from Territories administered by Portugal under resolution 1808 (XVII) of 14 December 1962 and to South West Africans under resolution 1705 (XVI) of 19 December 1961. Applications for these scholarships were to be received by the appropriate authorities prior to August 1964.

7. In a note dated 15 May 1964, the Permanent Representative of Czechoslovakia stated that his Government had offered twenty scholarships for vocational and higher education at Czechoslovak secondary schools and universities to inhabitants from Non-Self-Governing Territories and Trust Territories.

8. In a note dated 1 July 1964, the Permanent Representative of Hungary informed the Secretary-General that his Government was ready to grant five additional scholarships for the academic year 1964/1965.
9. In a note dated 29 May 1964, the Secretary-General was informed by the Permanent Representative of India that his Government had decided to increase their annual offer of scholarships to twenty-three for the academic year 1964/1965 to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories.
10. In notes dated 20 August and 22 September 1964, the Permanent Representative of Iran stated that the University of Teheran had decided to offer one scholarship in the field of science to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories for the academic year 1965/1966 and that the Iranian Petroleum Institute was offering two four-year scholarships. The latter offer did not include transportation.
11. In a note dated 19 August 1964, the Permanent Representative of Pakistan informed the Secretary-General that his Government had offered thirteen scholarships for the academic year 1963/1964 and that for the academic year 1964/1965, six scholarships for higher education were being made available.
12. In two notes dated 8 August 1964, the Permanent Representative of Poland stated that two of the ten scholarships offered in 1956 were still available and that, in addition, the Polish Government had made available fifteen all-expense scholarships for higher education to candidates from Non-Self-Governing Territories in Africa, including Territories under Portuguese administration.
13. In a note dated 8 October 1964, the Permanent Representative of the United Arab Republic stated that his Government has made available five scholarships for university study and five for general and technical education for the year 1963/1964 and that this offer was being repeated for the academic year 1964/1965.
14. In a note dated 25 February 1964, the Permanent Representative of Sierra Leone informed the Secretary-General that the Government of Sierra Leone had decided to include Southern Rhodesians in its offer to certain African students of a total of fourteen scholarships, six for secondary education, six for sixth form students and two for graduate courses at Fourah Bay College.

15. In a note dated 17 September 1964, the Permanent Representative of the United States of America transmitted detailed information on the scholarship programme administered by the United States.
16. In notes dated 10 July and 2 September 1964, the Permanent Representative of Yugoslavia stated that his Government has made twenty-five scholarships available for 1964/1965, or until this number has been utilized.
17. Further details concerning the requirements and conditions accompanying the offers described above are to be found in the table annexed to the present report.

II. AWARDS OF SCHOLARSHIPS AND USE MADE OF THE AWARDS

18. In a letter dated 30 July 1964, the Permanent Representative of Burma informed the Secretary-General that the appropriate authorities of Burma would be glad to extend to Mr. David Macua Thairu of Kenya the offer of a scholarship to study agriculture in Burma, should Mr. Thairu be agreeable to study Burmese before beginning his studies of agriculture. Mr. Thairu has accepted this condition.
19. In a note dated 16 July 1964, the Permanent Representative of Greece informed the Secretary-General that of twelve scholarships awarded since 1959, two had not been used; one student had completed his course in weaving and spinning; two students had completed courses in agriculture; two were attending courses in mechanics; and five students were to begin their studies in October 1964. Of these, one will study radio mechanics, one mechanics, one weaving and spinning and two agriculture. Of these ten students, six are from Kenya, two are from Nigeria, one is from Nyasaland and one is from Uganda.
20. In a note dated 21 August 1964, the Permanent Representative of Italy stated that eight scholarships had been awarded to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories of which four had been utilized by students from Malta (1), Zambia (1) and Malawi (2).
21. In a note dated 8 August 1964, the Permanent Representative of Poland stated that of the ten scholarships awarded to students from Non-Self-Governing and Trust Territories since 1956, eight had been utilized. One of the eight students came from a Non-Self-Governing Territory (Northern Rhodesia).

