INTRODUCTION

1. The present report is submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with the request contained in operative paragraph 6 of General Assembly resolution 1973 (XVIII) of 16 December 1963. It is supplementary to the report of the Secretary-General to the General Assembly at its nineteenth session (A/5783 and Add.1) which was not considered at that session and which is also before the twentieth session.

2. Background information provided in terms of General Assembly resolution 1808 (XVII) of 14 December 1962, which resolution serves as the basis for the present arrangements concerning the special training programme for indigenous inhabitants from Territories under Portuguese administration, is set out in the reports of the Secretary-General to the General Assembly at its eighteenth and nineteenth sessions. $\frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}$

I. SPECIAL TRAINING PROGRAMME ADMINISTERED BY THE UNITED NATIONS

3. Funds to enable the Secretary-General to implement the terms of resolutions 1808 (XVII) and 1973 (XVIII) were first made available in May 1964 (A/5783, para. 9). Since that date seventy-one applications for United Nations scholarships from indigenous inhabitants of Territories under Portuguese administration have been considered. Of these, fifteen were either withdrawn or rejected, twelve have not been pursued by the applicants, thirty-three have resulted in the award of scholarships (ten during 1964 and twenty-three during the period from 1 January to 20 September 1965) and eleven are under consideration.

4. Of the twenty-three students awarded scholarships since 1 January 1965, one is studying commercial sciences at the University of Dakar, three attend the Ecole Nationale de Droit et d'Administration in Leopoldville, four the University of

the Louvanium in Leopoldville where they are studying civil engineering, agriculture, biological sciences and teachers training respectively, one the Institut National du Bâtiment et des Travaux Publics in Leopoldville, two the University of Fribourg where they study economics, one the University of Paris where he is completing his law studies, two the University of Vienna studying agriculture and medicine respectively, and one the University of Syracuse in the United States where he is studying journalism. In addition, seven students are attending Kurasini International College in Dar es Salaam and one is attending a secondary school in Leopoldville.

5. By the end of the year the programme is expected to be committed in respect of some thirty-five students.

6. Of the \$54,000 made available to this programme for 1965. it is estimated that all but \$15 will have been committed by the end of the year - \$23,940 to cover the cost of the twenty-three new awards and the balance to meet the cost of renewing previous awards. The sum of \$50,000 has been requested for 1966. 7. Of the eleven students who applied unsuccessfully for awards during 1965, two were unable to meet the basic requirements for the studies they wished to undertake, three failed to pass the necessary entrance examinations, one was not a bona fide indigenous inhabitant of a Territory under Portuguese administration, one submitted forged certificates from a school he never attended, two had misused funds given to them by another donor, one applicant withdrew his application for the current year owing to personal reasons and another after obtaining employment; should these two persons apply again their applications will be reconsidered. 8. Of the eleven scholarships at present under consideration, four are for secondary education, two for graduate study at either Ibadan or Makerere in economics and social work respectively, one for the study of economics in Fribourg, one for study at the Institute for International Relations in Geneva, two for continuation of studies at the University of Paris in economics and social sciences respectively, and one for post-graduate medical studies in France. 9. The Selection and Review Panel which was set up in August 1964 has continued its work (A/5783, para. 15). Before an award is made each applicant is interviewed, either by the appropriate United Nations Resident Representative or at the United Nations Geneva Office or at Headquarters, as the circumstances of

the case dictate, and his preferred field of study discussed with him. The offices of the Resident Representatives of the Technical Assistance Board and Special Fund provided valuable assistance by interviewing applicants, negotiating with host Governments and arranging with educational institutions for the admission of successful candidates.

Co-operation with Member States

10. In a note dated 16 April 1965, the Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs, of the <u>Democratic Republic of the Congo</u> notified the Secretary-General that special arrangements had been made so that Angolan students who were recipients of United Nations scholarships and whose qualifications were adequate could be admitted to the following educational institutions: the Ecole Nationale de Droit et d'Administraticn; the Institut National Pédagogique; the Institut d'Enseignement Medical; and the Institut National du Bâtiment et des Travaux Publics. These institutions are usually only open to nationals of the Democratic Republic of the Congo. At present, three United Nations scholars are registered at the Ecole Nationale de Droit et d'Administration and one at the Institut National du Bâtiment et des Travaux Publics.

