STATEMENTS OF QUALIFICATIONS OF CANDIDATES

Note by the Secretary-General

1. In accordance with the provisions of article 6 of the Statute of the International Law Commission, the Secretary-General communicated to the Governments of States Members of the United Nations a list of the names of candidates nominated by Governments which appears as part B of document A/6359.
2. As further provided in that article, the Secretary-General has the honour to communicate to the Governments of Member States the statements of qualifications in respect of those candidates which nominating Governments have submitted in response to the Secretary-General's note verbale and telegram of 14 February 1966 and 17 May 1966, respectively.
3. The statements of qualifications are set out in the present document in the alphabetical order of the names of the candidates to which they relate. Any further statements of qualifications which are submitted will be reproduced in addenda to the present document.

#### Degrees

Studies at the University of Naples. Doctor of Law in 1929. Doctor of Political Science in 1930. Won a scholarship to the Academy of Law at The Hague in 1935.

#### Posts

"Chargé des cours" of International Law at the Universities of Cagliari and Messina in 1930-1931 and 1933-1934, respectively. Professor of International law at the University of Catania in 1934-1935, and at the University of Genoa from 1935-1936 to 1937-1938. Professor of International Law at the State University of Milan from 1938-1939 to 1955-1956. Director of the Institute of International Law at the University of Milan during the same period. Since 1956-1957 Professor of International Law at the University of Rome.

He held courses at the Academy of International Law at The Hague in 1936, (General rules of conflict of Laws), 1939 (International tort) and in 1955 (Legal science and international law); at the "Institut Universitaire des Hautes Etudes Internationales" in Geneva in 1947 (International legal order and the problems of peace), in 1948 (Principles inspiring the international legal system); and 1960 (Codification of international law); at the European College in Bruges in 1952 (International tort); at the summer courses of the University of Valladolid in Vitoria in 1952 (International responsibility for tort); at the "Institut des Hautes Etudes Internationales" of the University of Paris (The question of Foundation of International Law); at the University of European Studies in Turin in 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1957 and 1958 (International Organization). Also held courses and delivered lectures on international law in several academic and scientific institutions in Rome, Milan, Turin, Florence, Naples, Padua, Vicenza, Perugia, in Italy; in London, Cambridge, Oxford, Paris, Toulouse, Geneva, Bruxelles, San Francisco, Oslo, Stockholm, Copenhagen, Lisbon, Coimbra, Madrid, Saloniki and Athens, abroad.