22. In a note dated 24 August 1964, the Permanent Representative of Sierra Leone stated that five awards had been made to Southern Rhodesians and that one additional student from Southern Rhodesia had been recommended for an award but at that time had not yet been awarded the scholarship.
23. In a note dated 26 March 1964, the Permanent Representative of Turkey informed the Secretary-General that a student from Kenya who had been studying at the Institute of Radio and Electricity since May 1961 had graduated from the Institute and had consequently been granted another scholarship at the High Technical Normal School where he was studying.
24. In notes dated 15 April and 1 May 1964, the Permanent Representative of the United Arab Republic stated that a total of eleven scholarships had been awarded. One of them had been taken up for the 1963/1964 school year by a student from Kenya who had been admitted to the Technical High Institute in Cairo. Eight further scholarships had been awarded for study at the same Institute for the academic year 1964/1965 to seven students from Kenya and one from Bechuanaland. Two other candidates were to take up their studies at the University for the academic year 1964/1965. One of them was from St. Vincent and the other from Kenya.
25. In a note dated 17 September 1964, the Permanent Representative of the United States of America informed the Secretary-General that during the academic year 1963/1964 his Government had awarded 115 scholarships to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories, sixty-seven of which were for the purpose of university study, twenty for teaching or teacher development, fifteen for practical experience and training and thirteen for observation and consultation. He further stated that during the academic year 1963/1964, a total of 5,742 students from Non-Self-Governing Territories had attended institutions of higher learning in the United States under private, governmental or other auspices, compared with 3,678 during 1962/1963, 4,273 during 1961/1962 and 2,007 during 1960/1961. Of the total number, 1,354 came from Africa and adjacent islands, 3,660 from Asia and the Pacific, 712 from the Western Hemisphere, ten from Aden and six from Malta.
26. In a note dated 2 September 1964, the Permanent Representative of Yugoslavia stated that sixteen scholarships had been awarded to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories. All of these students had applied directly to the appropriate Yugoslav authorities.

III. PROCEDURE, APPLICATIONS AND PUBLICITY

27. During the period under review, offers of facilities for study and training have been handled according to established procedure. Offers extended under General Assembly resolution 845 (IX) were communicated to the Administering Members concerned for their information, as provided by resolution 1696 (XVI), and also to enable them to give appropriate publicity to the offers in the Territories under their administration. The offers were also communicated to UNESCO for publication in Study Abroad.

28. Scholarships have been publicized from the outset in the majority of the Territories under United Kingdom administration. This is evident from the large number of inquiries and applications received from many such Non-Self-Governing Territories in Africa.

29. During the period under review, 344 students from Non-Self-Governing Territories sent inquiries to the United Nations Secretariat and asked for application forms (compared with 745 during the previous period and 1,078 during the period before that); application forms or instructions on how to apply directly were sent to these students; 184 forms were duly completed and returned to the Secretariat.

30. One hundred applications, compared with 240 in 1963 and 223 in 1962, were forwarded to the offering States in accordance with established procedures. Of these applicants, thirty requested scholarships offered by Greece; twenty-one those offered by Turkey; seventeen those offered by Burma; nine wished to study in the United Arab Republic, seven in Hungary, six in Sierra Leone, four in Czechoslovakia, three in Yugoslavia, and one each in Israel, Romania and Tunisia. Since applicants are requested to apply directly to the Governments concerned if they desire to study in Ghana, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics or the United States of America, only occasional applications for study in these countries are received by the Secretariat. As mentioned previously, a number of other offering States also receive applications directly from applicants in Non-Self-Governing Territories.

31. Though applications from Kenya were accepted for only three months of the period under review, the majority of inquiries (215) and applications came from that Territory. Others received from Africa came from the following Territories: Southern Rhodesia, forty-one; Northern Rhodesia, twenty-two; Nyasaland, seventeen; Bechuanaland, eleven; Mauritius, eight; Basutoland, three; and Zanzibar, one. From among the Caribbean and Western Atlantic Territories, four applications were received from St. Vincent, three from St. Lucia and two from British Guiana. In addition, one application was received from Fiji.

32. According to information received from offering States during the period under review, 168 scholarship students pursued courses at the educational institutions of Member States during the academic year 1963/1964. For the academic year 1964/1965, 106 scholarships are to be awarded. Some of the offering States do not give separate figures for scholarships awarded to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories and those awarded to students from other countries, while a number of States give only figures of scholarships already awarded and utilized. The figures given are incomplete.

IV. INFORMATION CONCERNING SCHOLARSHIPS MADE AVAILABLE TO INHABITANTS OF NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES UNDER NATIONAL AND REGIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

Scholarship holders from Territories under New Zealand administration^{3/}

33. Since 1946, the New Zealand Government has provided scholarships to selected Cook Island students for secondary, technical or university education or other training in New Zealand. Since 1957, scholarships have also been offered to Cook Islanders to study at the Agricultural College in Samoa. In March 1963, ninety-four government scholarship holders attended educational institutions in New Zealand; of these, forty-four were secondary school students, six were primary teacher trainees, seven were nursing students, ten were university students and twenty-seven were undertaking professional and trade training.

34. In 1963, fourteen Niuean boys and four girls attended New Zealand secondary schools on scholarships, two girls attended teacher training college, two studied nursing training in New Zealand, while six boys attended the Agricultural College in Samoa. One girl and two boys from Tokelau attended secondary school in Western Samoa, two girls and two boys attended the Teacher Training College in Western Samoa, seven boys were at the Avela Agricultural College also in Western Samoa, and another three boys attended the Central Medical School at Fiji on scholarship. In addition, three boys attended primary school in New Zealand.