11. The Permanent Representative of <u>Togo</u>, in a note dated 14 July 1965, stated that his Government had made available ten places for qualified secondary students on United Nations scholarships, who did not exceed the age limits set for Togolese secondary students.

II. OFFERS BY MEMBER STATES

12. During the period under review one more Member State, <u>Gabon</u>, made an offer of scholarships under General Assembly resolution 1808 (XVII), bringing the total of offering States to twenty-seven.

13. In a note dated 26 May 1965, the Permanent Representative of <u>Afghanistan</u> informed the Secretary-General that the two scholarships offered by his Government continued to be available under the same conditions as those offered in the previous year.

14. In a note dated 13 August 1965, the Acting Permanent Representative of Czechoslovakia stated that his Government had decided to make available six

all-expense scholarships for higher education to students from Angola and Portuguese Guinea for the academic year 1965/1966.

15. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Gabon informed the Secretary-General on 20 March 1965 that a certain number of all-expense scholarships for secondary education, technical and professional training, had been made available in the Gabonese school system to refugees from Territories under Portuguese administration. 16. In a note dated 13 August 1965, the Permanent Representative of Iran informed the Secretary-General that two four-year scholarships at the Iranian Petroleum Institute had been made available to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories leading to a bachelor of science degree. Students wishing to follow these courses are required to take an entrance examination but in the case of applicants from Non-Self-Governing Territories, the usual entrance examination would be waived and minor adjustments might be made in the educational requirements. Most of the courses are conducted in Persian but special arrangements could be made to offer all the necessary courses in English. Such students would receive a certificate from the Institute at the end of the four-year term indicating their level of education within the Institute. The note also stated that the National University of Iran in Teheran had offered two scholarships in economics and banking. The courses require a working knowledge of Persian but students with some knowledge of Persian might be offered special facilities to attain the proficiency in the language required to complete the courses. All expenses with the exception of travel expenses are covered by these offers.

17. In a note dated 28 July 1965, the Acting Permanent Representative of the <u>Netherlands</u> informed the Secretary-General that the scholarships previously offered in December 1963 for studies at the post-graduate level continued to be available. For most of these courses a knowledge of English is a prerequisite. Courses in the French language are offered at the University of Tropical Agriculture in Deventer and at the International Centre for Aeriel Survey at Delft.

18. In a note dated 7 June 1965, the Permanent Representative of <u>Pakistan</u> informed the Secretary-General that his Government had decided to make one scholarship available to a student from Timor and one to a student from Portuguese Guinea for the academic year 1965/1966. These scholarships are tenable at the universities of Karachi, Pangas, Sind, Peshavav, Daccar or Rajashashi, in arts, science or commerce.

19. In a note dated 3 August 1965, the Acting Permanent Representative of <u>Sweden</u> informed the Secretary-General that his Government could not give an exact indication of the total number of scholarships which would be made available for the academic year 1965/1966. The programme for the Democratic Republic of the Congo (see para. 34 below), particularly at the secondary level, would be expanded to comprise approximately thirty-five scholarships.

20. Further information which may be received from other Member States who have offered scholarships will be summarized later in an addendum to the present report.

III. USE MADE OF SCHOLARSHIPS OFFERED BY MEMBER STATES

21. According to information received from Member States, a total of 133 awards were made for the academic year 1964/1965, compared with a total of twenty-four reported for the previous academic year.

22. Three awards were made by the <u>Byelorussian Soviet Socialist Republic</u> (A/5783/Add.1, para. 4). In a note dated 14 January 1965, the Permanent Representative stated that his Government was prepared to bear the cost of travel of the three Angolan students who had been awarded scholarships to higher educational institutions in that country.

23. In a note dated 7 June 1965, the Permanent Mission of Dahomey informed the Secretary-General that the application submitted by an Angolan student through the Secretary-General for study at a teachers' training college had been rejected because the applicant's qualifications were insufficient. 24. Seven scholarships were awarded by the Government of Denmark. The Acting Permanent Representative of Denmark informed the Secretary-General, in a note dated 2 July 1965, that out of the 200,000 Danish kroner set aside for the "International University Exchange Fund" for refugee students, scholarships had been granted to four students from Angola and three from Mozambique for studies at European universities and schools. The scholarships granted were for the academic year 1964/1965 but they would be renewed subject to satisfactory progress by the recipients.

25. In a note dated 20 March 1965, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of <u>Gabon</u> informed the Secretary-General that, for two years, two students, one from São Tomé and one from Angola, had benefited from scholarships offered by his Government. These students were attending the University of Frankfurt/Main in Germany and the University of Paris, studying medicine and law respectively.

26. In a note dated 12 August 1965, the Permanent Representative of <u>Hungary</u> stated that among twenty-three students from Non-Self-Governing Territories studying in Hungary, six were from Angola and two from Portuguese Guinea.

27. The Permanent Mission of <u>Italy</u> informed the Secretary-General on 6 July 1965 that two Angolan applicants had been awarded scholarships. Both students were at present studying the Italian language and were due to begin their university studies of chemistry and economics and trade respectively in the autumn of this year.

28. The Acting Permanent Representative of the <u>Netherlands</u> informed the Secretary-General, in a note dated 28 July 1965, that up to that date no candidates had been proposed who met the requirements; consequently it had not been possible to award scholarships to inhabitants of Territories under Portuguese administration. 29. In a note dated 30 July 1965, the Permanent Mission of <u>Poland</u> informed the Secretary-General that in the course of the current year five students from Angola had been awarded scholarships for study at the university level, and that these students had meanwhile arrived in Poland and would continue their studies during the academic year 1965/1966.

30. In a note dated 7 July 1965, the Permanent Representative of <u>Senegal</u> stated that some thirty children of refugees from Territories under Portuguese administration were attending regular primary and secondary schools in Senegal. 31. He further stated that, in general, owing to the low scholastic level of the children of political refugees from Territories under Portuguese administration, it was not possible to fit them into the classes corresponding to their age. Most of these students were having difficulties in adapting to Senegalese educational methods. Without excluding the possibility of admitting them to regular educational institutions, the Ministry of National and Cultural Education would be glad to consider the opening of special schools for these children, adapted to their needs and possibly financed in accordance with General Assembly resolutions 1808 (XVII) and 1973 (XVIII).

32. In a note dated 10 August 1965, the Permanent Representative of <u>Sierra Leone</u> advised the Secretary-General that since the language of instruction in Sierra Leone was English, each applicant had to possess sufficient knowledge of the English language to be able to follow the courses.

33. In a note dated 4 June 1965, the Permanent Representative of the <u>Sudan</u> stated that the application of an Angolan who wished to continue his secondary education had to be rejected because of his age.

34. In a note dated 3 August 1965, the Permanent Representative of Sweden stated that for the academic year 1964/1965, twenty-two scholarships had been awarded by the Swedish Government to students from Territories under Portuguese administration. One of the recipients was from Mozambique and the others were Angolans. Of the nine university awards, three were for study in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, five in Switzerland and one in Sweden. Twelve students had received half-year grants for study in secondary schools in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and one student was attending a college for adult education in Tanzania. In compliance with a request of the Swedish Ambassador, the United Nations Resident Representative in the Democratic Republic of the Congo administers the scholarships provided by Sweden to Angolan secondary students in Congolese schools. 35. In addition to the individual scholarships awarded, the Swedish Government has also supported educational efforts for students from Territories under Portuguese administration by donating some \$30,000 to the Mozambique Institute in Dar es Salaam and by placing \$15,000 at the disposal of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees for the educational part of the Rutamba project for Mozambican refugees in Tanzania.

36. On 15 June 1965, the Permanent Mission of the <u>United Kingdom of Great Britain</u> and Northern Ireland informed the United Nations Secretariat that no applications for scholarships in the United Kingdom had been received from students of Territories under Portuguese administration.

37. The Permanent Mission of the <u>Union of Soviet Socialist Republics</u>, in a note dated 12 January 1965, stated that his Government had decided to bear the cost of travel of the twelve students who had been awarded scholarships for study in his country (A/5783/Add.1, para. 6).

38. In a note dated 20 August 1965, the Permanent Representative of the <u>United</u> <u>States of America</u> stated, <u>inter alia</u>, that during the academic year 1964/1965, nineteen students from Angola and twenty-three from Mozambique attended universities in the United States on scholarships granted by the United States Government. The Secretary-General has not, however, received information from the United States Government on any specific offers of scholarships under this programme.
